## Notices for Sunday, October 11, 2020

Dear lovely people of St Philip's!

As I have been thinking about Thanksgiving this week, one particular hymn has got stuck in my mind," Now Thank We All Our God". The hymn begins with this affirmation:

'Now thank we all our God, with heart and hands and voices, Who wondrous things has done, in Whom this world rejoices;'

But this is no ordinary thanksgiving hymn. It was written during a horrific time in our world's history. Yet the author sings:

'O may this bounteous God…keep us in his grace, And guide us when perplexed, And free us from all ills, In this world and the next.'

The author, a German Lutheran pastor named Martin Rinkhart, lived and ministered through unimaginable horrors during the Thirty Years War that tore Europe apart from 1618-1648. The time was marked by vicious fighting, pestilence, famine, epidemics, and floods of refugees. An estimated eight million people died. In his ministry he officiated at over 4000 funerals, his wife's included.

Rinkhart's hymn reminds us that there is more to life than hardships and troubles. Despite what life throws at us we can choose faith, hope, and love. Those virtues direct us toward thankfulness. How does that work? In Romans 5, Paul says, "We [know] suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit..." The secret ingredient is God's love.

It is easy to be thankful when things are going well. Most of the time we cruise along on autopilot. But what happens when things fall apart? How do we respond? Do we become more "I" and "me" absorbed? Or more "we" and "us" focused? A heart and mind open to God's grace, even a wee bit, can begin to build gratitude and move forward. Gratitude is contagious! It starts small within us and spreads to those around us. Diane Butler Bass, author of *Grateful: The Transformative Power of Giving Thanks*, puts it this way: "To choose gratitude is to hear an inner urging toward thanks, to see the grace in life, and to respond." That's how thankfulness is transmitted.

So let us all be Super Spreaders of Gratitude this Thanksgiving and respond accordingly. And there are lots of ways to respond to God's goodness: call a friend, become a St Philip's Ringer, get involved with the Neighbourhood Ministry, and help support Lama and her lovely family. And you could consider giving an extra gift this week to help support St Philip's during this time of financial hardship. Your generosity is deeply appreciated.

#### COADJUTOR BISHOP-ELECT

The Rev'd John Stephens, Rector of St. John, Shaughnessy, was elected Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of New Westminster on the third ballot during the Electoral Synod, Saturday, October 3.

On that same day, the Coadjutor Bishop will be seated and become the 10<sup>th</sup> Bishop of New Westminster.

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY – NEW VOLUNTEER AND PROGRAM MANAGER** *Submitted by Joan Stewart*



The Board of Management of the Westside Anglicans Neighbourhood Ministry (WANM) is very pleased to announce that Rev'd. Liz Hamel has been appointed as the new Volunteer and Program Manager for WANM. This is a one-year contract (we hope to be renewed), which is supported by a grant from the City of Vancouver.

Liz is an ordained Anglican Priest with a passion for justice and advocacy. She has worked as a nurse, chaplain and parish priest in Ladner, the Downtown Eastside and in the four Anglican Churches of the WANM. She knows much about our ministry and was very keen to step into this role on

October 1st.

Liz will be guided in this transition by Vicki Potter, who retired from this position earlier this year. She will be supervised by the co-chairs of the Board (Joan Stewart and Coadjutor Bishop Elect for the Diocese of New Westminster John Stephens) and will report directly to the Board. Liz will be tasked with continuing our current ministry and seeking new ways for us to expand and grow the services we provide to our vulnerable neighbours on the city's westside.

We are delighted that Liz is joining us and we invite you to warmly welcome her to the WANM family!

Westside Anglicans Neighbourhood Ministry- our response to homelessness in our area October 11 to 18 is Homelessness Action Week, a good time to reflect on St. Philip's action on behalf of the homeless through the Westside Anglican Neighbourhood Ministry (WANM).

The WANM started more than 12 years ago in the spring of 2008, the brainchild of Pitman and Vicki Potter. Teams made up of members of St. Philip's, St. Anselm's and St. Helen's (in recent years joined by St. John's Shaughnessy) went out on the street to encounter the homeless in our area with packets of non-perishable food and with the intention of establishing relationships. I went to some of the early planning meetings, but did not participate initially.

I became excited about this ministry in 2011 when the city was about to open two supportive housing buildings in our area. I learned that the Neighbourhood Ministry, especially Vicki Potter and the late Don Lamb, had undertaken to identify those of our street friends most in need of housing, and were helping them with the needed paperwork. My first ever volunteer effort

with the NM was to help cook a breakfast to encourage people to come for a final blitz of form filling with city workers at the old St. Mark's Church. Through this WANM effort about two dozen homeless people found homes at 17<sup>th</sup> and Dunbar and at 7<sup>th</sup> and Fir. Volunteers with the WANM have continued to volunteer at the Dunbar building since then.

Shortly after this experience I joined one of the outdoor teams and have continued ever since. The distribution of packets, and sometimes clothing, sleeping bags, etc. continues. We meet old friends who are now housed but come out in the hope of finding us. We meet many who are still homeless. The outdoor team remains the first point of contact of the WANM with new people that move onto the streets of our area.

The work of actually connecting the homeless with housing has continued and expanded with the 2017 launch of the Mobile Care Unit, a collaboration of the WANM with the UBC Schools of Medicine and Social Work. Medical and Social Work services are offered at settings of existing community meals. A major focus has been form filling for replacing lost ID and accessing housing. The Mobile Care Unit has not been operating in recent months because of Covid 19. We miss being able to refer those we meet on a Saturday morning outing who express an interest in moving indoors.

After closing down in March, we resumed our street outings with Covid precautions at the end of August. It was so good to be able to go out again. It was great to see some of our old friends, but unfortunately there seem to be more people than ever in need on our streets. This year marks a time of change for the WANM with the retirement of the Potters and the appointment of a new Volunteer and Program Manager.
