WHAT BUSINESS ARE WE IN?

The year is 1910. It is the age of the transatlantic steamer --- big, fast, powerful ships carrying the rock-stars of their day --- the Astors and Morgans --- from North America to Europe and back again. The dominant companies of this day are Cunard and Whitestar. If you had asked their leaders what business they were in, they would likely have responded, "Why, we're in the transatlantic shipping business." As logical as that sounds, however, it was that definition that sealed their fate. Locked into a world view that said the future was about bigger and faster ships, these companies were furiously innovating --- trying to create the biggest engine, more funnels, iceberg-proof hulls. Yet only a few years later a disruptive technology came along, sinking the transatlantic shipping business: the airplane. And with it, the Whitestars and Cunards of the early 20th century disappeared without a ripple.

But what if they had defined their business just a little bit differently? What if they hadn't decided to make up their minds that they were in the transatlantic shipping business, but determined instead that they were in the transatlantic *people moving* business? Things might look very different today.

The transatlantic people moving business has grown every year since 1600, and every indication is that it will continue to grow for the foreseeable future. Had Cunard and Whitestar defined themselves this way, they wouldn't have seen the airplane as competition, but would have seen it for what it was: a massive business transformation opportunity. In fact, they could have invested in research and development of airplanes from the

beginning. The first powered flight could have happened at Whitestar labs in Dorsett, England, and Chuck Yeager could have broken the sound barrier in his slick new Cunard X15. Instead, these once great companies faded into the obscurity of history.

Nike isn't in the shoe business; they're in the business of inspiring the athlete inside all of us. They make shoes, but also make the number one health app for mobile devices. Tesla isn't in the car business but the business of electric mobility. They makes cars, but then build the infrastructure that supports electric mobility of all kinds, into the future. Volvo is in the family safety business, Kellogg's is in the health and wellness business, and Apple dropped the word "computer" from their company nearly a decade ago --- the telltale sign of a company waking up to the business it was really in.

But if you ask that question of the church, what answer will you get? Are we in the religion business? The justice, evangelism, denomination, or worship? What about the community business, or the world-changing business? Jesus' answer for the church is, resoundingly, none of the above. The church, he says, is in the disciple-making business. The last thing he told the church before he left, was a challenge to go make disciples who make disciples.

So, as we move into the second half of 2017, Jan and I wanted to take a moment to introduce this year's theme: the pursuit of discipleship. Over the weeks and months to come, we're going to be exploring this idea in all of its dimensions, and we'll discover together that the path of discipleship winds through the justice, evangelism, worship, community, world-changing, and even religion businesses.

But, in the end, it always comes back to discipleship: making disciples who make disciples.

That's our business.

SPECIAL SERVICES IN MAY

May 7: Katharine Masterton, Justice Ministries program coordinator, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, will be our guest in the pulpit. The Justice Ministries mandate is to work with the courts of the church to fulfill the justice imperatives of the gospel.

Having published numerous books and papers, and working with advanced degree students, his message should be of special interest to our congregation. (Missiology is the area of practical theology that investigates the mandate, message, and mission of the Christian church, especially the nature of missionary work.)

AN UPDATE FROM OUR PRESBYTERY REPRESENTATIVES

THE REV. DR. JEAN MORRIS AND THE REV. DIANNE OLLERENSHAW

It has been a year since the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod appointed us to work with the Session of St. Andrew's in order to call a Minister, Vision and Direction, following the resignation of The Rev. Kevin Lee. While we are still in the process of seeking to call someone to be your minister in this role, much has happened over the past year.

We have met regularly with the Search Team as they have worked diligently to prioritize applications from ministers. They wrote a congregational profile, outlining the key gifts and attributes that St. Andrew's needs in the Minister, Vision and Direction. They have interviewed a number of candidates, and they are still seeking applications. It can seem discouraging to not be able to present a candidate to you for consideration, but the Team is committed to finding the right person to lead St. Andrew's into the future God has for the congregation.

As Presbytery representatives, we had an exit interview with Kevin Lee, and we meet regularly with Jan Hazlett and Jared Miller. These meetings are opportunities to talk about work load, pastoral needs of your ministers, and any concerns they would like to discuss.

The other area of our work has been with the Session. Last June, before the Search Team began its work, the Session struck a Commission of three elders and both of us to clarify the model of ministry. The "flat model" of the three ministers working in different areas as peers is a unique approach to ministry and needed some clarification. The roles of all three ministers were clarified. The Session was charged with a number of responsibilities in order to support the model, including (1) the establishment of a Ministry Accountability Team, (2) the development of a ministry plan to set priorities for the work and witness of St. Andrew's, and (3) the development of a communication plan so that all members and adherents will understand the roles and responsibilities of ministers.

The Session has begun some of this work and recognizes the need to continue fulfilling the recommendations. After a year, it is also time for the Session to review the workloads of Jan and Jared to ensure that ministry areas are prioritized, and that they are providing leadership in the most appropriate ways. The Presbytery has not directed the assignment of roles to Jan and Jared. This is a Session responsibility, and Jan and Jared are part of the Session. The review of work assignments is important at this time, as the search for the third minister is likely to continue for some months. The reality is that there are many vacancies in Presbyterian churches across Canada. In the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod there are seven vacant ministry positions!

We will continue to provide whatever support we can to the Search Team and to the Session of St. Andrew's.
