

The reading of "Imitation of Christ" will be Friday morning this week as the Rector is away on Thursday.

We will continue to learn two new hymn tunes this morning –Hymn 231 with the tune 'Adore Te' and Hymn 222 with the tune Agape. It will take some time for us to get used to these, but it will be worth it!

The Rector's Corner

The Altar and the Living Room

Front and center in the Church is the Lord's Table, also called the Altar. Both words convey a certain meaning to us: we sit and eat at the kitchen table; and we know that in ancient times, sacrifices were made on altars. So God invites us, His children, to eat at His Table. He also calls us to His Altar to remember the Sacrifice of His Son.

The words of administration in the Holy Communion acknowledge both aspects – the eating and the remembering. In the eating part, the Church attempts to imitate exactly what the Lord Jesus did and said when He ate the Passover Meal (the Last Supper) on the night before His Crucifixion. That is, although He took bread, when He gave it to the apostles, He said, "Take, eat: this is my *Body*"; and similarly with the Cup. Although it was wine, He said, "This is my *Blood* of the new testament". (St. Mark 14. 22, 24) And so, the Church uses unleavened bread, and one Cup, as Jesus did; and both are administered using His words.

In addition to the physical actions of eating and drinking, there is a spiritual feeding. We are remembering what God has done for us in Christ; but we are not just recalling a memory, we are "feeding on Him by faith". Jesus spoke of this in the Gospel appointed for Harvest Thanksgiving. "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst". (St. John 6.35)

The 'coming' and 'believing' which Jesus spoke of are the result of admitting our need as sinners, and accepting His assistance as Saviour. And so we leave our seat, and approach the Table, put out our hands with faith and trust that the Lord will forgive us, strengthen us and refresh us in soul and body unto eternal life.

And here's the thing: in coming to the Holy Communion, we believe that the Lord will meet us and minister to us. He has given us this Holy Meal – the Church did not invent it. And, He has told us what is involved: "This is my Body and this is my Blood...". Therefore, we come in faith, without being able to understand or define the

Mystery of His grace. We simply trust that our Heavenly Father, Who gave His only-begotten Son to die for us, loves us and wants to heal us.

When asked what she believed about the Holy Communion, Queen Elizabeth I (1533-1603) gave this response: "Twas God the Word that spake it, He took the Bread and brake it: And what that Word did make it, That I believe and take it."

In her 'Meditation on how to discern the Lords Body in the Blessed Sacrament', she said a bit more:

"In not discerning what his Body is, Our Souls are rob'd of everlasting Bliss. We must believe the Words of him, who said, This is my Body, when he gave the Bread... We are made One with him in Holy Union, When we in Faith receive the Blest Communion. In Commemoration of his bitter Passion, Who shed his Blood to purchase our Salvation; We on his Merits must depend alone, Sufficient 'tis that Merit we have none: Nor can there any other Name be given To save us, but by him who sits in Heaven.... His Blessed Body Heaven must contain, Where He a King eternally doth Reign: Until the Restitution of all, Then we with him and Angels ever shall, S ing Allelujahs in their Hierarchie; For where He is, there must his Servants be."

As we continue in the orange phase of this pandemic, everyone is grappling with a new normal – one that challenges our faith and practice – especially in receiving the Holy Communion. May I suggest that we all (whether attending on-line or in person) consider this rubric, written in italics, at the top of page 584 in the Prayer Book:

"But if a man,...by any ... just impediment, do not receive the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood: he shall be instructed that if he do truly repent him of his sins, and stedfastly believe that Jesus Christ hath suffered death upon the Cross for him, and shed his Blood for his redemption, earnestly remembering the benefits he hath thereby, and

giving him hearty thanks therefor; he doth eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ profitably to his soul's health, although he do not receive the Sacrament with his mouth."

Finally, please know that I would be glad to come, masked and sanitized (in a Haz Mat suit!), to administer the Holy Communion: however, whenever and wherever you may feel safe and comfortable.

October 2020 Vestry Meeting Briefs

- St. George's Church held a virtual vestry meeting via Zoom on October 14, 2020.
- The Finance Committee reported that revenue from January 1 to September 30, 2020 was \$183,298 with expenses totalling \$17,5635. Vestry is thankful to all parishioners who have continued with their weekly donations using other means of delivery.
- The Property Committee reported that the Bell Tower, elevator roof and chapel steps repairs are nearly completed.
- The ceiling in the vestibule now requires some repair.
- The old Boyer Stone has been cut and moved to the church basement. It will be moved to the main Church for All Saints Day with a dedication in Memory of Dawn Nelson.
- Vestry continues to update the Livestreaming System. The main camera is now attached to the Rood Screen along with individual microphones for better audio. There are two more cameras on order.
- Vestry was informed that there is an interest in pursuing the Ministry of Presence.
- Vestry held an initial early stage discussion on enhancing our side lawn to be "a green area" thus encouraging environmentally conscious behaviour.
- The next Vestry Meeting will be held on Monday November 9, 2020.
