We are on a journey of learning to be a welcoming, inviting, inclusive and serving community which is open to all.

Our worship reflects our rootedness in the Anglican tradition, whilst drawing on liturgies that reflect the long history and heritage of our Christian faith. Please join in as you feel able, and enjoy the words, music and opportunity for prayer and to be a part of our community.

If our service seems unfamiliar, please follow the cues from our leaflet, the ministers leading the service and those around you. Most of our Sunday morning worship services have the Eucharist, or Holy Communion, at the heart of our worship – please feel free to join us, whatever your tradition, in the sharing of bread and wine. Gluten free wafers are available: Please indicate if you need one.

Within the Anglican Church of Canada (under the advice of the Primate and the Chief Medical Officer for Canada) we would ask that bread is not dipped into the wine, as this has the potential to spread infection in a way that the sharing of the cup does not. If you would prefer not to share the cup then receiving only bread is considered 'full communion' (also known as 'Communion in One Kind').

If there is anything that you wish to talk about, please do take the opportunity to talk to the worship leaders, ministers and other members of the congregation following the service. If you wish to receive prayer for yourself or for another, there will be members of our Healing Prayer group in the south Quadra entrance who would be happy to pray with you as the Holy Communion is shared.

After our service we usually share coffee and an opportunity to get to know one another, in the Church Hall – through the door on the front left hand side. We have many visitors and newcomers here so please make yourself known to folks as you feel comfortable.

You are very welcome here. We don't always get it right; please let us know when we do, and when we don't. Please stay and be a part of our family, for however long you would like.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION



READINGS FOR MARCH 8TH – THE SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

Genesis 12:1-4a God calls Abraham, promising blessings, and Abraham responds in faith. Psalm 121 God offers constant presence and care for us as we journey through life. Romans 4:1-5, 13-17 Paul teaches that God chose Abraham not because he had done all the right things but because he trusted God's promises. John 3:1-17 Jesus challenges Nicodemus to take up a new life that sees, hopes and believes in God's creative, transforming power.

The five Sundays before Passion Sunday will have a Water Rite at the beginning of the Eucharist. The purpose of the Rite is to draw attention to the sacredness of water within our faith tradition. This also goes along with Bishop Logan's request that we study the book, Watershed Discipleship.

Water is considered a primordial element of creation. This means that it existed prior to the Creation Story found in the first chapter of Genesis. The other primordial element is wind. Scripture is rich with references to water. We know that water is essential for life and without water there is no life. The springs, streams, and rivers are the living waters that allow life to flourish. Water is a sign of God's blessing and to be near restful waters is a gift from God. And as one of the central actions of faith we know that Jesus was baptized in the River Jordan and from those baptismal waters flow our death to selfishness and our birth into God's love and healing. Jesus promises us living water. The New Jerusalem has the stream of living waters flowing through it. Lent is a great time to ponder the blessing of water.



Lent, Holy Week, Easter at St. John the Divine

Throughout Lent

Watershed Discipleship

This thought-provoking and substantial book will be the basis of our study over Lent. Edited by Ched Myers, it is a collection of writings encouraging us to 'do theology and live faithfully where we are' – particularly considering the importance of the Watershed in the flourishing of human beings, We won't be reading the whole book, but looking at some of key stories within the book from different authors.



Wednesdays beginning March 4th, until Holy Week

12:15 pm - Lunch With A Point: We will be reading Watershed Discipleship over the course of Lent and be discussing some of the chapters within the book. A lively and thought provoking time over lunch.

7:00 pm - Reel Thought: A movie each Wednesday evening, followed by discussion on the themes and ideas which emerge.

Thursdays from March 5th

5:30 pm - Evening Eucharist: A 30 minute service followed by a shared supper 6:30 pm - Discussion Group: An opportunity for those unable to attend Wednesday lunch to discuss Watershed Discipleship (all are invited to attend the Eucharist and eat together, as well as joining the discussion, or just to come to any part of the evening).

Fridays from 28 February – 3 April

12 *noon* **– 2:00** *pm* **– Open Church**. We would love the Church to be open for silent prayer, and the opportunity to open up our beautiful building – but to do this we need volunteer stewards, at least two per session, please contact Carol-Ann in the office if you feel able to offer.

Also, for our shared lunches/suppers on Wednesdays and Thursdays through Lent it would be great if there were people able to offer soup or chili or something similar for each week – probably for about 20 people each session, or to share with another responsibility for providing for one session. When we have a co-ordinator/co-ordinators for this we will let everyone know, until then please let Carol-Ann know if you might be able to help.

Watershed Discipleship

Each week within Lent we will be hosting 'Lunch With a Point' at 12noon on Wednesdays for an hour and a half, and a discussion following the Evening Eucharist at 5:30pm on Thursdays (Eucharist 5:30, Soup/Chili 6pm, Discussion 6:30-8:00pm) — these discussions will be on the book 'Watershed Discipleship' which Bishop Logan has directed us to study over these weeks. If you plan to attend either session please let us know ahead of time. Here's a summary of the planned study so far.

Week 1

4/5 March – **Foreword** by *Denise Nadeau* (p. ix), **Introduction** by *Ched Myers* (p.1), **Afterword** – **Towards Watershed Ecclesiology** by *Ched Myers* (p.200) – An overall introduction to the ideas behind 'Watershed Discipleship' – quite a heavy read, especially the Ched Myers parts, but worth spending time on.

Week 2

11/12 March – **Chapter 7** - **A Pipeline Runs Through Naboth's Vineyard** (p.121) by *Matt Humphreys* – Matt is a local Anglican Cleric who places the story of Indigenous water protectors in BC in the context of the Bible story of Naboth having his vineyard stolen by King Ahab.

Week 3

18/19 March – **Chapter 1- The Great Commission (**p.25) by *Katerina Friesen* – A very personal story of considering the North American sense of 'rootlessness' in the light of one person's experience with the land and water protectors of the Philippines.

Week 4

25/26 March – **Chapter 10 - Bioregionalism and the Catholic Worker Movement** (p.158) by *Victoria Machado* – exploring the roots of the Catholic Worker movement for social justice, links with Dorothy Day, and considering what it means to be grounded in the place where we live.

Week 5

1/2 April - **Chapter 3 – The Transfigured Earth** (p.60) by *Jonathan McRay* – An exploration of how being rooted in the place we live, the place of the watershed, is the fullest expression of the phrase 'The Kingdom of God'.

Though it would be good to read the chapters before coming – if you're unable to, please come and join in the discussion anyway, it should be a good conversation!



Movie Night -

Wednesday evening this week, **March 4th**, at 7:00 pm Reel Thought will present our first screening for Lent 2020 in the Denson Lounge of St. John the Divine Anglican Church

This Lent we are presenting five screen adaptations of the novels of E.M. Forster. Forster lived until 1970, but all but his last novel (A Passage to India, 1924) were written before the First World War, and are now more than a century old. Their themes and concerns were far ahead of their time, anticipating seismic changes in British society which Forster lived to witness, and which have flowered in the fifty years since his death. Forster's principal characters strive for genuine human connection, and fight against the rules and mores of their society, the strictures and disapproval of their families, and even their own selves, to achieve it.

The man is only a dentist without a good name, and Lilia's relatives are clearly unhappy with her choice. Lilia dies while giving birth to a son, and two relatives travel to Italy to take care of the baby, expecting no trouble from the father." - Written by Mattias Thuresson, IMDb

In Forster's first novel, written in 1905, a visit to Italy both reveals the unbelievable Imperial hubris of the Edwardian middle class and is the catalyst for two of its members to break free and find connection. Particularly with its cast, one could be forgiven for thinking that this film is a Merchant-Ivory production (as our next three films are), but it was actually made by Charles Sturridge and is a worthy adaptation of a powerful story.

Mark your calendars: Reel Thought for Lent will be presented weekly for five weeks, beginning this Wednesday, March 4th, and running through the Wednesday before Holy Week, April 1st. This year's theme is "only connect," the driving force at the heart of E.M. Forster's six novels: his desire for his characters' parts to be connected and for his characters to be connected to each other. We will present the five novels that have been adapted for the screen, in the order in which they were written.

Living the questions

During Lent, we – with our Cathedral, St. Mary Oak Bay, St. Matthias Fairfield, St. George Cadboro Bay, and others, will have the opportunity for a refresher course, or an update, on the theological groundings of Progressive Christianity, particularly as expressed in our Anglican tradition. The Dean is describing this as 'Confirmation Reboot.'

This five week course is based on the excellent book 'Living the Questions' and will be taking place on consecutive Saturdays **starting on Saturday, March 7**th, and will have speakers from all of our Parishes and more! Each week will deal with two themes during the course of a morning (9am until noon) and will end with lunch together. There will also be the option of taking part in a Watershed Discipleship seminar with one of the authors within the book – see below!

The cost is \$60 for the full course, including a copy of the book and lunches for the five weeks – for those who are using this as their preparation for confirmation or to be received into the Anglican Church from another tradition, this also includes bringing a sponsor/companion to accompany you through the journey. This is a great opportunity to hear some up-to-date theological and spiritual thinking, to discuss what is at the heart of our shared journey and spend some quality time with fellow wanderers on this wonderful faith path!


