



- NEW ITEMS ONLY, PLEASE
- REMOVE ALL SALES TAGS and pin mitts and socks together

Household items: sheets (cotton or flannelette), blankets, pillowcases, towels, face cloths, dish cloths and towels, aprons, curtains, tablecloths. Dried rice or pasta may also be sent north this year.

Clothing: Men's and women's cargo pants, cords (all sizes, especially large), underwear (especially adult sizes), sweaters, nightwear, work socks, gloves, mitts (thermos or ski). Kids PJs are always wanted.

Baby clothes: layettes, sweaters, bonnets, nighties, vests, jumpsuits, receiving blankets, diapers, sleepers, warm outer clothing, bedding, and SMALL unbreakable supplies. Baby bottles, small bowls, drinking cups, diaper cream are all useful.

Knitted articles: children and adults – sweaters, mitts, socks, gloves, neck warmers, baby wool.

Sundries: material (3-4 yards) - cotton, corduroy, or fleece; sewing items; beads, zippers, thread

Hospital visit bags: For visits to the hospital (usually a trip by air), cloth bags approx. 10x15 inches with a drawstring. Include 1 soap, 1 deodorant, a few bandages, comb, 1 toothbrush, small toothpaste, 1 brush, and perhaps some hairpins, barrettes, etc. No mouthwash or perfumes or heavily scented products please. Hospitals usually have a no scent policy these days.

Children's toys: small, flat, light items (e.g., small stuffed toys, games, puzzles, paints, crayons, paint/colouring books, dolls, balls, other small trucks and games). NO ENGLISH BOOKS, PLEASE.

Women's personal items: Feminine hygiene items, pads, tampons.

After you purchase your 'bargains', please total the <u>non-sale</u> value of your donations. Report the value of your purchases, but PLEASE REMOVE ALL PRICE TAGS before they come to Bale Packing Day. If you have any questions, email acw@ottawa.anglican.ca.

Our incumbent Bishop Michael Bird was in attendance, along with Rev. Matthew; together they co-chaired the meeting.

The most exciting motion put forth was that Holy Trinity Anglican Church agree to join the Parish of Valley area ministry. We have experienced Valley Sundays, have been introduced to the clergy team, and have gotten to know parishioners from the areas of Combermere, Eganville, Stafford/Whitewater, and Petawawa. We have worked out corporate matters and will remain autonomous in terms of the governance and financial affairs of our churches, but we will share together in ministry and teaching. We seem to have the "best" of both worlds; and our church, and the others, are running smoothly. 
Coffee Hour & Fellowship
