

"Wins and losses don't matter; all that matters is following the quest."

Don Quixote to Aldonza in *Man of La Mancha*

- * In our present story (the only story of Jesus' youth) we see Jesus on a quest – a quest to know his 'Father' in heaven
- * It is located within an actual journey of his family to Jerusalem from Nazareth (v41-42)



I. A Quest Moulded in Piety

A Lived Piety

- * We have seen the dedication of Jesus in the temple at 8 days old (v21)
- * Now we learn that the holy family went up to Jerusalem each year for Passover (v41)

A Nurturing Environment

- * At this point Jesus is 12 years old; one year before his 'bar mitzvah' to become a 'son of the law'
- * The family is following the Torah where all of life is shaped by their faith an environment of piety no division between private and secular

For you, O Lord, are my hope, my trust, O Lord, from my youth. Upon you I have leaned from my birth; it was you who took me from my mother's womb. My praise is continually of you.

Psalm 71:5-6

O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds. So even to old age and grey hairs, O God, do not forsake me, until I proclaim your might to all the generations to come. Your power and your righteousness, O God, reach the high heavens.

A Framework for Us

- i. A wholistic faith: less division between secular and religious sectors (Romans 12:1-2)
- ii. Parents responsibility to nurture children's faith: an intentional modelling



II. A Quest Shaped by Wisdom

Jesus' Quest

- * Jesus stays behind after the festival ends on a quest to know God more (v43)
- * Luke tells us that he sits with the religious leaders 'asking and answering questions' (v46-47)

Jesus' Enquiring Mind

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- * Rabbinic style of learning through the use of questions
- * An emerging sense of self for Jesus

The Precociousness of Jes

- * All are amazed at his knowledge (v47)
- * There is a hunger in Jesus to know God
- * We note the use of 'wisdom' two times (v40,52) as it frames the story

Waiting in Advent **\lambda**

- * The hunger to know God speaks to the 'waiting' and desire for God seen in Advent
- * To wait upon God for his coming not to get lost in the trivial
- * It speaks of our deepest yearnings (Philipians 3:10)

"The thing is to understand myself, to see what God wishes me to do; the thing is to find a truth which is true for me, to find the idea for which I can live and die" (Kierkegaard). To find an idea, a cause, a purpose around which I can construct a life.

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III. A Quest Shaped by Relationship

- * After 3 days Jesus is found in the temple by his parents
- * Mary scolds Jesus (v48) we have been so anxious for you; your father and I have been anxious

Jesus' Response



- * "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" (v49) – about my Father's interests
- * Jesus growing awareness of a relationship with the Father
- * What we see is Jesus himself claiming a relationship with God
- * Before others spoke angels, magi, shepherds, Simeon/Anna
- * Now Jesus speaks for himself about the Father

Two Observations



- I. Tension is created concerning Jesus' quest
- His parents do not understand (seen later also in Mark 3:33-34)
- His choice creates a crisis in the family – the crisis of belief
- Simeon's prophecy: "For the falling and rising of many"

- II. Jesus returns home with his parents in obedience (submission)
 - A sign of humility, littleness
 - He went down to Nazareth



- * Our quest for God may feel routine or unspectacular
- * The quest for God continues even in hiddenness
- * Advent is about our call; our invitation to worship God to know him better even as Jesus modelled
