

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How shall we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?

Just like every facet of life inside and outside the Cathedral, things look a little different this year. Every spring we look forward to planning two months of exciting, diverse, and often elaborate music to feature throughout the summer. While this year will be equally exciting and diverse (perhaps even more so!), we have adapted to new guidelines. As a result, the 2020 Festival can be thought of as a study in chamber music!

So, what can we expect from this study in Sacred Chamber Music? Expect music that will continue to resonate with everyone. The Vancouver Children's Choir will be represented by a quartet of soloists, we will hear a 20th century French Mass setting for solo voice, and Marcus Mosely & Friends will present Songs of Freedom. In celebration of Beethoven's 250th birthday, we'll discover sacred arrangements of favourite chamber works, and we'll hear just how much can be accomplished with much sparser writing.

An important and unique feature of this year's Festival is that it will be available via livestream on the <u>Cathedral's website</u> and <u>YouTube channel</u>. We invite you to continue to join us at the 10:30am livestreamed Sunday services throughout July and August for this marvellous Cathedral tradition. We will experience the joy and the sorrow, and the comfort and the consolation that Sacred Music in this space can bring.



As many of us know, Johann Sebastian Bach (1685–1750) was responsible for writing a cantata each week during his time at the Thomas-kirche in Leipzig. Most are scored for a choir, soloists, and an instrumental ensemble, but a handful are for solo voices, with obligato instruments, instead of large bands! BWV 158, which likely dates from 1726, is one of those—scored for solo bass, with a central aria accompanied by a florid violin part (although scholars wonder if, due to its evasion of the lower range of the instrument, it was originally scored for flute). As I mentioned a few weeks ago, I was drawn during this Summer Festival to music which brought comfort to me in troubled times; this cantata is a remarkable example of that. Throughout the piece, the refrain "Peace be with you" comes back time and time again, and in particular, in the first recitative, Bach sets the words (by an unknown author) "my heart, why are you so troubled, when your God loves you, through Christ?" While the cantata was composed for the Tuesday after Easter and references the Purification—it seems perfect for a global pandemic.

Johann Christoph Bach (1642–1703), the son of J.S. Bach's first cousin (once removed), and also the uncle of J.S. Bach's first wife (and second cousin), belongs firmly to the previous generation of German composers. We'll sing excerpts from his cantata *Meine Freundin*, *du bist schön* a marriage cantata dating from around 1676, with texts heavily drawn from the *Song of Solomon*. The stunning centrepiece is an aria for soprano and violin—as the singer walks through the garden (over a repeated *chaconne* bass), the violin illustrates the beautiful flowers and sustaining beauties which love can offer us. The cantata closes with elaborate violin flourishes on top of a chorale melody, inviting us to give thanks for all the gifts God has given us.

This is the last week you'll see my wife, Lucy, and I singing this summer—it is a constant source of joy and comfort for us to be able to make music in this place, and I hope our musical offerings have been able to offer you something in these troubled times. Next week, a quartet of women from the Cathedral Choir will be led by Cathedral Choir soprano Kim Hardy.

Notes from the Rev. Alisdair Smith

AUGUST 23, 2020

I do hope you are enjoying this spate of warmer weather, even in the midst of these strange times. This Sunday's readings cannot be heard or read without commenting on the women whose ingenuity and guile saved children's lives and particularly, the life of Moses. I'll be preaching about this in greater detail at the 5:30pm St. Brigid's service on Zoom on Sunday, August 23, but there is so much embedded in these verses, I'd like to offer one thought in this week's Notes.

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As always, we need to dive into the Hebrew language to get a broader and deeper view. It may be helpful to imagine that reading the Hebrew Bible in English is like looking at a two-dimensional drawing. We might be able to use techniques to perceive a third dimension but learning more about the Hebrew and even knowing Hebrew means we are looking at a three-dimensional sculpture. We move from a painting of David, to Michelangelo's sculpture of David, and the result is likely awe.

One example: in our reading today of Exodus, we are told that a woman gives birth to a son, and in the midst of a genocide, hides him in a "basket" and places him in the reeds on the river. The baby's sister stays to watch over him. That is the two-dimensional, initial view. But watch what happens when we learn that the word Hebrew word *Tevah* translated as "basket" in the Bible we use most often, is also the word used for Ark, as in Noah's Ark. 1 Moses' mother fashioned an Ark for her son. As we look at this three-dimensional perspective, we see links to Noah's Ark, as well as foreshadowing the narrative of Exodus. Just as humanity was saved by an Ark, now the people of Israel will be saved by an Ark and floating among the reeds foretells the liberation of the Hebrew people through the "Sea of Reeds" or what we mistakenly call the Red Sea. I am awestruck!

I wonder what this fresh perspective on this story might change for you and your hearing this story?
