Start Your Year With Gratefulness

"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. His love endures forever." Psalm 136:1



The Coldest Night of the Year



Join the CHILL team (Christians Helping Individuals Lift Lives)

Our fourth annual Coldest Night of the Year Walk is on February 25th. This 2, 5, or 10 km hike is a fundraiser for Feed the Hungry, Bankview Apartments and the Mustard Seed. You can sign up to walk or donate at www.thechillteam.com

Bankview apartments (sister project to Acadia Place) is a project that supports housing first, a successful model that places people in a home with the supports they require to live a long and prosperous life. Located in southeast Calgary, Acadia Place, which is owned by <u>Calgary Homeless Foundation</u> and operated by CUPS, has a blend of single adults, couples and families, with the majority being families who were experiencing homelessness or were at extreme risk of becoming homeless. KAIROS Calgary, an ecumenical Social Justice initiative in Calgary, is currently fundraising for the mortgage on Bankview (as we did last year for Acadia Place). Funds raised from CNOY will support this effort.

<u>Feed the Hungry</u> (FTH) is a Sunday Night dinner program offering a sit down meal in St. Mary's Hall in downtown Calgary. A ministry of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Calgary, *each week FTH offers 500 guests a three course dinner that is served by volunteers.* FTH is intentional about creating an atmosphere of dignity and welcome. Proceeds will support the ongoing needs of the program.

<u>The Mustard Seed</u> is non-denominational Christian charity that builds community, grows hope and supports change. It has been impacting and changing lives for more than 30 years. With support from donors and volunteers, the organization provides food, clothing and shelter to men and women who are experiencing poverty and homelessness in Calgary. It also helps them find homes and jobs and improve their overall health – physically, mentally and spiritually. Proceeds will be used to provide meals, employment coaching, and housing assistance.

Also, don't forget to mark your calendar for February 12th between Services to purchase baked goods in support of the CHILL team.

Refugee Sponsorship Update

"Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod"

Matthew 2: 14-15a

We think about this little family all the time. Joseph and Mary and their precious new baby travelling to an unfamiliar place. This wasn't really what they had in mind for their lives: always worried about safety, trying to learn a new language or dialect, finding work to support themselves in a foreign place. We can see them everywhere today, on the streets of Calgary, in the shelters, in our country and all around the world in the faces of men, women and children who are seeking refuge, renewal and a fresh start to life.





Early in 2016, The SW Conference Refugee Mission, Lutheran churches in the Calgary area, came together to support a young refugee family from Syria. The Aldakkak family of four arrived in early September and are settling into life in Canada. They are learning English and exploring opportunities for employment. They have discovered friends from Syria in Calgary and have met new Canadian and Syrian friends. The two little boys are growing confident and happy. Zuheir, the father in the family, is an experienced professional chef and has already provided a catered lunch for the congregation at Advent Lutheran and dinners to various folks at Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, as well as friends from his English classes. They, a Muslim family, have visited a number of our Lutheran churches, hoping to share their gratefulness, even though our language and customs are still unfamiliar. The SW Mission and the Canadian Government will help to support the family in terms of living expenses until August 2017. Support as friends will continue long after that date.

God has a way of putting surprises at our doorstep, things we cannot ignore. Then He gives us the tools to handle those surprises. One of the translators we were led to, a young man named Hussam, is this kind of surprise. Hussam has given freely of his time so often, to offer translation between the Aldakkak family and we, their Canadian sponsors. He has become a good friend to the family, as well. Just before Christmas we learned that Hussam and his family (parents, 3 brothers and a sister-in-law) arrived in Canada in February with nothing. In Syria, Hussam was an assistant university professor, his brother an engineer, his sister-in-law a pharmacist. They have been working in coffee shops and restaurants, trying to make enough money to survive here. They do not have the support, financial or friendship, of sponsors. A call was put out to various congregations and the family has received much help, financial and otherwise, from many of our members. They have become friends to many and are more than grateful for this support. They, a Christian family, shared Christmas Eve with the LCOS congrega-



tion. The decision has been made that we, as the SW Conference Mission, continue to support them through friendship, employment connections, resources, language learning and possibly financially as need arises.

Refugee Sponsorship Update

When the Aldakkak family arrived at the airport, we brought along a young Syrian man to help us translate. Bassel has become a friend to the Aldakkak family as well and, having been in Canada for a few years, is setting up a catering business that will specialize in Mediterranean Food. Folks from All Saints, Hope and LCOS have provided valuable business and catering information resources for him. This is a venture that will use the skills of Zuheir, as chef, as well as others new to our city with culinary skills. Bassel had his first Canadian turkey at Christmas with one of our families this year!



Our work together, as the SW Conference Refugee Mission, continues. There are a number of areas of need, as we continue to support our new friends. And, as we get to know these families, we meet others who become friends or acquaintances and who can use our help. We are reminded how much we, as Canadians, have and how much we could possibly give.

1. Transportation – although all of these folks are adept at public transportation, there comes a time when a car is going to open up new worlds for them and help them access new learning and employment opportunities. There are a number of families that need a car now. If you become aware of a decent vehicle that is not needed, is for sale, is ready for a new home – please let us know.

2. Employment – Gainful employment of any kind can be fulfilling and is economically necessary. Being employed in a field that is of interest to you or matches your area of training is ideal. However, work is work and we know that folks will take any kind of work in order to provide for their family. Employment of any kind is always needed in our refugee community. Also consider these areas of expertise that are represented in our own refugee community: culinary - professional chef, assistant chemistry professor, electrical engineer, medical supply company administrator, pharmacist, hairdressing/nail work, elder care. Again, let us know if you have any opportunities for employment or would be willing to help someone in a job search.

3. Financial support of the SW Conference Refugee Mission – this group will continue to support the Aldakkak family through the Private Sponsorship Program along with the Canadian Government. Although we have raised almost enough funds to cover our commitment to the Aldakkak family, we are beginning to discuss the ways in which we might be called to continue to support the refugee community of our world, perhaps supporting another family at some point. The SW Conference Mission will gratefully continue to receive donations and will consider at a later time what financial support can be provided to other refugee families.

Acadia Community Update

Volunteers Needed to Help the Acadia Neighbourhood

Seven areas for social development emerged during the process of conducting a neighbourhood social strategy (community plan). These are: Social Isolation & Connectedness, Safety, Developing Financial Capacity, Inclusion & Diversity, Meeting basic needs/food security, Affordable/Accessible childcare, Affordable housing.

The following are some of proposed ideas to address these needs. We need your help in turning these ideas into action.

A Neighbourhood Welcoming Program

Creating handouts with list of what's in the neighbourhood; list of resources for people on low income, for immigrants, Indigenous people. Volunteers needed to help a resident organize this. Also translators needed in Spanish & Tagalog

Community Indigenous Family Event Event is for the whole community, celebrating

indigenous traditions. Volunteers needed to help plan the event. Indigenous residents from Acadia Place will be organizing.

A Clothing Exchange Event at Acadia Place Volunteers needed to organize this, along with Acadia Place residents.

Multicultural Cooking at Francis Klein

For isolated immigrant seniors living in a seniors complex. Seniors will be the "teaching" others how to cook food from their country of origin. Need volunteers to organize the sessions (3-4).

Employment Networking Fair Event

To support people needing to improve skills, get jobs. Volunteers needed to organize this.

Adopt a Grandparent Program

Volunteers needed to create, organize a program to support isolated seniors in the community. Would be working with already established programs.



Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has its roots in the beginning of the last century. Interestingly, both evangelical and mainline movements were a part of the uptake of the Week from the beginning.

The Week of Prayer began fairly recently (the 1960's) in Calgary and Southern Alberta. Like the originators , and all the Christians praying during the Week, the focus is on our unity is the person of Jesus Christ: "that they may all be one, just as you,



Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me," (Jn. 17:21). This year's theme for the Week comes from Germany and is: "Reconciliation – the love of Christ compels us" and focusses on the theme of the 500th Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation.

Why have a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity?

There are many reasons to have a Week specifically devoted towards Christian Prayer for unity: (1) Jesus himself prayed for unity in the Church and noted that unity would be understood by the world as a sign that Jesus is truly who he said he was: both God and Man (Jn. 17:23), (2) We are baptised into the Church of Christ, and the Church of Christ only. Therefore we already are a part of a family. Don't all families work better when we pray for and love each other? (1 Cor. 1) (3) Like all problems we have in life (and we clearly have not met Jesus' perfect standard of church unity, Jn. 17:23), prayer is essential to them being solved.

How can I pray with Christians I disagree with?

Even the apostles disagreed with each other sometimes (Gal. 2:11-14). We also know that they prayed and discussed with other during these hard times. They also knew that they agreed on the essentials: that Jesus was the Son of God, one with the Father, and that he died for our sins. Prayer was a part of their reconciliation.



Stewardship

LCOS thanks all who participated in the annual Stewardship program 'Live Simply' in November, 2016.

A total of 77 pledges have been received for 2017 pledging a total of \$207,020 for 2017. This compares to last year where there were 78 pledges received committing a total of \$209,754. This is a 1.30% decrease in the amount pledged.

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.

Amounts from PAR can be directed to:

- 1) The LCOS general budget
- 2) Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR)
- 3) Capital Maintenance
- You can give additional amounts and to other purposes via your regular donation envelopes.
- The minimum amount to give via this program is a total of \$50.00 per month.

You can sign up, make banking or donation amount changes, or withdraw from the program at any time. These changes will be effective the month following the submission of the change. Forms are available to process these changes. The program is administered by the Financial Secretary. Authorization forms are available in the Place of Welcome.

Internet e-transfers & PayPal are also available!
