With God There Is No Double Jeopardy

There is in human law a rule known as double jeopardy. A man cannot be held twice for the same transgression. A Provincial judge, for instance, cannot ask of him a penalty, and a Federal judge ask another for the same transgression.

This same principle is in effect in divine jurisprudence. God can-not ask for a second payment for the same transgression. The Bible declares that God placed all our sins upon Christ and Christ paid the penalty in full. There is, therefore, full forgiveness of sin. To those that receive forgiveness there can be no further penalty for sin. The apostle Paul declared this truth saying:

"He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things? Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth" (Romans 8:32-33).
