

From Our Pastor

Beloved, grace and peace to you. In a few weeks, I'll be leaving for my Sabbatical, which means that things will be a little different for our community for the next three months. Of course, with the pandemic, LOTS of things are a little different for us right now, but at least I can tell you a little bit about what to expect during my Sabbatical.



In my absence, staff and volunteers will be handling everything that I normally do. Shari and Sr. Ann will be providing pastoral care to members in crisis or with health concerns and taking turns leading worship. Shari will also be taking the lead in the area of worship, and Sr. Ann will be handling our educational and faith formation ministries. Because they will be doing these things in addition to performing their normal roles, the Council has authorized them to work extra hours through this summer.

Other responsibilities of mine will be done by volunteers. Our Personnel Committee will be checking in with staff and making sure any issues are addressed, and I am very pleased that several folks have stepped forward to handle the technical aspects of streaming worship. It is my hope that this can continue to be volunteer led when I return.

One question that's come up is who will make major decisions while I am gone. Although it may seem like the pastor is "in charge," the reality is that this is the job of the Church Council. It has always been the Council's job to make these big decisions on behalf of the congregation, and they will continue to do so in my absence. After spending this long working with them, I have every confidence that they will continue to fulfill that task admirably.

While I am gone, I will be attending two directed retreats, meaning that part of my time will be spent with a spiritual director who will help guide me through thinking and praying about my sense of call. I have a long list of books that I hope to read, including "The Enneagram: A Christian Perspective" by Richard Rohr and Andreas Ebert; "A Failure of Nerve" by Edwin Friedman; "Spiritual Defiance" by Robin Myers; and "Keeping the Sabbath Wholly" by Marva Dawn. I intend to use these books and others to guide me in this intentional time of reflection to grow as a person and as a pastor.

One of the hardest and most important parts of this Sabbatical is being totally removed from the congregation. Although much of my time will be here in Gig Harbor (due to the pandemic), I will not be joining you for worship, I will not be available to answer questions, and I will not be making pastoral calls. This will be strange for me as well as you. This separation does not mean that I do not care for you all; I care deeply for each and every one of you, and that is why I am taking this time away. In order for me to be able to be the best pastor I can be for you, I am taking this time when I can intentionally set all my other responsibilities aside and focus on the important work that too often gets pushed aside to make time for the day-to-day work of pastoring. RACIAL JUSTICE STATEMENT



Congratulations Zane Boothby!

I am honored to be asked to write this piece following my graduation from DePaul University in Chicago. I spent much of my childhood growing up at ADLC and I remember that time fondly as I was captivated by the many interesting and intelligent people in the church who surrounded me with their different ideas and viewpoints but were brought together through worship, fellowship and community. Some qualities I observed from members at ADLC were the desire of lifelong learning, curiosity, and growth. One particular aspect at Agnus Dei that shaped me greatly was the quality of the music. I began playing in handbell choir as well as singing in the adult choir at a young age, and was always greeted with encouraging support despite my lack of experience. My musical upbringing through church supplemented my childhood piano lessons and later involvement in band programs at school. Once I was in high school, I became in-



volved playing trombone with the Tacoma Youth Symphony, which opened up many musical possibilities for me and introduced the vast repertoire of the symphony orchestra. This experience totally captivated me and I soon decided I wanted to pursue a career in music. Around the same time in high school, I had taken some organ lessons from Shari Shull which was possible through a generous scholarship from the Tacoma Chapter of the AGO (American Guild of Organists), and became interested in the pipe organ and how such a seemingly complex instrument was built. The instrument at ADLC was very new at the time and I had many interesting conversations about organ building with Bruce Shull, who helped build the instrument. One thing led to another, and I was soon visiting the shop where the instrument was constructed in Tacoma, WA. After multiple short visits over a couple of months and my persistent interest, the owner of the company, Paul Fritts, agreed to take me on as an apprentice for a two week trial period in the summer of 2012 where I helped with the installation of a new organ for St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Tucson, AZ. Shortly after the trial period I had been offered a job to work for Paul Fritts and Co. Organ builders in the woodshop. I realized there was still much to learn, as there were many things I didn't yet understand about the pipe organ but I took this as an exciting opportunity for me to work hard and to learn and constantly desire to do my best. What began as a very unique summer job while in high school, I continued to work at the organ shop as I studied music in college while earning a Bachelor's Degree in Trombone Performance from Central Washington University in 2018. I then had the opportunity to attend graduate school in Chicago studying with some of the foremost brass players in the country, members of the renowned Chicago Symphony Orchestra and Chicago Lyric Opera. I just graduated this June of 2020 earning Master's Degree with distinction from DePaul University. While in Chicago, I was surrounded by an enormous arts scene with almost daily concerts from groups of all kinds. I attended as many concerts as time allowed and this greatly aided and helped me further develop my musical studies. Since my graduation I have moved back to what I will always consider home, the beautiful Pacific Northwest. I now live in Tacoma and have begun working full time at the organ shop and plan to remain in the area permanently as well as playing trombone professionally once it is safe to resume. I now feel as if my life has come full circle now that I have returned home, and I want to take the time to thank everyone who was part of my village at ADLC who helped shape me, and to encourage everyone to continue being good stewards to future generations.

Fritts Organ Project

The Fritts Organ Shop has reopened now that Pierce Co is in Phase II of businesses reopening. Our new organ, Opus 47, is coming together quickly.

I am very excited about the pipe shades that have been carved out of fir. They will be located at the top of the façade pipes. We requested the liturgical symbols of the Lamb of God (Agnus Dei), and symbols of Holy Communion - loaves of bread and a chalice, wheat and grapes. A former colleague of Bruce's in Virginia created the design and a woodcarver from Massachusetts carved the pipe shades.

The windchest for the pedal division is now in place to hold and provide wind to the lowest pipes in the organ. The pedal action that connects the pedal keys to the windchest has also been installed. The bellows for the air that goes to all of the pipes has found its

home in the base of the organ case.



What is going on in your household? Are you in a home with children who are fed up with Zoom and anxious to be connected with their friends in person? Have you been

placed in a high-risk category because of the pandemic? Did you lose your job recently? Are you burdened with financial issues? How are you coping with the things that are troubling you?

There's no doubt that our mental health is suffering due to the COVID-19 pandemic, not to mention so many other issues that have occurred in the year 2020. Let's review what's happened this year since the onset of the pandemic:

COVID-19 showed up in the states in late February, although we now know that it was sneaking around and infecting individuals before then. After the outbreak was detected in Kirkland, a lockdown was inevitable for our state. Washington kept its lockdown status much longer than many other states, a decision which has proved to be beneficial to this state's people. County by county, we are now opening up businesses and resuming our shopping, travel, and recreation activities.

However, as I write this article, a surge of cases has occurred in Yakima County, causing a burden to the local hospitals there and creating a need to transfer COVID-19 patients elsewhere in the state. We know that many southern and western states that opened their businesses and beaches too soon, without proper protocols, are finding that their outbreaks are spiraling.

It looks like the COVID-19 virus is going keep raising its ugly, spiked, crown-like head for some time. How do we navigate a traumatic event like this ,which has many aspects of trauma?

Financial/Job Anxiety

For those of you who were employed but have now lost your jobs, it may feel like your lives are spinning out of control. It's important to realize that you are not living your whole life at this moment. Life never stays the same. Things will change. Accept what is, calm your body, breathe.

Once you are calm, you can focus on what you can or can't do. You can't change the employment situation right now. You can't change the economy. But you *can* think about your strengths and how they might work to reinvent yourself. Remaining calm is imperative. To move forward, you have to be calm.

Relationship Stress

Those of you who are retired don't have job anxiety, but you may find yourselves with more relationship stresses. The over-65 age group, considered the highest risk group during this pandemic, is still cautioned to stay at home and only shop during the limited early hours.

Many of you seniors are spending more time at home than you ever have before. If you are one of the lucky couples, you have already learned how to give each other the space you both need to live together in a healthy household.

Some of you other seniors may be struggling with your stay-at-home lives. It helps your mental framework to be more patient and generous, first with yourself and then with your partner. It's always helpful to reframe any difficult situation, to think of it as an opportunity to learn more about yourself and the person you are sharing your life with. It is possible that there are aspects of your partner that you didn't know about before. Are you using this time to explore those discoveries? For you mobile seniors, it's summer and you can go outdoors for separate walks, or even walks together, where you can exercise away the day's stresses! (continued)

Parental Overload

If you are a parent, you may be struggling with parental overload. It is not easy when you are trying to take care of your child or children while you are trying to work from home. Children are much smarter, emotionally, than we think they are. They pick up on household stress, whether it's verbalized or not. So, it's probably better to verbalize it in a controlled, exploratory way. Let them in on your concerns before the concerns become an outburst. Talk with them. Ask them questions. Listen.

Basically, as a parent, you have to find pockets of joy where you can recharge yourself. Whenever possible, daily, find time for yourself. Work in your garden. Go for a walk. Catch up with a friend by phone or in an email or letter.

Staying Vigilant

Now that some of the stressors have been identified, we need to stay vigilant, finding what works to relieve our anxieties. Some people are resilient and have the inherent ability to recover from difficult setbacks, to adapt and move forward. These people even experience growth in times like this.

The rest of us are going to struggle with stress. Not everyone can afford to be, or even wants to be, in a room with a mental health professional. You have other options. One practical option is to reach out and find a family member or a friend to give you support. A long conversation with a good listener is one of the most therapeutic things you can do for yourself.

Another option is a website called *Head Space*, where you are given tools and resources to look after your own mental health through meditation, relaxation exercises, and even sleeping tips, to name just a few of what is offered at the site.

Gwen, our very own parish nurse, is a daily user of *Head Space*. Ask her how many hours she has clocked in with this website over the years. She suggests starting with a 10-minute wake-up session so you can see what it's like. Another website called *Calm* offers similar mental health strategies. *Head Space* is free to those who are unemployed right now. Otherwise, the annual fee is \$69.99, or \$5.83 per month.

As I look out my window, finishing this essay, the sun is out. It's finally summer. Even though you may have had to cancel some summer events, you can still enjoy these beautiful northwest summer months. Look for opportunities to get you and your family through this unsettling time. You will find ways to cope, and when you are on the other side of this pandemic, you will be stronger.

jects will be provided. Coordinate with me, Don, at (415) 676-9811. God's work is always rewarding.




