Pentecost Sunday, May 31, 2020

Dear Sisters and Brothers at St Andrew's, Grace and peace in the name of Jesus!

Today is a festival, the third great festival in the life of the church: Pentecost! We sometimes declare that this is the birthday of the Church! We wear red in celebration! We sing joyous songs in thanksgiving! Even when our hearts are heavy from the extended time apart from each other and the dark pall of racism and violence that distresses us, we continue in the hope of the Resurrection and now in the gift of the Spirit. God is good. All the time.

On the Day of Pentecost, Sunday, May 31, recognizing that it will still be a while before we can safely gather together for worship and The Meal, we will resume the Liturgy for Holy Communion in the Home. You've received more information about that in a separate email. This liturgy will be offered via Zoom immediately following the Zoom Coffee Hour beginning at 11:00 am. You are encouraged to worship through the words and hymns of this devotion, attend the coffee hour, and then stay for the liturgy. You'll need to prepare for that, so please see the information about that for details.

As the story of Pentecost reminds us, words and stories help us share the gospel and invite others into the Body of Christ and into fellowship with us. St Andrew's has a new resource to help with that! Our new website: standrews-elca.org. You can help make this a dynamic and useful tool for the Good News by sharing information, stories, and pictures. And share the link with your friends. It's an easy way to let them know how the Spirit is at work in and through St Andrew's.

And don't forget to use and share the Faith Formation materials that come to you each week. There is something for all ages. Martin Luther believed that the best place to teach and learn the faith was in the home. We have the opportunity to do that now. Let's do it! In addition, adults are invited to join in the Adult Faith Formation Class Sunday evenings from 7-8 pm. Links to the study materials are found each week in the Faith Formation email.

Introduction

Pentecost derives its name from the Jewish festival celebrating the harvest and the giving of the law on Mount Sinai fifty days after Passover. Fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the Holy Spirit as God's presence within and among us. In Acts the Spirit arrives in rushing wind and flame, bringing God's presence to all people. Paul reminds us that though we each have different capacities, we are unified in the Spirit that equips us with these gifts. Jesus breathes the Holy Spirit on his disciples, empowering them to forgive sin. We celebrate that we too are given the breath of the Holy Spirit and sent out to proclaim God's redeeming love to all the world.

Thanksgiving for Baptism

You may wish to light a candle and have small bowl of water to remember your baptism.

Alleluia! Christ is risen.

Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Joined to Christ in the waters of baptism, we are raised with him to new life. Let us give thanks for the gift of baptism.

All may make the sign of the cross, the sign marked at baptism, as the presiding minister begins.

We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning you created us in your image and planted us in a well-watered garden. In the desert you promised pools of water for the parched, and you gave us water from the rock. When we did not know the way, you sent the Good Shepherd to lead us to still waters. At the cross, you watered us from Jesus' wounded side, and on this day, you shower us again with the water of life. We praise you for your salvation through water, for the water in this font, and for all water everywhere. Bathe us in your forgiveness, grace, and love. Satisfy the thirsty, and give us the life only you can give. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

O God, on this day you open the hearts of your faithful people by sending into us your Holy Spirit. Direct us by the light of that Spirit, that we may have a right judgment in all things and rejoice at all times in your peace, through Jesus Christ, your Son and our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Word

First Reading: Acts 2:1-21

Pentecost was a Jewish harvest festival that marked the fiftieth day after Passover. Luke portrays the Holy Spirit being poured out upon the disciples before the gathered and astonished people assembled in Jerusalem for the festival. Filled with the Spirit, the disciples were able to witness to the power of Christ's resurrection.

¹When the day of Pentecost had come, [the apostles] were all together in one place. ²And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

⁵Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. ⁷Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? ⁸And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? ⁹Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, ¹¹Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds

of power." ¹²All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" ¹³But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

¹⁴But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. ¹⁵Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. ¹⁶No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

17'In the last days it will be, God declares,
that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,
and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,
and your young men shall see visions,
and your old men shall dream dreams.
18 Even upon my slaves, both men and women,
in those days I will pour out my Spirit;
and they shall prophesy.

¹⁹And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.

²⁰The sun shall be turned to darkness

and the moon to blood,

before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.

²¹Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.' "

Psalm: Psalm 104:24-34, 35b

Send forth your Spirit and renew the face of the earth. (Ps. 104:30)

²⁴How manifold are your works, O LORD! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures.

²⁵Yonder is the sea, great and wide, with its swarms too many to number, living things both small and great.

²⁶There go the ships to and fro, and Leviathan, which you made for the sport of it.

²⁷All of them look to you

to give them their food in due season.

²⁸You give it to them; they gather it; you open your hand, and they are filled with good things.

²⁹When you hide your face, they are terrified; when you take away their breath, they die and return to their dust.

³⁰You send forth your Spirit, and they are created; and so you renew the face of the earth.

31 May the glory of the LORD endure forever;

O LORD, rejoice in all your works.

³²You look at the earth and it trembles; you touch the mountains and they smoke.

³³I will sing to the LORD as long as I live; I will praise my God while I have my being.

³⁴May these words of mine please God. I will rejoice in the LORD.

^{35b}Bless the LORD, O my soul. Hallelujah!

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:3b-13

Paul is helping the Corinthians understand the relationship between our God-given unity and Spirit-created diversity. The Spirit creates the unity of faith and gives all Christians diverse gifts for the common benefit of all. We need one another's diverse spiritual gifts because the same Spirit has given them to each person for the common good.

^{3b}No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; ⁵and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; ⁶and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. ⁷To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. ⁸To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, ⁹to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, ¹⁰to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

¹²For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Gospel: John 20:19-23

The risen Jesus appears to his disciples, offering them a benediction, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

Meditation

Pentecost is a festival.

Pentecost was a festival long before those 120 followers of Jesus were gathered in that room in Jerusalem.

Pentecost had been a festival for millennia by the time those followers of Jesus were gathered in that room, 50 days after the Resurrection and 10 days after Jesus ascended to heaven.

Pentecost was a kind of combination harvest celebration and beer fest. Yes, beer fest. Because the harvest that they were celebrating was the grain harvest which had begun 50 days earlier. And what else would you do with at least some of the grain? Of course! You'd brew beer. So, that Pentecost was like the thousands of Pentecosts before: it was a festival. Think of Pentecost like the original Oktoberfest plus the Chicago Mercantile Exchange and you'll have some idea of what was going on in Jerusalem while those 120 followers of Jesus were "all together in one place."

As the writer of the book of Acts tells us: On that day Jerusalem, always the center of life for the Jewish people, was filled with locals but also with people from "every nation under heaven." That may be a little bit of an exaggeration, but not much. Have you been to the Oktoberfest in Munich? Or the Chicago Mercantile Exchange? I've been to both, and I'll tell you, people really are there from all over the world. So, it's not a stretch to think that about Jerusalem on Pentecost.

Given the circumstances, is it any wonder that the crowd suspected that the followers of Jesus were "filled with new wine" or maybe some beer, even at the early hour of nine in the morning? Even at a time of day when faithful Jews were not permitted to indulge?

And who could blame them for thinking that? After all, the crowd that was made up of speakers of every language they had ever heard and some they hadn't. And now they realized that each person in the crowd understood what these uneducated backwater Judeans were saying to them "in their own languages." Who wouldn't be bewildered, amazed, and astonished?

And that's when things got interesting. Not just for the disciples who had been waiting for something to happen. But for that crowd in Jerusalem, too.

The people in the crowd may have come to Jerusalem for the opportunity to do a little business and relax after the work of the harvest. And the disciples were there because Jesus had told them to wait there; to wait for the power of the Holy Spirit.

But what happened took them all by surprise.

The disciples "began to speak in other languages;" the crowd "heard them speaking in the native language of each."

"What does this mean" they asked. Indeed! What does this mean?

Well, it means many things.

But this week, I think it means that there is hope. Because we are shown that it is possible for people to speak and people to hear in a way that they understand one another.

I think it means there is reconciliation. Because just 53 days before Pentecost, Peter had denied even knowing Jesus. But now, on this day, Peter would go on to tell the story of Jesus and how he had been the sign of God's deeds of power: Power to feed, to heal, to see and hear those whom others ignored, power to forgive; power to overcome death itself.

I think it means that race and ethnicity and nationality and geography really, truly, absolutely do not matter in any way, shape, or form to God. Because all of those means of identifying and dividing were present on that day in Jerusalem. And no matter where they came from or who they were, the Holy Spirit gave them all the ability to speak and the ability to hear each other. The Holy Spirit indeed, showed no partiality toward anyone. Anyone. Not even the disciples. Everyone received the gift of the Spirit.

I think it means that we can dream that there can be and will be a time and place where people who do live lives differently from each other in ways that do not matter will be united with one another in the ways that do matter. And, while we cannot even imagine what that will look like and feel like and be like; and while we in our pride and our blindness and our greed may do whatever we can to prevent it from becoming reality; that even when we steal the breath from one another, Jesus will breathe into us the breath of the Holy Spirit. And so, despite the violence and death and the destruction that takes place in some streets, the gift of the Holy Spirit that made itself known in the streets of Jerusalem on that Pentecost still beckons us to dream that the great and glorious day of the Lord will come to every street and path and highway and trail in God's creation. We dare to dream that the God who does deeds of power will do this, too.

Did those disciples of Jesus know that the power that they were promised would be the power of their words, of language? Did those first followers of Jesus have any clue that the first place the Holy Spirit would lead them would be to the streets and not to the Temple or the synagogues where you'd expect preaching and teaching about God to take place? It doesn't seem so. I don't know what they did expect, but it doesn't seem to be this. Just before Jesus ascended to heaven these were the guys who asked Jesus, "Lord, is this time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" So, no, I don't think they were expecting this: to be driven into the streets with the message that everyone matters to God.

Pentecost had always been a festival. But when the Holy Spirit showed up, Pentecost became a party.

And everyone is invited.

Greetings, dear people of God, in the name of Jesus. Thank you for being so patient and so faithful during this difficult time as we have been worshipping at a distance from one another and dealing with all of the complexity of emotions around this coronavirus wilderness. Thank you for continuing to faithfully proclaim the gospel to care for one another and to reach out to love and serve the neighbor. I'm grateful for the ways in which you have walked through this wilderness together with so many across this Indiana Kentucky Synod territory.

It occurs to me that on that very first Pentecost that first Pentecost day that we celebrate today, those disciples on whom the Spirit fell had no idea what was in store for them in the days and weeks and months ahead. Just as today, we have welcomed and continue to welcome that same Spirit as we gather in whatever ways we're gathering in Jesus name. And while we don't know what the future is going to look like, we don't know what the days, months, and years ahead will be as the people of God, the church, but like those early disciples we

can ride the wind of the Spirit's power and follow the flame of the Spirit's love into God's unfolding future. And we can go confident that the spirit will give us what we need to be energetic and faithful stewards of the good news of Jesus crucified and risen for the life of the world. The power, the wind of the Spirit will carry us, and the flame of the Spirit's love will fuel us. It will look different than things look today, but it will be beautiful and good because Jesus will be there and we'll be there together in the name of Jesus.

I'm grateful to be walking this way with you and pray that the spirit that descends on you this day will sustain and lead you as individuals and families and as communities of faith together.

Now may the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord's face shine upon you and be gracious to you. May the Lord look upon you with favor and give you peace. Amen.

To process the bags they must be flat and smooth for cutting into strips which is difficult if they have been waded into balls. If you're not able to flatten them just keep as flat as possible.
