

As we continue to celebrate the fifty days of Easter, today's gospel includes Jesus' promise that he goes to prepare a place for his followers in his Father's house. Our baptism commissions us to share Jesus' mission in the world. As 1 Peter reminds us, we are a holy people, called to proclaim the one who called us out of darkness into light. In words and deeds we bear witness to the risen Christ—our way, our truth, our life.

We gather each week to worship and pray on the traditional territory of the Coast Salish Peoples. For thousands of years they have walked on the land and paddled the waters of the Salish Sea. We are grateful to the Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh Nations for their stewardship of these lands and adjoining waters throughout the ages.




O God, let our mouth proclaim your praise. And your glory all the day long.

Gospel: John 14:1-14

The holy gospel according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

On the night that he is to be arrested, Jesus shares final words with his disciples. As the one through whom God is known, he promises to go before them and act on their behalf.

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are

going. How can we know the way?" ⁶Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. ⁷If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him."

⁸Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." ⁹Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. ¹¹Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. ¹²Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it."

Reflection: Pastor Vida

I am the Way the Truth and the Life -

These words have often been understood as if Jesus was drawing a circle around himself and excluding those outside it. And while we do understand Jesus as the center that binds all things together in one, It is never our job to determine who's in and who's out; who's on the right path and who's got the truth in life.

I am the Way the Truth and the Life -

In and through these words Jesus declares that he is the way to know God's love; the truth of God's love; and the life that is God's love.

But God's love is not an abstract unattainable ideal or a set of feelings, but is rather characterized by the action of God in the person of Jesus Christ. What is this action? Jesus introduces us to see it when in Luke's "Gospel he goes to the Synagogue on the Sabbath and applies the words of isaiah to himself: "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor" (Luke 4:18-19).

This is how he understands God working in him and through him and we are called to participate in it. In calling disciples and creating a community of the Way, Jesus calls us to join him in his struggle for the liberation of human beings from all the forces of oppression.

In our world disrupted the corona virus this has become more important than ever. Even as we take measures to protect ourselves we must resist the temptation to turn inward and away from the sufferings and needs of others. Some of us are enduring far more hurt than others. Al and I are together when many others are alone and isolated. We have a roof over our heads while the homeless sleep on sidewalks or in cramped spaces. We have income coming in, when so many have lost their jobs and cannot meet their rent. While the emergency government programs have helped alleviate some of these hardships, there are still too

many who continue to fall through the cracks. I am grateful that our National Leader, Bishop Susan Johnson together with 41 Anglican and Lutheran Bishops has written a letter to the Canadian Government calling on the need for a Guaranteed Basic Income... so that no one is left in the precarious position where they cannot feed and house themselves and their families. We also can do our part and write, email, phone our MP of parliament and voice our support. This is how we participate in God's way of love ... in God's work enacted in Jesus Christ and continuing through the work of the church.

The unequal suffering caused by the pandemic is perhaps is nowhere more acute than in the world's refugee camps. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic hit, refugees and asylum seekers were living in positions of vulnerability and marginalization. Now, with refugee camps on lockdown and the physical movement of refugees is now more restricted than before, they have even less access to health care. Humanitarian workers are leaving camps. Doctors working with non-governmental organizations face the impossible decision of remaining in the camps with little personal protective equipment, drugs or ventilators. Most refugee camps lacking

basic necessities, like soap and running water to begin with. That is why I am grateful for CLWR for their goal to give clean water and hygiene supplies to over 5,000 displaced families in Ethiopia who are especially vulnerable to the pandemic. Even as we continue to support our local congregation, let us also remember those whose suffering is greater than ours. God's love is not abstract, neither is it simply a feeling of sympathy, but is characterized by action ... Gods action in and through Jesus Christ who loved us while we were yet sinners, and God's action continuing through us and out into the world.


A bishop currently serving the Episcopal church in the USA sums it up:

This is our unique calling as Christians: to become icons of redemption through our own acceptance of a love we don't deserve but have received anyway. This is the way the Incarnation ripples out from Christ and sometimes goes viral. Through our witness to God's forgiveness in our own lives, our readiness to forgive others, and our willingness to be in communion [and solidarity] with the suffering of others without exception, [when we do these things]—the whole world will come to know its infinite worth for the one through whom it was made:

Jesus, our way, our truth, our life.

and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.


Blessing
