As 2019 comes to a close, we are not yet sure when our project will get the green light from BC Housing. Much work has been done, including a visit up to a church in Nanaimo that is several years ahead of us in their re-development. When we were there, we visited the facility they are renting as well as saw the excavation for the new church building. It was encouraging.

The Hospitality Committee had a huge job description over the many years of its incredible ministry. In my time here, I witnessed that particularly at Coffee Hour and at Funeral Receptions. We thank Moira and Irene and all those who answered their calls over time. As the year comes to an end, we are still trying to design a new way to offer hospitality, especially to our families following a loss. No doubt by next year's AGM there will be more to report. But a bouquet of thanks to all who have blessed us with this ministry.

The Prayer Shawl Project and the Healing Hands Team continue to offer ministry and service of compassion to those in need. I mention them because there are both very involved in the larger community, not just with the people of First+Met! The Yoga classes, by Elaine Duke, mindfulness classes offered by Wally Lazaruk and Tai Chi classes are also offered to the wider community. These are all very important!

We are part of the Pacific Mountain Region (replacing BC Conference). New methods of communication and connection through social media are being used as the larger church learns how to exist as a National church given financial restraints. There are no longer any Presbyteries but I meet in several clergy clusters, usually over breakfast, and appreciate the support of my colleagues.

We continue to be inspired by the book, *Weird Church* by Beth Anne Estock. A group meets to imagine ways that our church could evolve to try new and different ways to reach out into the community. Three BBQ's this summer, a Pasta night in the fall and a Christmas Sing-a-long were all aimed at our neighbours in North Park. The Opportunity Fund helps us respond to emerging opportunities that we didn't know about at the time of the usual budget process. This financial flexibility is so helpful. We were able to access these funds to implement ideas quite quickly, but the congregation was also very generous in their support of these initiatives. Thanks!!

Their programs are very broad ranging. The knitters are another group that comprises both church and community members. Engagement in Church activities outside Sunday morning has deepened our connections with our God who is already active in so many places in our neighbourhood.

But what would my annual report be without some discussion of the worship services? As you may know, not many churches offer two services. Ours have unique and strong personalities of their own. The Livestream allows us to share our 11:00 a.m. sanctuary service with folks at a distance, who are unable to attend church. I was pleased to find out that some retirement homes share the service on their huge television screens to groups of residents. Maybe that is the best possible option for internet worship? The sound and Live-stream team just rock!

In closing a huge THANKS!! To all who have offered their care and nurturing of our Community of Faith over the past year. I do not think I could even start to list the members of our congregation that contribute something more valuable to the life of our Church than money: their time and energy. To all of them, so much gratitude and appreciation! Thank you to our members for your ongoing support of me, the staff, and the ministries of the church, not only with your financial gifts and presence, but with your hearts and In expressions of love.

Our main focus in 2019 was to develop a five-year strategic plan for the church. Additional meetings were held on May 8, Sep 25 and 28, Oct 2, Nov 6 and Nov 26 to discuss the First Metropolitan Strategic Plan. A day-long meeting with Team Leaders and other interested parties was held on June 15. This was conducted by Nichola Manning of Manning Consulting, who was hired to guide us through the early stages of preparing our plan. We met again with these individuals on Dec. 9 to obtain feedback on the first draft of our plan. We now have a draft of this plan which we will finalize and present to the congregation in 2020 once the physical distancing restrictions are removed and we can hold a congregational meeting.

Board of Trustees

The trustees are also Directors of the Foundation that holds two endowment funds. As trustees they are responsible for the First Metropolitan Church property, including that insurance is up to date. There were two formal meetings: the Foundation AGM held on June 17, and a joint Foundation and Trustees meeting on Nov 6. The Foundation meeting on Nov 6 approved investment guidelines to be followed for the two



endowment funds. It was agreed to divest investments held in pipeline companies as this is consistent with the Congregation's policy of not investing in fossil fuels.

The Foundation hosted a Legacy Circle Luncheon in the Doreene McLeod Room on October 6 to recognize congregants who have donated to the Foundation and/or have designated the church as beneficiaries in their wills. Liane Clark presented an illustrated talk about her travels in 2018/19.

Worship and Christian Spiritual Development

Under the excellent spiritual guidance of our Lead Minister, the Rev. Shelagh MacKinnon, we have:

Worshipping

- Supported a congregation of 293 members and 227 identified adherents.
- Welcomed seven new members into our church family.
- Offered Sunday services on 52 Sundays in 2019: a Chapel service with weekly communion at 9:00 am and a service in the Sanctuary at 11:00 with communion six times a year. These services were attended by an average of 20 persons at the 9:00 am service and 139 persons at the 11 am service.
- Offered additional services on Good Friday, and three services on
 Christmas Eve: Family Christmas
 Service, Carols in the Candlelight and the Magic of Wonder.

- Livestreamed Sunday services and some special services to an average of 37.5 views each Sunday. Views include one or more people watching a service from a single computer or smart TV.
- Welcomed many guest speakers including Joanne Linka from the Cridge Centre as we celebrated Christmas in July with "Knitmas" introducing an adopt-a-sweater campaign, Don Evans from Our Place, and Margaret Krawciw on Remembrance Day.
- Covenanted with our Lead Minister, Shelagh MacKinnon.
- Welcomed Rev. Betty Anne Dempsey, who provides spiritual care and attends worship with us once a month.
- Welcomed Allan and Megumi Matsuo Saunders as Ministers Emeriti with a celebration on September 22.
- Decorated the Sanctuary and Chapel with flowers, greenery and liturgical hangings each week.

Reaching Out

- Supported the collection of socks and squash for Our Place on Thanksgiving Sunday.
- Hosted three barbecues for our North Park neighbourhood, attrracting 100-150 participants each time.
- Hosted a community pasta night which fed 50 of our neighbours.

- Offered the Women Exploring Spirituality group which meets monthly from September to June.

Property Committee

Ongoing maintenance and repairs were at a normal level in 2019 and included minor repairs to the antique heating boiler in the basement below the Fellowship Hall kitchen. This plant is a true heritage item clad in asbestos sheathing dating to the early Fifties. It's critical to heating the Christian Education Wing and Fellowship Hall during the cold months. The ongoing worry is that a defect might take the system down during the winter when the smaller backup boiler cannot heat both the night shelter in the



Fellowship Hall and the Christian Education wing. The Property Committee looks forward to Redevelopment and replacement of this elderly system with its heavy consumption of fuel oil.

Our "ongoing maintenance" included repair to a leaking area of the Fellowship Hall Roof (roughly 40 years old!). Another reason why we look forward to Redevelopment!

During the summer we had Bartlett Trees prune the row of maples on the north side of the church. Congregants may have noticed these pleasant trees when coming from the Balmoral parking lot. Because the trees were starting to grow out over the Christian Education wing, The canopy was cut back. At the same time the arborists pruned the crabapple tree in the playground area to give it a better shape and did soil treatment to improve its health. A dead branch in the magnificent English Chestnut that dominates the playground was removed. This is registered by the city as a heritage tree.

We continued monthly meetings with Our Place staff to review any issues concerning the night shelter.

Larry Scott continued his bi-weekly volunteer gardening. Russell Delaney, who had been helping regularly in 2019 has now moved to Saanich and is thus no longer available. In addition to maintaining the beds in the Balmoral parking lot and north of the Church Larry purchased attractive new urns to flank the sanctuary doors on Quadra. These contain Monterrey Cyprus Trees. The various planters at the other church entrance contain seasonal flowers or shrubs as do the flower beds.

Music

The Music Ministry is in the community, enriching the life experience of those inside our walls and beyond with song, sound and spirit. Led by our Director of Music Ministry, Kelly Charlton, we offered the gift of music through individual solo performances, the Sanctuary Choir and the Pringle Bells. Our

musical offerings were enhanced by the contributions of our four Choral Scholars: Annalysa Tyler, Amber Dalton, William Wang and Louis Dillon.

Worshipping:

- Kelly Charlton provided music leadership to the Chapel and Sanctuary services from the piano and organ 50 weeks of the year, as well as in many special services.
- The Sanctuary Choir raised their voices in song to lead the 11:00 am congregation 40 weeks of the year and rehearsed the previous Thursdays.
- Offered the Music for Meditation service on Jan 1 with Lanny Pollet and Denis Donnelly performing on harp, guitar and flute.
- Offered a special performance by the Sprague High School Choir in March 2019
- In June 2019, offered a unique *Bloch vs. Clarke* concert, performed by Guyonne Louarn and Kelly Charlton. They wowed audiences with musical gymnastics on viola and piano to present two major works rarely heard-together.
- Hosted Let Not Your Heart be Troubled, an annual service of reflection through inspirational and comforting music, connecting those who have gone before with those who remain behind.
- Gave an early-season Touches of Sweet
 Harmony program of spoken word, and music
 from the flute-piano repertoire revolving
 around the relationships built and maintained
 through the joining of spirit and music.

Children and Youth Ministry

After the departure of Melanie Ihmels, a new model was adopted for the Children and Youth Ministry. Hayley Henderson and Micia Kanstrup were hired part-time to coordinate the Sunday School program and are supported by a range of volunteers from the congregation for Children's Time in the Sunday services as well as for Sunday School classes. The Children and their leaders have achieved the following:



Outreach

The Outreach Team reaches out into our community and beyond to encourage active change-makers for right relations with each other, our wider community ad the earth.

Reaching Out

- Through a team of volunteers, assisted to provide dinner to the Our Place family the first Sunday of the month.
- Supported the activities of Our Place through donations of clothing items and by eight walkers participating in the Holy Walkamolies team to raise funds.
- Provided meeting space for social justice groups, including the Mining Justice Action Group which meets monthly, the Climate Justice Victoria Committee, meeting regularly from June to December 2019, and the Green New Deal Victoria Committee from January to June.
- Co-hosted four social justice events: Budget briefing and Analysis of the proposed Provincial Budget with the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives in February 2019, The Christian Left and Canadian Politics discussion in March 2019, The Green New Deal barnstorm event on the climate crisis in June 2019 and the Non-partisan Federal Allcandidates Debate on the Environment in October, attended by over 600 community members.
- Participated in the Victoria Pride Parade.
- Together with St. John the Divine, the refugee support group completed two one-year sponsorships of the Ghebremheskel family of ten and the Bilal family of 3 with total contributions of \$32,500 from this congregation. Six volunteers from First Met participated in the settlement activities of the Bilal family; a family picnic was held in July to celebrate the sponsorship.
- Jointly with St. John the Divine, hosted a Best Coast Big Band Concert Cabaret and Dance to raise funds for refugee support, attended by 125 and raising \$4,000.
- Supported the Global Week of Action on the Climate, Sep 20-27, by providing meeting rooms to young climate strikers to organize, hanging a banner on Quadra St, participating in bell-ringing along with seven other downtown churches. About 20 to 30 congregation members participated in the Climate Strike actions at the Legislature.
- Co-hosted the 3rd annual Emerging Artists Christmas Craft Fair, providing support and refreshments.
- Conducted a Human Rights Sunday
 Amnesty International card and letter writing campaign as well as letter signing on four Sundays throughout the year.



Redevelopment Task Group

The Redevelopment Task Group acts as the liaison between FMUC and the Pacific Mountain Region Property Resource Team (PRT) throughout the FMUC Redevelopment and Restoration Project and to ensure that the needs and best interests of FMUC are properly considered in the work products of the Project such that FMUC has sufficient and suitable space from which it can deliver programs and support Church operations in a cost effective manner, well into the future.

- In January 2019 the PRT obtained funding from BC Housing to conduct a new building condition assessment, a geotechnical site assessment and some initial space planning for the restored Heritage Building (including Annex). The purpose of the building condition assessment was to confirm PRT's initial cost estimates to remediate and restore the buildings that were based on the condition assessment done for FMUC by Stantec in 2010.
- In May 2019 the <u>building condition assessment</u> was completed and confirmed the estimates previously done by the PRT. Several RTG members made a successful field trip to Nanaimo to learn more about the redevelopment experience of Brechin United Church.
- In June 2019 the PRT and RTG gave a congregational update on the progress of the FMUC redevelopment project.
- In July 2019 a geotechnical assessment of our building site was completed and PRT assigned a new team of Architects (Shape Architecture) to work with FMUC on the space planning for the Heritage Building & Annex (HBA) and the Christian Education Wing (CEW).
- In September 2019 the RTG met with the PRT and Shape Architecture to review the architects' analysis of FMUC space requirements and their recommendations regarding renovations to the HBA and the best use of the CEW going forward.
- In October 2019 the PRT applied for additional funds from BC Housing to complete the space planning for the HBA and the new apartment complex to be constructed on the site of the Fellowship Hall.
- In November 2019 the RGT made congregational presentation on the recommendations of the project architects regarding the renovations and future space usage of the Heritage Building & Annex and the future use of the Christian Education Wing.

Spiritual Care and Wellness

The Spiritual Care and Wellness Ministry serves to support and advocate for the spiritual care and wellness of members of First Met and the wider community. It does so through a number of groups and volunteers that form a vital part of this ministry. Thee groups include the Care Call and Visitation Ministry, the Care Giver Support Group, Gentle and Chair Yoga, Healing Pathways, Knitting Ministry, Prayer Connections, Summer Strollers, and Tai Chi. The Spiritual Care and Wellness Ministry also administers to designated funds: Margaret Cameron Trust Fund and the Health and Wellness Education Bursary Fund. The achievements of the committee in 2019 included:

Caring

- 12 trained volunteers of the Care Call/Visitation Ministry provided pastoral care visits or calls monthly to 20 folks who are homebound or reside in care facilities. The volunteers meet quarterly to share confidential information about needs and concerns. Many congregants benefit from a time with the volunteer for spiritual reflection and worship.
- First Met facilitators from the Care Giver Support group supported an average of 9 people each month throughout the year. Half those attending are from the wider community. Community resources and community event information is provided as needed.
- Professional yoga teacher, Elaine Duke, led regular gentle yoga sessions, Mondays and Fridays and chair yoga sessions, Wednesdays at reasonable costs. Bursary funds are available to First Met members and adherents to support session attendance. About 8 to 10 people attend gentle yoga and 10-12 chair yoga. There is a mix of participants from First Met and from the wider community.
- Qualified healing pathways/healing touch practitioners provided 669 treatments in twice-weekly sessions. Sessions are available Monday and Thursdays for four hours. Two new practitioners joined this ministry this year.
- Prayer shawls and prayer patches were crafted by the knitters who work as individuals and in a group
 to be distributed by the ministry staff to those needing support through illness or death of a loved
 one. Some prayer shawls are also given out to mark special occasions such as an ordination.
- The nine prayer team members received requests from First Met individuals, volunteers, staff and a few community members to reverently pray for others. Some of these volunteers are housebound and/or elderly; others fit this ministry into their busy schedules.
- The Summer Strollers program provides exercise and companionship for less mobile seniors who are
 housebound or isolated. Volunteer drivers provided weekly transport for 15 seniors who stroll Willows
 Beach together followed by a social time in the tea room on Thursdays from May to September. A
 wind-up lunch and Christmas party were also held this year. Betty Anne Dempsey is the new leader for
 2020.

• Tai Chi is offered twice weekly throughout the year. Sessions are volunteer led, with more experienced participants providing leadership. The group accepts weekly donations which benefit the Health and Wellness Education Bursary Fund.

Reaching Out

- A significant donation was made from the Health and Wellness Education Bursary Fund to the Therapeutic Recovery Centre (Our Place) for their educational programs.
- Knitted items made by the Knitting group were donated to the Single Parent Resource Centre, the Children's Health Foundation, Women's Transition House and The Safe House.
- The knitters group crafted 40 colourful handknit sweaters and toques for one to three year-old children attending the Cridge Day Care Centre.
- Contributed 60 gift cards for the Christmas gifts for adult shelter residents from the Margaret Cameron Fund.
- Contributed special treats baked by volunteers to the Christmas gifts for adult shelter residents.

Learning

- Wally Lazaruk presented sessions on 'Mindfulness' in October 2019 and the 'Power of Awareness and Self-Compassion' in November 2019. These sessions attracted both First Met congregants and those from the wider community. They were well attended and feedback from the participants was very positive.
- Wally Lazaruk held meditative pre-church sessions each Sunday in October and November between the 9:00 and 11:00 am church services.
- On October 21, the Spiritual Care and Wellness Team displayed a colourful, interactive display
 depicting all of the umbrella groups and their programs
 and services.
- Promoted the Health and Wellness Education Bursary fund, workshops and events in the quarterly church newsletter.
- Contributed articles on self-care, wellness, and related topics written by Wally Lazaruk to each newsletter.
- Sponsored a presentation 'Can You Hear the Birds?', a relaxing and informative way to understand the issues we all face as we grow in years and wisdom.
- Partnered with Oak Bay United Church to offer a series 'Contemplating a Good Death?' facilitated by Rev. Margaret Harper.
- Explored and promoted health and wellness related programs offered at other venues, e.g., Yakimovitch Centre

Archives and Heritage Team

Achievements

- Transferred 30 linear meters of First United Church and Metropolitan United Church records to the UCC Pacific Mountain Region Archives in Vancouver in April 2019. We are grateful for the assistance of Regional Archivist Blair Galston, First Met custodian staff, and volunteers Cullen Morton, Liane Clark and David Clark. See: First Met News, Summer 2019 newsletter, p. 13-15.
- The First Met transfer added nearly 30 meters to the holdings of the regional archives. Included were extensive records from the following: Pandora Avenue Methodist Church, Metropolitan Methodist Church, Metropolitan United Church and First Presbyterian Church, First United Church; also, records from First Congregational Church, Belmont Avenue United Church, Chinese United Church, and the Oriental Home and School. - With our Metropolitan and First United records now located at the Pacific Mountain Region archives in Vancouver, we still have ready access though our database and by request to the regional archivist, who will scan and send us electronic copies of any records we need. Public requests for access to this material will be referred to the regional archivist. We would like to remind church members that First Met still has an Archives program. The archival records of First Metropolitan United Church, from amalgamation to date, remain on site. We also have a sizeable collection of artifacts and

print material. Quality storage space for this material will be needed in any building redevelopment.





- updating Human Resource policies



- promoting the collection on our bulletin board, in the church newsletter and Sunday bulletins, through books displays at soup socials and the Blanket Exercise, and on the church website.




