#### It just took a moment...

Last month, Fort McMurray burned.

One moment, there were trees upon trees, green and reaching toward the sky.

The next, they were torches burning brilliantly but leaving behind a black, charred wasteland that was once a forest.

One moment, there were rows and rows of houses... homes... where families lived and loved.

The next, hollowed out hulls and smoldering ruins with people on the road to places of shelter.

And that is the way of violence and destruction...

One moment, the World Trade Center towers are standing.

The next, the buildings are collapsed along with the lives of thousands after planes are flown into them.

One moment, a crowded restaurant is bustling with conversation and eating.

The next, camage and suffering after a suicide bomber ignites their vest.

One moment, a family is having a joyful conversation heading off on vacation.

The next, bent metal and bodies after an impaired driver veers into their lane.

This kind of violence and destruction happens in our relationships also...

... a careless word...

... an unfulfilled commitment...

... a betrayed trust...

... a misguided intention...

... bit of gossip ...

... a false accusation...

... a harsh word in a moment of anger...

And a relationship is severed or a friendship broken.

One moment, love and partnership is present. The next is hurt, anger, loneliness, and distrust.

Why is it so easy for things that have taken a long time—even a lifetime—to build to be destroyed in a matter of seconds or minutes?

A house gone?

A relationship broken?

A career over?

A reputation tainted?

A life ended?

How I wish there were quick fixes to all of this destruction. We love quick fixes like winning the lottery or miraculous cures or some other kind of magic to repair, rebuild or restore what was.

In the ancient Greek tragedies, they called this kind of magical ending the *deus ex machine* (translated as *an act of God.*) Very often our prayers will tend toward this kind of petition... *God, please fix this and make it like it was!* 

In my experience, it doesn't seem to be the way that God tends to work. The acts of God that I see most often are the on-going loving, serving, encouraging, generous, forgiving, devotional actions that God uses to create and enhance life. Some are "newsworthy" because they involve millions of dollars or millions of people. Most fly under the radar but can be just as powerful in bringing hope and life.

The residents of Fort McMurray talk about returning and rebuilding. This will take a long time, a deep commitment, and an organized effort. In a real sense, though, they can never "rebuild" Fort McMurray. They will never be able to make it just as it was or restore it to the same city or community that it was.

I suggest that more accurately, they are choosing to create Fort McMurray arew. As the new houses, buildings and churches are built, they will also be building and creating the new Fort McMurray. Their city will never be the same and neither will their community. Their memory of the fire and the losses they experienced will be a common history they share. So also will the memory of their rescue, the courage of the firefighters, the generosity of those who gave money, shelter and comfort be a common history that they share.

This seems to me to be the way God tends to work... the way God calls us to be at work. It is through the choice to give of ourselves for others... we call that love. When the setbacks both large and small crash into our lives, we have the opportunity to continue to choose to love, to hope, to build, to encourage, to forgive... to live.

The bad news is that we are never done doing this work. The good news is that every moment is the opportunity to choose to create life through our words and our actions.

As the residents of Fort McMurray begin to create their lives anew, may they have strength, courage, hope and the resources they need. May the love and generosity of God be tangible for them through the love and generosity of their fellow human beings.

Calling for the creation of a viable Christian community, Elizabeth O'Connor's impassioned letters consider many of the complex issues facing Christians today, including leadership, authority, separation, dependence, independence, and the role of money in the Christian community. Here is an excerpt from a letter on giving.

#### **Should We Tithe?**

When the founding members, young and poor, were forming themselves into a properly incorporated community of faith, they struggled for a discipline of membership that would help them and future members to deal concretely with at least some aspects of the handling of money. In its first writing the discipline read, "We commit ourselves to giving 10 percent of our gross income to the work of the Church."

Their proposed constitution and disciplines were submitted to Reinhold Niebuhr, an eminent theologian of the last generation, who had agreed to read them and comment. His only suggestion concerned the discipline on money. "I would suggest," Niebuhr said, "that you commit yourselves not to tithing but to proportionate giving, with tithing as an economic floor beneath you below which you will not go unless there are some compelling reasons." The discipline was rewritten and stands today in each of the six new faith communities:

We covenant with Christ and one another to give proportionately beginning with a tithe of our incomes.

None of us has to be an accountant to know what 10 percent of a gross income is, but each of us has to be a person on his knees before God if we are to understand our commitment to proportionate giving. Proportionate to what? Proportionate to the accumulated wealth of one's family? Proportionate to one's income and the demands upon it, which vary from family to family? Proportionate to one's sense of security and the degree of anxiety with which one lives? Proportionate to the keenness of our awareness of those who suffer? Proportionate to our sense of justice and God's ownership of all wealth? Pro-

portionate to our sense of stewardship for those who follow after us? And so on, and so forth. The answer, of course, in proportion to all of these things.

#### Take a step in your discipleship...

#### **Cultivating Generosity**

Someone recently asked me: "When do you think the economy is going to recover? When will this crisis end?" I • answered, "As soon as people like you and me stop relating to it like it's a crisis."

Every moment is an opportunity. The trouble is, we are too accustomed to "how it used to be" to recognize the opportunity we now face. So, we hunker down, bracing ourselves for the next impact.

Statistics show that after the economic crisis of 2008, the saving rate for North American families

was 5.5%. It was the first time it had been positive in over 5 years. It was a sign of changing values: people began saving money instead of spending, because they became afraid of what might be lurking in their future.

What lurks in the future?

#### Nothing.

There isn't anything in the future, except what we put there. We will stop acting anxious when we stop acting anxious. We will stop being scared when we stop being scared.

What is there to do right now? Start behaving like you are living in the future you want to see. Cultivate generosity by being generous. It really will turn the world around. You see, generosity and courage are functions of vision. If you believe the world is going you-know-where in a handbasket, you will behave accordingly. If you believe you can make a difference, you will.

The main thing to remember is that we belong to God, not the stock market, the oil sands, or the government. Begin to think about those around you who are afraid....What can you do for them?

#### Things you can DO:

- While everyone is hoarding their money, give some away. Give it to people who are struggling, to the homeless person at the stoplight, to your favorite charity, to the church.
- Don't let the news dictate what you do. Plan your budget in faith and stick to it, *no matter what!*
- Invite God into your financial equation. Have you
  - asked God what you should do with your money, or do you think your plan is better?
  - Watch inspirational movies about people who've done much with little for example, "Pay It Forward," "Gandhi," or "Remember the Titans". Generosity is a function of clarity of vision!

However, we are close to securing an apartment for them in the south/central area of the city, near Lutheran Church of Our Saviour and Lutheran Church of the Cross. We have been gifted almost all of the furniture they will need. And we have begun to set up groups to handle the various tasks that are needed over the next few weeks and months. 

#### Message from our Bishop

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ – As I am preparing this month's message I am keenly aware that it is nearly two weeks since the evacuation of the city of Fort McMurray.

We live in the wake of unbelievable devastation; and, in the wake of incredible generosity.

With you, I give thanks to God for the generosity of those from our own communities, province, nation, and indeed, from around the world, in providing for evacuees, for the safety of the emergency crews and first responders, and for all who continue to coordinate and to plan at every level.

I know that you will continue to hold the people of Fort McMurray in your prayers. They remain displaced. There is much uncertainty. There are various forms of trauma.

I know that you will continue to welcome those who join you for worship.

I know that you will respond as you are able. Not, "remarkably," as someone said to me recently, "but as I am able."

Thank you to those who gathered last Tuesday, May 10, for a Synod hosted time of prayer and candle lighting, using *Holden Evening Prayer*, at Trinity, Edmonton. And thank you to Trinity for opening your door for our Synod to gather. I am aware that many others planned similar worship services within your own communities. Wonderful!

Last Wednesday I received correspondence from an ELCIC Pastor serving a small rural community in the Saskatchewan Synod who shared that, as the Church Council met the previous evening, they had worshipped using *Holden Evening Prayer*, at the same time our Synod hosted worship was taking place in Edmonton. Wonderful!

As you are aware, through the ABT Synod – Special Bulletin: update, conversation and planning continues with CLWR, LC-C and the ELCIC through our Synod. Church groups and congregations in Alberta are invited to apply for funds for programs they feel will benefit the congregations and people of Fort McMurray from the CLWR Emergency Fund. Grant application forms and further details are available from our Synod Office.

Pastor Susan Horton continues to be in regular contact with members and friends of Christ the King, Fort McMurray. Many have been inquiring as to an update regarding last week's Prayer Request (May 10) for Pastor Susan who had been admitted to hospital. She was discharged from hospital in Edmonton this past Sunday, May 15. Your prayers for continued healing are appreciated.

Pastor Horton shared with me a May 9 CBC News item from a woman forced to evacuate her home in La Ronge, Saskatchewan, during last summer's wildfires which I found helpful. Kandis Riese was forced to leave her community, with 13, 000 others, in a moment's notice. She has put her

experiences and her thoughts during her evacuation on paper, along with advice for evacuees and volunteers who are helping out. I have edited the article which you will find below. Dear sisters and brothers. There will be further updates to our Synod. We know that as the days go by, other events will begin to dominate media

reports and people's attention. This is when we will be needed the most to walk with and support our sisters and brothers.

We continue to pray: Our Lord and God, grant us grace to know your love in whatever we face. Give us patience and thankfulness, even in our pain, anxiety or loss; and move us with compassion and tenderness for our afflicted neighbours; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen (Recovering from Trauma, Evangelical Lutheran Worship; Pastoral Care, pg. 188). The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 15:13).

# Join the REFORMATION CHALLENGE!

#### Help plant 500,000 trees

A tree is a gift in so many ways; absorbing carbon dioxide, retaining soil, providing shade, being beautiful. The world needs more trees.

Where do you see a need for trees? Where could you plant them? In your neighbourhood, at your congregation or around the world? The ELCIC encourages our members to find diverse ways to gift the world with trees.

Plant trees around your church, community, home, etc... in Canada or consider supporting one of the following are two opportunities to help us reach this goal:

- The Environmental Education Centre (EEC) in Beit Jala, Palestine plants olive trees. These trees create more green spaces in Palestine and combat climate change. IT costs the EEC \$12 per tree, which includes students participating in the tree planting process.
- <u>Canadian Lutheran World Relief</u> (CLWR) through The Lutheran World Federation, will be planting a total of 150,000 tree seedlings in the upcoming two planting seasons (2015 and 2016) in Lalibela, Ethiopia. A total of 60 hectares of degraded land will be covered with trees in the two-year period. \$50 provides for a grove of 50 trees.

Planting trees is a tangible expression that creation is not for sale.
