

Values

As we seek to accomplish our goals, we express these values:

- Education: We intentionally work to nurture the faith of our St. Andrew's participants to strengthen their discipleship through every involvement in mission. We help them grow in their awareness of the issues behind the need and help them to understand the situation from a faith perspective.
- **Justice:** We address both the need (through acts of compassion) and also the causes of the need (through concern for justice).
- **Diversity**: We have a balance of mission involvements, such as local and global handson and advocacy, by fundraising and direct involvement, etc.
- **Meaningfulness**: We recognize and respect the gifts, strengths and passions of individuals desiring to be involved in mission, and connect them to projects that will be most meaningful to them. It is our desire that a person's mission involvement be enthusiastic.
- **Inclusivity**: We plan mission involvement in such a way to include the involvement of youth and whole families.
- **Partnerships**: When appropriate and possible, St. Andrew's acts in partnership with others.
- Process: The process of doing mission is as important as what we do in mission. We seek to create and strengthen relationships, foster team building among participants, be respectful of the culture of those we are helping, ensure that long-term support will continue after our involvement is ended, and that our contributions enhance the abilities of those we help and not replace them.

It was noted that Dot Todd has completed her term on the Board and would not be standing for reelection. Dot first served on the Board of Managers for St. Andrew's in the mid-1960s.

Session Highlights

Members of Kirk Session of St. Andrew's are elected to the office of Ruling Elder and are ordained for life. An elder who resigns from active service on Session is designated an "Elder Emeritus". We are pleased to report that no one resigned from Session in 2012. We note with sadness, however, the passing of elder Morley Johnson. Morley served St. Andrew's in many ways and was a dedicated and trusted friend.

There were eight active standing teams of Session in 2012, whose membership comprised both elders and lay persons. The teams were: Christian Education, Communion & Districts, Congregational Life, Invitation & Welcome, Leading with Care, Mission, Personnel, and Stewardship & Planning. In October, The Invitation & Welcome Team amalgamated with Congregational Life Team. In addition to these standing teams, Session also received reports and provided direction to the congregational Pastoral Care team. The Impact Team, which was created in 2011 to consider the impacts of the closure of the YMCA's building upon our reciprocal parking arrangements with the "Y", continued its work under the oversight of Session renamed "the Heritage Vision team", with a slightly amended mandate to also consider the implications for St. Andrew's continuing presence at its current location in light of our mandate from the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod to consider future ministry in South Calgary. A Worship team remained unstaffed and inactive throughout 2012, although at the end of the year, discussions were underway regarding creation of a new Worship team.

2012 marked the 50th year of worship at St. Andrew's at its Heritage Drive location. Many events took place throughout the year to celebrate this milestone. A banner was installed over the main entrance. Invitation & Welcome undertook the sale of coffee mugs, which acknowledge the event. Commemorative pins were produced and made freely available to the congregation and visitors.

Other highlights of 2012 included:

Session approved the renaming of the Fireside Lounge as "The Karl English Lounge" and dedicated the lounge in memory of the late Rev. English by hanging his portrait on the fireplace.

Efforts continued to envision the forms of ministry that might be used to further the work of the

Presbyterian Church in South Calgary.

Conceptual consideration of "Family Ministry", which would be based at our Heritage Drive facilities but which reach out in service especially to families throughout South Calgary was ongoing throughout the year. Vision for family ministry and the calling a third minister of word and sacrament would be recommended to the congregation at the annual congregational meeting in February, 2013.

In addition to the Men's Fellowship Breakfasts, the Invitation & Welcome team provided a pancake

supper, which preceded the Ash Wednesday evening service.

- Brenda Pudwell resigned as Editor of News from the Pews, a role that she has performed with good humour, patience and professionalism since 2003. Norah Finlay and Brent Harding now share the editorial duties.
- The trust deed was approved and trustees were named to oversee The Legacy Endowment Fund and its concept for planned giving was rolled out to the congregation through Stewardship & Planning. 30% of net proceeds from the Trinity sale were transferred to the Legacy Trust Fund in accordance with terms of the Trinity St. Andrew's Amalgamation Plan.

The Trinity window project was completed with the location of the window centrally above the

existing Sanctuary door/window assembly.

- A Dementia Respite Care program was conceptually approved and initiated through the Pastoral Care
- Lindsay Judd advised Personnel that she had accepted a full time position with the Calgary School Board and would not be seeking to renew her nursery staff position. Annalyn Danglapen was subsequently hired for the position. Unfortunately, by year end, Annalyn had also resigned, leaving this important role unfilled.

- Space does not permit description of the many continuing programs and new initiatives undertaken by the Mission team, but they enthusiastically continue to lead St. Andrew's in the fulfillment of our "Vision for Mission".

- Jim Hope-Ross resigned as Clerk of Session and has been ably replaced by Jean Sadler.

Following each month's Session meeting, News from the Pews and the Sunday bulletin provide the highlights of the meeting. Your interest and feedback is desired and encouraged. Please continue to welcome your elders and district visitors into your lives and make your spiritual and pastoral needs known to us so that we may better serve you according to God's bidding.

Session Teams

Christian Education

The CE Team is charged with the task of providing guidance and active support to the life-long Christian Education within the congregation. Within the Team's responsibility is the operation of the Nursery, all levels of Church School, all Youth events and programming, Adult Education including Alpha & Adult Bible Study, Summer Church School, Vacation Bible School and the child, youth and adult libraries. CE oversees special interest groups such as the Reading & Reflection and Coffee & Conversation groups as well as certain special events including ADVENTure, the annual Spring Fun Day, the presentation of gifts to graduating Grade 6 & 12 youth and the annual Teacher/Leader Appreciation Event. The CE Team selected a scholarship recipient, Simon Feigs, for the Ogilvie Scholarship in 2012 and oversaw the introduction of a Spiritual Dance program for teenage girls on a trial basis. Plans were made in 2012 for ways to further Family Ministry at St. Andrew's and a series of speakers on parenting issues have been arranged for the new year.

In terms of Church School curriculum, Young Children & Worship saw its twelfth year at St. Andrew's for the younger children. In 2012, children from age 3 to Grade 5 attended church school in a multi-aged grouping with the YC@W program being used at 9:30 and "One Room School" curriculum being used at 11:15. Inge Murray blessed us with another year of her talent as the Coordinator of Church School for this age group throughout 2012.

Junior & Sr. High was taught at 9:30 utilizing "Faith Alive" curriculum for Grades 6-12, for the first half of 2012 and a change in curriculum to "Reform", for the second half of the year. Pop Up High fellowship for all the youth continued between services in the Upper Room. Jennifer and Bart Stolee were welcomed back as the Coordinators of the Jr./Sr. High Church School.

In terms of Youth Ministry, Ben Kroeker who was hired in the summer of 2010, continued on through 2012. We continue to have a connected group of teens meeting at the church as *Surge* on Friday nights. A Bible Study took place on Wednesday nights for 6 weeks during the fall of 2012 for the senior high students. Much fundraising by way of cookie sales and bottle drives took place in the spring of 2012 with a view to raising sufficient funds to send a number of our youth to CY2012 in the summer of 2012.

In 2012, our Nursery Coordinator was Stephanie Werle. Lindsay Judd continued as staff person in the Nursery until early 2012 and the position was assumed in the spring by Annalyn Danglapen who continued with us until she resigned in October 2012. A search for a replacement continues. A Newsletter "Splash" for families of nursery aged children was continued as an additional way of connecting families to St. Andrew's.

The CE Team appreciated the assistance of Judie Coleman who continued in the role of Adult Library Coordinator until the end of 2012.

The CE Team plans and organizes the annual presentation of gifts to our graduating Grade 6 and 12 students. 5 from Grade 6 and 6 from Grade 12 in 2012 were presented with gifts on Christian Family Sunday. In addition, CE organized the annual Teacher/Leader Appreciation with a donation to Acadia Place in their names, the annual Spring Fun Day on Saturday April 14 and the informal family celebration of ADVENTure at Christmas, which had record attendance in 2012.

Two groups under the guidance of Rev. Jan Hazlett were back by popular demand in 2012, Reading and Reflection and Coffee & Conversation.

Our Mission funds for 2012 were directed in the name of the church school children to the Church School's Foster Child, the Crib for a Bed program, the Teen Angel program and Acadia Place.

The CE Team can only accomplish the work it is called to do by the continuing response of members of the congregation to serve in teaching & leadership roles. We are very appreciative of all who assist in the work of Christian Education at St. Andrew's.

More detailed reports of the various groups overseen by the CE Team can be found in other sections of this Annual Report.

The Impact Team

Okav....Park Yourself!

Beginning in January 2010, a group of members from St. Andrew's came together at the January Meeting of Session to work to resolve how we were going to deal with a new and emergent issue of Parking caused by the shutdown of the YMCA next to us. The YMCA had been operating there for some 50 years but made the decision to close down because of heavily increased maintenance costs and lower participation numbers in programming. The Y turned the building over to the City of Calgary who owned the property and the Y kept the lands used for parking with a long term view to sell that land to the city when appropriate.

By the way....that land has been used forever by our Church including when the property was sold to the Y, owned at that time by St. Andrew's, in 1967.

The St. Andrew's Team was established as the Impact Team...what Impact does the Parking Issue have on St. Andrew's in long term? The bad news is....a <u>huge Impact</u>. And the team is still working to find a way to resolve the issue.

We lose 33 parking spaces that are absolutely essential to us if we cannot find a way to continue to use that land. That would mean we might park at the LRT Lot and use a Shuttle bus to take members to and from the Church. We might buy all the property and create a housing complex of which we might sell or rent.....but that is simply not feasible. We might buy a house along our alleyway and turn it into a Parking area but it is highly questionable how that would go over.

The Team has worked diligently for two years to find a solution and not a bit happy one has not been found.

The Team members need to be thanked for their strong commitment including Peter Coutts, Jan Hazlett, Mark Rowe, Tom McIntyre, Ed Braun, and Bob Sadler...outstanding members.

So...the battle for a solution will continue with some major changes in place. Certain members will begin discussion with our community neighbors to see what they might suggest. Hopefully, we can have closer dialogue with the City and perhaps further discussion with the Board of the YMCA.

As it is said "It ain't over until it's over". And it certainly is not over yet.

Leading with Care

At St. Andrew's we continue to work to reduce risk and to provide a safe environment for all, including our most vulnerable. We act in compliance with The Presbyterian Church in Canada's Leading with Care Policy and in co-operation with the direction of the Pastoral Effectiveness Committee of the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod.

Over the year our activities have included:

Providing training and support for leaders

- Ensuring required Police Information Checks are completed for all who take part in ministries with children, youth and vulnerable adults.
- With the help of the office staff, keeping records of ministry position descriptions, covenants and reference checks.
- Evaluating risks of new ministries and ensuring compliance with our policy

• Updating of Forms and continuing update of Police Record Checks

- Conducting regular facility checks (at least twice annually) and requesting and overseeing changes where necessary.
- Reviewing critical incident reports and taking action needed

• Reviewing procedures and revising as necessary.

• Continue to recruit, schedule and train Sunday morning Shepherds to monitor the building during worship times, offering support for the nursery, Sunday School leaders, being aware of guests who enter the building but don't enter the Worship service, offer help to those who leave the worship service early, and are prepared and familiar with protocol to offer leadership in case of emergency. Special thanks to Craig Murray who has taken over scheduling of the Shepherds.

Fire Drill during worship: In compliance with the Presbytery mandate that all congregations conduct an emergency evacuation drill in 2011, we carried out an emergency evacuation in June of 2011. It has been suggested by the Pastoral Effectiveness Committee that it would be appropriate to have such a drill each year. We did not have a drill in 2012, so look forward to having an emergency evacuation drill in 2013.

I would like to thank all those who have contributed specifically to implement Leading with Care and thank all of St. Andrew's for continuing to work together to ensure that St. Andrew's is a safe place for all people.

Mission

- A visit to the Blackfoot Crossing interpretive centre in June attended by about 20 people;

- A wonderful fall concert in November coordinated by Cathy Millar and Mary Anne Quesnel. Marty Antonini and 7th Heaven put on a truly wonderful performance.
- We continue our involvement with Inn From the Cold and thank outgoing organizer Cathy Millar for her dedication and support to this project. We welcome Val Hall as the new coordinator.

We thank all of the dedicated Mission Team members for their continuing commitment to this very important aspect of church life at St. Andrews.

Personnel

The Personnel Team provides support to the congregation and the ministers by providing administrative oversight and advice on all personnel matters concerning church staff. The team is made up of members from Session, the Board of Managers and the congregation at large. The Team's membership is currently made up of Craig Murray and Steve MacDonnell from Session, Bob Shaw from the Board and Ann Conquergood from the congregation-at-large. Peter Coutts continues his caring assistance and guidance to the team. Rob Beatt stepped down from the Team in June and his professional human resources knowledge and experience are greatly missed.

The staff of the congregation is made up of nine full and part-time employees. In March, with support of the Christian Education Team, we were successful in adding Annalyn Danglapen who replaced the departing Lindsay Judd in the Nursery Caregiver position. Unfortunately for us, circumstances in Annalyn's schedule forced her to step down in late October and this position is vacant once more. A suitable candidate is currently being sought. No other staff changes occurred in 2012. Meetings were held over lunch with each of the ministers to solicit feedback to better support our clergy in meeting their needs. One item that received action in this regard was the recording of total hours worked by our ministers. This now forms part of the monthly statistics reported to Session. The team is currently readying itself for possible staffing requirements as Session works through the visions of family ministry and ministry south of Fish Creek Park.

Besides responding to staffing requirements, annual performance reviews of the seven non-clergy staff are carried out and budgetary salary figures are developed and presented to the Board and Session. The Team also maintains personnel policies and procedures and consults with other Presbyterian churches concerning personnel functions and issues.

Stewardship and Planning

A Vision for Family Ministry at St. Andrew's

Definition of Family Ministry

The focus of family ministry will be children and youth (and through them their families), young adults and young families. The focus will include people of these demographic groups who are currently involved in the life of St. Andrew's, those on the periphery of our congregational life, and those we wish to attract to our congregation. We are redefining "family".

St. Andrew's has a responsibility, given us by Presbytery, to develop a new ministry in south Calgary. We envision this ministry to be a social ministry to families, the exact nature of which is not yet defined. In time this social ministry may become a second worshipping group of St. Andrew's Church, composed of St. Andrew's people involved in this ministry, those who receive the help from this ministry, and those of the south Calgary community who participate in this ministry.

These two elements of family ministry will be integrated in a way so that what happens at St. Andrew's Church will naturally flow into our social ministry in south Calgary. It will begin with the consolidation and expansion of family ministry here at St. Andrew's along with a modest initial engagement in south Calgary, recognizing that as strength is built within this demographic group at St. Andrew's we will grow our capacity to conduct the south Calgary social ministry. In essence, family ministry will become a stronger ministry of the congregation as well as a mission endeavour.

Rationale for a Stronger Emphasis on Family Ministry

Youth, young adults and young families all have unique needs from each other which are also different from the needs of the middle-aged and older adults. Consequently each of these three groups requires unique attention and support. The membership of St. Andrew's is dominated currently by middle-aged and older adults. The older generations of our congregation have a good organization to meet their needs and interests and a sense of volunteerism that sustains their organizations. The younger generations lack a similar organization, and for a number of reasons it is harder for them to sustain such activity. More clergy and staff support is required to build and sustain a program for the younger generations. Our youth program is a good example of this reality. To a large degree today, and to a greater degree in the future, the pastoral care focus of our congregation will be on the congregation's older demographic groups. Meeting this changing pastoral need will take more of the time of our current clergy and reduce their available time to support the younger generations. To build the next generation of our congregation we will need a stronger ministry focus on family ministry in order to appeal to and attract the next generation by being a faith community that meets their needs and preferences. Given the realities outlined above, a stronger family ministry will be enabled most effectively by adding a third minister to focus on this ministry.

Several years ago a demographic study of The Presbyterian Church showed that youth, young adults and young families are the ones most at risk of dropping out of actual or potential church involvement. Canadian sociologist Dr. Reginald Bibby has shown that this is the general trend across Canada (*Beyond the Gods and Back*, 2011). A strong ministry for these three younger demographic groups increases our potential to retain them.

Christianity has existed for 2,000 years because each generation of Christians handed their faith over to the generation that followed them. We are called to do the same in our own time by being stewards of the future of the Church. Cultural change in our society since the mid-20th century makes this harder to do today, however. Youth, young adults and young families in Canada today generally have a vague sense of spirituality and little inclination to turn to congregations to support and develop their spirituality. A stronger family ministry will become a form of mission by encouraging people to become followers of Jesus and support them as they grow as Christians. If we wish to

appeal to the younger generations we will have to address their needs and preferences in relevant ways.

There is a wide range of deep needs among Calgary families. A social ministry is an expression of Christian care. Through a social ministry in south Calgary we will not only be expressing the love of Christ but also giving witness to the Lord we serve. It is our hope that such a social ministry will generate credibility, respect and trust for St. Andrew's which in turn can influence people to consider joining with us in the journey of faith.

Societal change over the past 55 years has changed the playing field for churches in Canada. However there are younger people who have beliefs and values which align with Christianity, or are open to new beliefs, and have needs which can be met by our congregation. Influencing and attracting them will take a new kind of determined effort.

Desired Outcomes from a Stronger Emphasis on Family Ministry

- 3 Support the growth in faith for people in these demographic groups.
 - One of the central goals of the Christian faith for 2,000 years has been to help each emerging generation to come to know and embrace our faith.
- 2] Help people in these demographic groups to enrich their lives.
 - We realize that many of the younger generations are not looking to grow in the Christian faith but are looking for help in living their lives. We can offer care by helping:
 - o teens and young adults as they learn to live in their world
 - o couples to be stronger couples
 - o parents become better parents
 - all to be better members of society
 - By helping in these ways we demonstrate that we care about people's needs, and create potential opportunities for us to have a faith influence on them.
 - Our congregational life provides an opportunity for young people to experience community, which they may not experience elsewhere in their lives.
 - The younger generation have social needs. This ministry can be a means to connect people of similar age and life situation with each other.
- 3] Increase the number of young families in St. Andrew's Church.
 - This will enrich our congregational life today.
 - It will help us hand over the life of faith to the next generation as we act as stewards of the future.
- 4] Increase the Participation of Children, Youth, Young Adults and Young Families in Congregational Life.
 - Build community for this group among themselves, and by integrating them into the broader life of St. Andrew's through mission and social activity together, and through meaningful worship involvement.
 - Increase their sense of connectedness and belonging to St. Andrew's Church:
 - o Using social media and the internet to connect with these groups
 - o Involving our younger and older members with each other in meaningful ways
- 5] Meet social needs of south Calgary families.
 - Let the "rubber hit the road" as we love our neighbour, in a way that makes a real difference in the lives of those we touch.
 - The actual social ministry is yet to be determined. As we cannot be all things to all people this will be a focused ministry.

Position Description for Associate Minister (Family Ministry)

The desired outcomes of a stronger family ministry given above were used to create this proposed position description.

Title: Associate Minister (Family Ministry)

Purpose:

To provide spiritual leadership, pastoral care and organizational direction for relevant ministry to youth, young adults and young families.

Accountability:

Accountable to the Presbytery for ministerial conduct, as outlined in the Book of Forms 249. Accountable to the Session as the leadership body of the congregation.

Accountable to the clergy team as a member of the team.

Responsibilities:

In the context of family ministry to youth, young adults and young families, the Associate Minister will:

Lead the development and conduct of worship relevant to youth, young adults and young families.

Nurture in individuals growth in faith, discipleship in Jesus Christ, and development of the whole person.

Provide organizational leadership to build Christian community that strengthens fellowship, a sense of belonging, integration into the life of St. Andrew's, and mutual care.

As part of the clergy team, be the point person in the development of St. Andrew's south Calgary mission.

Relationships:

The Associate Minister will enjoy involvement in the wider life of St. Andrew's Church beyond the primary scope of Family Ministry, including worship leadership, program, pastoral care and congregational leadership.

The Associate minister will be an integral part of the clergy team, relating to the Minister who acts as head of staff.

Short and Mid-term Objectives for the Development of Family Ministry

St. Andrew's can begin to work on enhancing family ministry even before a third minister joins our congregation. Here are some priorities for the next 12 months.

Family Ministry Priorities - Four Months

<u>An audio-video feed of the worship service to the nursery.</u> Some initial investigation has been made on the technical requirements for making this happen.

Make more use of youth, young adults and young couples as greeters and ushers Sunday morning to make them more visible in the congregation.

Facebook site

More social activities for these groups.

The Family Ministry Design Team organized the family picnic held on September 9th. We are considering a bowling event in November and an outdoor skating event early in 2013.

Educational events for people in the community.

The nursing ministry team agreed in the summer to conduct the first event in October themed "Family Wellbeing Night". This has now been postponed until 2013.

Family Ministry Priorities - Twelve Months

Surge Student Ministries has had a tremendous year! Our group has been connected to a lot of new faces, experienced some changes to programming and have had some new opportunities that have brought them closer to Christ.

First off, I would like to thank the congregation for sending our students to St. Catherines, Ontario to Canada Youth 2012. Our Church sent five students to a life changing experience. Dermott Decottignies, Kyle White, Shelby Cole, Carl Murray and Shona Murray joined 500 other students from across Canada to learn more about Christ and deepen their faith. The talent of the speakers and the structure of the week allowed for exactly that. It was quite amazing to be connected to all of those students from across the Presbyterian denomination.

When we went down to CY 2012, we travelled with youth from other Presbyterian churches in Calgary. And we found that we quite enjoyed their company! This inspired the youth leaders from our city's Presbyterian churches to start planning what we simply call "the City Wide events." This way we can connect with other students in the city and help and support each other's youth groups. We held the first one right after our annual fall retreat. It was quite successful. We had 30 people show up for our first event! We've been continuing to hold these events every month and it's really excited to see how Christ seems to be getting our youth together and a group identity between our churches is starting to form!

We also had our second annual backpacking trip. We saw our attendance double on this trip and we also saw quite the array of weather patterns. We saw everything from sunny skies to hiking 10 km in the hail and rain. We put in a lot of hard work, work that included hiking up over 600m in elevation to a ridge overlooking the lake. Everyone rose to the challenge of backpacking in the back country. And overall we would all say that it paid off. This is a quote from Carl Murray from the September issue of News from the Pews.

"For a first timer like me, it was an amazing experience. God has so many wonderful creations that are not seen from within the city; like the view from the ridge. All along the hike, you keep thinking to yourself 'this better be worth the work'. Once you get up to the ridge you get this feeling inside when you look over the edge and see the spectacular view that is absolutely indescribable. You realize how big, how great our God really is. I will definitely be going again and encourage anyone who wants to experience something new to join along. It is well worth all the hiking."

Finally, we've introduced a new study format into our youth group to help busy students find time to explore faith and deepen their relationship with Jesus. We have started video studies where all the students have to do is show up and watch the speaker present an issue on faith and then we discuss it. In a twitter comment, one student expressed her gratitude for the study saying that it gave her a lot of things to think about.

Alpha

Alpha is a course that looks at basic Christian beliefs, originally intended for new people to the Church it is also helpful to those who had been long time church members. It causes us to review our beliefs and to see our faith anew, it is also a great way to develop new friendships in the church. This program is used by Christians around the world in almost every denomination. In Calgary there are many churches that offer the program.

We offer two different courses:

The original course is entitled "Questions of Life" it encourages people to examine and discuss their faith and share their ideas with others.

Another course is provided from the Alpha program with a different series of videos, a study based on Paul's letter to the Philippians entitled "A Life Worth Living" it focuses on our daily approach to living our Christian faith.

At St. Andrew's, we have offered Alpha courses since January 2001. Our courses are held in Trinity Hall on Wednesday nights, beginning with snacks, beverages and fellowship at 6:30 pm. We then move to a time of devotions about 7:00 pm followed by a video on an aspect of the Christian faith by Rev. Nicky Gumbel, a very engaging and humorous speaker. After the video we break into groups to discuss our thoughts on the subject of the evening. An integral part of the course is a weekend retreat that has usually been held at St. Andrew's.

Both Alpha courses run for 12 weeks, including the Introductory Dinner and Celebration Dinner. In 2012 we started on January 23rd and September 19th. Every June we also try to get all former Alpha alumni together for an indoor barbecue of fun and fellowship. This event is usually well attended.

Together with the Alpha courses we have Small Groups for Bible studies that meet at the same time on Wednesday evenings. Most of these people have taken Alpha courses and want to continue to study and grow in their Christian faith. It is not required to have been on an Alpha course to attend. The Alpha Team is pleased to have these Small Groups as an integral part of the Wednesday evening program and fellowship.

Many people from both inside and outside St. Andrew's have enjoyed the Alpha program. It serves both to bring new people to the faith and also helps support existing members who would like to develop their Christian faith and enhance their relationship with other Christians.

HOW DO I PARTICIPATE?

In the lounge there is a Flower Calendar. Print your name beside the appropriate date when to place flowers in the sanctuary. Below the calendar is a form to fill out to indicate your wishes regarding whether you will take the flowers home or if you would like them given to someone else. Leave the completed form in the office.

HOW MUCH DO THE FLOWERS COST?

The flowers are purchased at a cost of \$30.00 per arrangement. Cheques are made payable to "St. Andrew's Church "with flowers on the memo line". If you wish to purchase the flowers from another florist, please notify the church office.

MAY I JUST MAKE A DONATION?

As an alternative, individuals can make a donation to the St. Andrew's Church Memorial Fund. A special silk bouquet will be used for these Sundays.

MAY I TAKE THE FLOWERS HOME AFTER THE SERVICE?

Yes, just advise the church office of your intentions.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE FLOWERS IF I DON'T TAKE THEM HOME?

The flowers will be delivered to the individuals who are ill, shut-in, or just need some cheer in their lives.

WHO MAKES THIS ALL HAPPEN?

First and foremost, the individuals who purchase the flowers. The office does the ordering, and the flowers are picked up at the florist and delivered to the church by Olive Schwab. Church elders deliver the flowers after the 11:15 service when required.

Pastoral Care Teams

Pastoral Care

May the knowledge of the love and grace of God sink from my head down into my heart so that it flows out of my hands, my mouth, my ears, and my eyes so that this body becomes the body of Christ in the world.

This prayer reveals one of the most important aspects of pastoral care — engaging our physical being in the service of caring for others. We do this through our hands as we reach out and touch or refrain from touching, our mouths as we speak or remain silent, our ears as we listen to the voices of those who cry out or speak softly, and our eyes as we see things from the perspective of our faith. The church becomes the body of Christ in the way we care for one another.

- "Spirituality and Pastoral Care" met monthly over the year. Led by the Rev. Jan Hazlett this group encourages and supports those who visit on behalf of the church. Over this past year we have moved on from our discussion of Jean Stairs book "Listening to the Soul" to a broader base discussion of spirituality and incorporation of spirituality in visits. Together we continue to consider the ministry of visiting, exploring topics of concern around visiting. In working on our own prayer and devotional lives we have explored different ways of prayer, and together visited a Labyrinth in the fall to experience this form of meditation. This group continues to meet usually about one Wednesday evening a month. The group is open to new members, for information contact Rev. Jan Hazlett.
- The CareNotes located on the Pastoral Care Board in the Lounge continue to be a good resource.
 They will be restocked in the new year.

• Side by Side is a new pastoral care undertaking under our Companion Ministry. It evolved from our concern for caregivers who take care of a loved one with memory problems and the caregiver's need for respite. The Rev. Dr. Frank Breisch, who also works for the Bethany Care Society, brought forward the idea and offered the support of the Society. Rev. Jan worked closely with the Bethany Care Society and the Alzheimer's' Society to gather information to help her create our program and put together the necessary forms. The program runs from 9:45 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. and offers BrainGym®, simple exercises, crafts, music and various activities. Each day starts with coffee/tea and muffins, with lunch offered at noon and coffee/tea and cookies at the end of the program. Except for BrainGym®, the program is staffed with volunteers from St. Andrew's. Side by Side was offered on 4 Wednesdays this fall: October 24, November 7 & 21 and December 5. We started with one participant and expect 3 new participants when the program resumes on January 9th when it will become weekly, running through to the end of June. This group continues to be funded mainly by donations. As a result of someone offering to underwrite the cost, in the new year, we will be able to offer Music Therapy every second week in Side by Side. Please keep this new ministry in your prayers.

Changes to convenors during the year:

- Both Gail Prevost and Lee Bridge resigned as coordinators for our Home and Shut-In Ministry this year. We are very thankful for their time as coordinators We are fortunate to have found a replacement for them in Barb English.
- Vanessa Davidson resigned as one of the coordinators for CareShare over the summer. We appreciate Vanessa's time given to this ministry. Jean Spotowski has continued on her own but we are looking for someone to assist her.

Pastoral Care is made up of many teams. Each has a specific task and yet they often overlap. As you read the following reports from each individual team, please be open to ways that you might offer care to others.

Home and Shut-In Visitation Ministry

This ministry makes sure that people who are not able to attend worship (or need help to do so) can still feel connected to the church community, and part of its life. Our volunteer visitors help to keep this connection alive. We don't want people to feel forgotten just because they can't show up every Sunday. Many have spent years supporting the church, and feel the grief of separation caused by age or lack of mobility.

The number of people on the visitation list fluctuates almost from week to week as people's circumstances change. As of December, the number is 24. The number of people who visit is 22. This is an unobtrusive kind of ministry; it's a one- to-one connection, and done at the time of the visitor's choice. Sometimes our visitors bring little gifts or something that interests the person they are visiting. Undoubtedly, however, the real gift is the time spent together. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the faithfulness of the volunteer visitors, some of whom have been doing this for years.

We suggest 4 visits a year, minimum. If you have 4 hours out of an entire year to spare, please volunteer for this quiet, vital ministry. You can make someone's day. And perhaps your own.

Gail Prevost and Lee Bridge have coordinated this Home and Shut-in ministry for two years, and we extend our gratitude for all their work.

Nursing Health Ministry

The purpose of the Nursing Health Ministry of St Andrew's, is to provide congregational support, in the form of "Nurse on duty" on a Sunday morning, from 10:30 am until 11:15 am between services, in the small "former YWCA office" within the main church office.

This year, to better address congregational health concerns, the team mandate was expanded to include a broader scope of practice, related to specific health information and community support, in the form of a Seniors Health Fair and Fall Prevention.

During the past year, the Registered Nurses on the team, have provided "Nurse on duty" support in a number of ways.

Blood pressure monitoring remains the number one reason for accessing this service.

- Blood pressure monitoring: 118 in 2012
- · Nutritional counseling
- Psychological support and encouragement
- Bereavement support
- Surgical procedure information
- Community resources

Our first Seniors Spring Health "Tune Up" was held on May 4, 2012 in Trinity Hall from 10 am -1 pm. Twelve community resources were on hand to give out information on a wide variety of topics. A pharmacist addressed medication issues during a half hour "mini workshop" and members of the nursing team were on hand to monitor pulse oximetry and blood pressure. A total of 76 participants attended.

In September, Alice Williams and past team convener Kathleen Tomie, joined the Alberta Health Services Older Adult Fall Prevention committee. In order to acknowledge November, as Alberta Fall Prevention month, informational displays were set up between services on the 18th and 25th of November. On November 6th, members of the Lillian Dickson WMS group participated in an information session related to fall prevention and osteoporosis.

The Nursing Health Ministry team includes, Anne Greco, Lynn Judd, Judy McVittie, Barbara Kearnes and Alice Williams.

Prayer Chain Ministry

Would you like to be a member of the Prayer Chain Ministry but are unsure how to pray? You may find the following book to be helpful. It can be found in St. Andrew's adult library along with many other books on prayer.

Prayer – Finding the Heart's True Home

Best-selling author Richard J. Foster offers a warm, compelling, and sensitive primer on prayer, helping us to understand, experience, and practice it in its many forms-from the simple prayer of beginning again to unceasing prayer. He clarifies the prayer process, answers common misconceptions, and shows the way into prayers of contemplation, healing, blessing, forgiveness, and rest.

Coming to prayer is like coming home, Foster says. "Nothing feels more right, more like what we are created to be and to do. Yet at the same time we are confronted with great mysteries. Who hasn't struggled with the puzzle of unanswered prayer? Who hasn't wondered how a finite person can commune with the infinite Creator of the universe? Who hasn't questioned whether prayer isn't merely psychological manipulation after all? We do our best, of course, to answer these knotty questions but when all is said and done, there is a sense in which these mysteries remain unanswered and unanswerable . . . At such times we must learn to become comfortable with the mystery."

Foster shows how prayer can move us inward into personal transformation, upward toward intimacy with God, and outward to minister to others. He leads us beyond questions to a deeper understanding and practice of prayer, bringing us closer to God, to ourselves, and to our community.

The Prayer Chain's ministry is to seek God in all situations. We pray for God's guidance, support and peace; for healing for those who are ill - physically, mentally or emotionally. We offer praise for blessings in people's lives and for answers to our prayers. A simple prayer asking God to heal, comfort, protect or support someone is adequate. God knows the details of the need.

We ask you to consider becoming a member of the Prayer Chain. Prayers are offered up in the privacy of your own home and at a time that is convenient to you. All prayer requests are confidential. This past year many dedicated women and men received over 100 prayer requests, updates and praise reports either electronically or by telephone.

Prayer: Dear God, we don't always know the right words to pray for those who are sick and afraid. Give us the courage and, when they are needed, the words to pray for those who need your healing grace. Amen.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

In addition to shawls, for children stuffed animals have been knit for children in hospital. If you know of any person who would benefit by having a prayer shawl, please leave their names with the office, or come in and select a shawl to present to those who would appreciate them. We ask that you register the name of the person receiving the shawl in the book provided so that we have a record of who has received them to avoid duplication, or missing someone who needs one.

Women's Missionary Society

MEETINGS: We gather in the Karl English lounge the first Tuesday of each month (with the exception of July and August) at 1:30 pm. At most meetings we profile a current missionary or mission project of the PCC follow a prepared program/study on mission or have a guest speaker, have the obligatory business meeting and always enjoy a time of fellowship. A free will offering is collected. These funds support mission projects of the national WMS.

MEMBERS: Currently we have 15 active members and 9 associate members (those who support us but are unable to regularly attend the meetings).

PROGRAM: This year we have continued to utilize the study entitled "Making Connections: Ride the Cariboo Trail". It focuses on the ministry of the Cariboo Presbyterian Church in the interior of British Columbia.

GUEST SPEAKERS: We have had a number of guest speakers this past year. In January, Alex Grant spoke to the group about the PCC tour of the "Cariboo Trail" he took a number of years ago. One of our members, LaVerne Waldock shared her experiences as a missionary in Africa at our April meeting. In June, Gwyneth Gourlay gave an upbeat presentation about autism. Alice Williams spoke about fall prevention, proper footwear and osteoporosis at the November meeting. In December the Rev. Helen Smith gave a presentation on child poverty in Canada and also shared about Acadia Place.

PROJECTS: We continue to support the Fellowship of the Least Coin by donating our pennies and prayers each month. From January until June we collected loose change to support Action Refugies Montreal - a Montreal based organization which aims to support newly arrived refugees to Canada.

For the past number of years we have collected used stamps for the Leprosy Society. The focus of that has changed. We now collect the stamps for the Canadian Bible Society.

Knitting is still the most popular of our projects. Sadly we have stopped knitting pneumonia vests for newborns in Africa and India as the shipping charges (covered by the national office of the WMS) were becoming too expensive. However, the good news is that these vests are now being knit by women in those overseas communities.

Hats, scarves, mittens etc. continue to be gathered and given to places such as the Brenda Strafford Foundation and new this year to Acadia Place. The prayer shawl ministry remains active as well. Our newest knitting endeavor is that of comfort dolls and teddies. These small but most important gifts (56 in all) were given to Anne Greco for her trip to Haiti in February. Anne distributed them to many of the children there.

In November we received good news on a project from the past – Bricks for Jobat. Construction has finally begun on the hostel and should be completed by the fall of 2013!

We are so very grateful to all of you who help support our projects in any way that you can. From a used stamp to pennies to knitting....all help to make our projects so very worthwhile.

OUTREACH: As in the past members participated and others attended the annual World Day of Prayer service held on the first Friday of March. In the spring two members offered Word of Welcome Bibles (from the Canadian Bible Society for new Canadians) to a class of ESL students at the Shawnessy YMCA. They were enthusiastically received. At the end of May we led the Mission Awareness service at St. Andrew's. Our guest speaker on that day was Anne Greco who generously shared her experiences and pictures of her time assisting the earthquake victims in Haiti. One member of our group taught a church school class in May with the assistance of a CE member. In December we donated personal hygiene supplies to the Salvation Army Pregnancy and Parenting Support Group as well as provided extra holiday baking for the Care Share special Christmas plates.

EVENTS: In June and December we forgo the business part of our meetings and devote extra time to fellowship. This year we had a potluck lunch in June and enjoyed home baked Christmas goodies in December. Two members attended a Synodical event at Camp Kannawin in April as well as a day session of the annual Women's camp there in June.

TRIBUTE: On July 8 we lost our dear friend Jess Ogilvie. Jess was a long standing member of the Lillian Dickson WMS. She was our group treasurer for over 40 years and achieved the distinction of being the longest continuous group treasurer in all of the WMS groups across Canada.

Board of Managers

ach year presents the board of managers with a different set of challenges. Two thousand twelve was true to form with a twist.

Each year we struggle with operating St. Andrew's in financial conditions that swing throughout the year. For the first half of the year offerings, the largest part of our revenues, rise and fall but always within a range that, spread over a year, would meet the needs of the many areas funded by the congregation.

Then the summer rolls around and offerings seem to disappear like the snowbirds flying south in the winter. That leaves each board meeting opening with a prayer that enough offerings will be received in the final four months to balance the budget by year-end.

In 2012 we had a twist when a significant revenue producer disappeared. Last year the YMCA moved its programs from St. Andrew's to its own facilities and with it significant revenues from our rental of space to the Y.

While the revenue loss was important, the Y's move also meant space unused during the week.

St. Andrew's United Church

s fate would have it, we got some help when St. Andrew's United Church, just up Heritage Drive, announced Ait would close. This caused a scramble by its groups to find new space.

We had a number of significant conversations with these groups who contacted our office. They provided information about their space requirements, visited our church, and met with representatives of St. Andrew's.

At the end of the day we did manage to fit several groups into an already busy week. The unfortunate part was that we were unable to accommodate all of the groups and this caused some blow-back.

The other aspect of these events was that none of our new users were able to offer the same revenue as the Y. We have replaced some of what we lost but as we enter 2013 our space rental revenues are down.

There was other fall-out from the board's work to recruit new users. Complaints were received that contrary to its stated position of welcoming families, St. Andrew's was actually hostile and refused to accommodate several family groups from St. Andrew's United.

These rumours and complaints are false. We do welcome families and family oriented groups. We did everything possible to accommodate groups from St. Andrew's, however several had requirements beyond our capabilities or objected to certain requirements.

For instance, one group had substantial storage needs. Ask anyone who participates in activities at St. Andrew's about storage availability and you will hear that, for all intents and purposes, there is none. Current storage areas are overflowing.

Another problem area that cropped up, and was often a deal-breaker, was the matter of liability insurance.

St. Andrew's United, and some other churches, accommodate groups without the need for liability insurance. Our national church requires insurance and we ask facility users to carry insurance. Unfortunately, this type of coverage can be expensive but the alternative is exposure for St. Andrew's to the risk of law suits.

Serious Consequences

n good conscience, the board could never operate St. Andrew's on the basis of: "oh, they would never sue a tchurch!" A law suit for \$1 million would have serious consequences for St. Andrew's; even a suit for

\$500,000 would cripple our church.

We understand several of the groups found alternate space, one at a church that was prepared to waive insurance coverage. While that is indeed good news, that other congregation now lives with a substantial, possibly unprotected risk.

Anyone who comes by St. Andrew's during the week knows our church is a busy place serving all ages. The board did whatever it could to welcome and accommodate groups from St. Andrew's United while still being prudent and respectful of the other groups already using our facilities.

In 2010, the board created an investment management committee to manage excess funds generated by operation of the church and various groups in the church. Some of the revenue lost to the Y's move will be replaced by investment income although there is still a considerable gap.

Great Appreciation

Three members of the congregation serve on the management committee. Ted Cantlon, Johnston Cairns, and Steve Conquergood meet periodically to review conditions in investment markets and to manage surplus funds.

The Board of Managers expresses its great appreciation to Mr. Cantlon, Mr. Cairns, and Mr. Conquergood for their contribution of time and expertise in managing the important financial resources of St. Andrew's.

Amalgamation of St. Andrew's and Trinity Presbyterian Churches was stressful but it came with many blessings, the most significant being the addition of the members of the Trinity congregation to St. Andrew's.

Another blessing was a significant financial contribution to St. Andrew's. On November 1, 2012 some \$500,000 from sale of the Trinity site was used to launch the St. Andrew's Legacy Trust Fund. The memory of Trinity and its congregation will live on in the good works accomplished through the trust.

Creation of the Legacy Trust will have financial implications for the day to day operations of St. Andrew's. Investment income earned by the \$500,000 contributed to the trust will now be directed to the trust itself rather than church operations.

A review does not constitute an audit and consequently I do not express an audit opinion of these financial statements.

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, derives revenues from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory verification. Accordingly my review of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donations, excess of revenue over expenditures, assets, liabilities, or members' equity.

I am satisfied that, to the best of my knowledge and belief, the various statements present fairly the financial affairs of the church for the year ended December 31, 2012.

On Fire for Christ

Before I came to Malawi I thought I knew all about "hunger" and "Africa". One important new perspective waiting for me in Malawi was to discover that the hunger I come across on a daily basis would only sometimes be physical. Just as often it's spiritual. Africa is hungry for the gospel.

Now when I hear or read the words "Africa" and "hunger", the images that come to mind aren't always the ones I brought with me but rather good ones that have surprised me since I arrived — images of bursting churches, packed pews, drums of worship. Believers in Malawi are typically energetic and passionate. Canadian Christians often tend to think of their faith as a once-aweek-on-Sunday sort of thing but for many African Christians, faith is a day-in-day-out reality, and the local congregation holds a very central place in their lives and a very public place in the community.

Indeed, one of the greatest challenges faced by church leadership is born of the gospel's stunning success. How will this massive and growing generation of new converts be made into lasting disciples of Christ? The question I often hear pastors and my colleagues asking is: How do we feed our sheep?

— The Rev. Dr. Todd Statham is working with The Church of Central Africa Presbyterian to equip pastors at Zomba Theological College in Malawi The Nigerian Presbyterian Mission started in 2011 with 10 people gathering to worship. Since then, God has has guided us as we have reached out to the Nigerian Community and now, by the grace of God, an average of 15-40 people come each Sunday.

Our activities include Sunday and midweek worship, church school, Bible studies, men's and women's groups, youth fellowship, prayer meetings, and community outreach. We are helping integrate Nigerian Presbyterian immigrants into their new society, visiting the aged within the community and encouraging their children to be part of our church. We also arrange and attend events with the Nigerian community as part of our evangelism strategy. Since our services are in English, we hope to draw people who may prefer an African style of worship.

Since we started, God has been so faithful, using us to make people happy and put smiles on their faces. Our goal is to build a congregation that is engaged with the wider world.
