Clara's Corner ...

Every year I am told: Isn't it nice that summer is a time to slow down and take a break from the usual busyness of our lives? I'm not sure when things changed, but I have yet to experience a quiet summer in a parish, and that certainly has been the case at St. Paul's. Now, in all fairness I realize that this is partly because of the huge learning curve of getting to know folks, learning the ins and outs of life in a new parish, and the continuing emersion into the larger community.

As I come to the end of the summer I have had the opportunity to listen and learn about the incredible amount of time and energy that this parish has spent over the past several years working hard to put into action the vision you have for a revitalized parish that included a new Christian Centre for Ministry. I have enjoyed connecting with folks over the *Coffee With Clara* chats. The response was overwhelming. There must have been easily 70 people who came out for a visit and great conversation. Thank you all for making me feel so welcome!

This September we will mark the 2nd anniversary of the dedication of the new Centre for Ministry and it seems like an appropriate time to step back and reflect on where we have come and where God might be calling us as we continue our journey of living into the vision that is before us. It is my sense that folks are understandably weary and perhaps it is an opportunity for us to take a pause, to breathe and to take some time to re-group and re-focus. It doesn't mean we stop what we are

doing, but merely to be prayerfully intentional in looking ahead to where we are to go from here. It is good to remind ourselves of the incredible generosity, skill and time that so many of you have given to the glory of God and in your commitment to our life together as a community and as a diocese. Every day I am reminded of the kind of sacrificial giving that so many of you continue to offer. I want to say: Well done good and faithful servants! We could never accomplish what we have without every single person helping in what ever way they can.

At a recent Parish Council retreat/planning day we spent the good part of a day reflecting on our 8-Fold Ministry Plan that was put together in 2014. We used this plan as a framework for conversations about where we thought God might be leading us as a parish in the next year or so. As I mentioned at the August 26th Sunday morning services we have identified a few areas where we want to put some energy and focus – particularly in the areas of welcome and hospitality to new folks, reaching out beyond the walls of our building (such as music, carolling, the carillon), and continue developing our outdoor garden area as an oasis and refuge.

I'm excited about the possibilities we have before us as a parish. In our Covenant of Openness which was part of the Ministry Plan in 2014 it said: "We are ready to examine all possibilities and are open to all possibilities. We are ready to embrace the future." Let us continue to courageously remain open to God's Spirit who is alive and moving among us.

THE ST. PAUL'S FUND FOR THOSE IN NEED

It's been quite a while since we have included a feature on the St. Paul's Fund, what it is and what it's used for, so we thought we would provide you with a few facts about the fund.

- 1. What is it? Formerly known as "The Rector's Discretionary Fund", the St. Paul's Fund is a separately kept fund that is used to help people (not necessarily parishioners) that have an emergency need. The Fund is administered through the office by the Rector and the Parish Administrator.
- 2. Where do the funds come from? Monies are donated directly to the Fund, either through offering envelopes (second line, marked "St. Paul's Fund") or by placing a similarly marked envelope in the offering plate.
- 3. How is the Fund used? St. Paul's has a policy of never giving out cash but we are able to provide tickets for bus travel, assistance with groceries, household items and clothing. The main form of outreach is through the Thrifty Foods Smile Cards which are given out on the third Tuesday of each month on a first come, first served basis. In addition, a parishioner donates 20 local bus tickets per month that we give to help people get to appointments, etc. We keep a Rolodex card file of all people who use the Fund, to assist us in being good stewards of what we receive and share.

If you would like to donate to the St. Paul's Fund, please do so using your offering envelopes (see above) or via the office. Donations to the St. Paul's Fund will be included on your annual tax receipt.

ANGLICAN CHURCH WOMEN

Who or what is Dorcas?

Dorcas is a ministry within the ACW named after Tabitha, a disciple of Christ, whose name in Greek translated as Dorcas. She lived in the first century and was known for her good works and charitable deeds. She gave of herself to help others in several ways, making garments for others, sewing garments and possibly even weaving the cloth herself. She understood what it meant to be a living sacrifice giving something valuable and precious: her time.

The St. Paul's Anglican Church Women support the Diocesan Dorcas Ministry by contributing sewn, knitted and crocheted items as well as purchasing items of clothing. The items are collected, sorted, bundled and shipped at the end of October to seven parishes in the Diocese of Caledonia, namely: Masset, Old Masset, Port Edward, Huston, Vanderhoof, Hazelton and Fraser Lake.

Included in these bundles are "Joy bags". These are colourful cloth draw string bags filled with useful items for family members. A bag may contain many useful items, a comb, shampoo, washcloth, bar of Ivory soap, Kleenex, toothbrush, toothpaste, socks notepad with a pen and a small sewing kit.

PWRDF REPORT

Telegraph Creek, B.C. receives emergency grant from PWRDF.

As wildfires spread in the Diocese of the Yukon, the community of Telegraph Creek has lost at least 27 buildings, including the Roman Catholic Church of St. Theresa and its rectory. Bishop Larry Robertson reported that the community of 500 - 700 people, most from the Tahltan First Nation, have been displaced and evacuated to Dease Lake. The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund is helping those affected with an emergency grant of \$5,000.

At the last report from PWRDF, the status of St. Aiden's Anglican Church, a 100-year-old wooden church in Telegraph Creek, was unknown. "We so very much appreciate the response of PWRDF to this crisis in Telegraph Creek," said the Venerable Sarah Usher, Executive Archdeacon of the Diocese.

Support and supplies have been sent from Teslin and other First Nations Offices in neighbouring communities; and the thrift store at St. Philip's Anglican Church has contributed clothing. We are asked to keep the people and parishes of Telegraph Creek in our prayers.
