# Saul's beginnings:

- · He was born into a Jewish family that did pretty well financially, in the city of Tarsus.
- Like most boys, he learned the family trade (tent making) and studied the Torah.
- · He was passionate about study and moved away to pursue it.
- This led to an early, deep respect for the Temple in Jerusalem- and saw himself as a defender of the practices that surrounded worship.

#### Saul the Pharisee:

- The teaching of the Pharisees (a very devout Jewish sect) would form his personal practice and approach to being a Jewish man.
- He learned at the feet of the rabbi Gamaliel, as a devoted and accomplished student (Galatians 1:14)
- · Acts 5:38-39, Acts 7:56-58
- He approved the execution of Stephen and began a zealous pursuit to rid the world of Jesus followers. (Galatians 1:13, Philippians 3:6, Acts 9:1-2)

### From Saul to Paul:

- · Acts 9:3-9: Acts 22:11-21
- · Saul's road to Damascus experience was an epiphany and resulted in a fundamental recalibration of his life's pursuit.
- · Without exception, the greatest epiphany any one of us could have is meeting the resurrected Jesus.
- · Flowing from his adoption of truth and the empowerment of the Spirit, he is set free from a misguided past and is directed to love and encourage a world of Gentiles into faith.
- · Saul would become arguably the greatest apostle, Paul.

# Why would God choose Saul?

- Because he would become Paul
- Because Jesus would meet him and love him to the point of forgiving him.

 Because Jesus saw in Paul went beyond the persecutor to what no one else would or could see – a man who baptized and filled by His Spirit could change the world.

# Why us?

- · Whether we call ourselves a Christian or not the principles we learn from Saul apply. Spiritual pride, dead religion, the placement of man over God, sin all lead to a spiritual darkness and all need the liberal application of Jesus, enough to land us on our backsides and change our life's trajectory.
- Even after our meeting Jesus our tendency can be to look at our past and consider ourselves unlikely, messed up, too broken, too uninformed and under- qualified.

### But we can learn from Paul that:

- · Our sinful past does not define our forgiven future
- Our qualification is based on our relationship with Jesus, and no matter how messed up we were,
- · Our past experiences will be redeemed to help form our purpose.
