From the Rector's Niche...

With the arrival of better weather comes the annual challenge of navigating road construction and detours. It always reminds me of the story of the doctor, the engineer and the town planner, debating whose profession is the greatest. The doctor pointed out that in the Bible, one of the first things God did was to create Eve from Adam's rib and this required surgery, so the medical profession is greatest. The engineer countered with an earlier passage in the Bible which said before that, God created order out of chaos, which is what engineers do, so theirs is the greatest profession. "Ah yes" said the planner with a smile, "but before that, who do you think created the chaos?"

With apologies to contractors and planners for poking fun at their important jobs, I guess it is true that none of us can plan changes of any kind, or implement them, without causing some chaos. Whether in our personal lives or in institutions, planning ahead is difficult especially in these dynamic times of global connections and rapid change. There are perhaps two reasons for this.

First we tend to extrapolate from the present. In other words we draw straight lines from the trends we observe. But rarely are we able to foresee big changes coming in the status quo and so the basic equilibrium of current conditions is usually assumed in our planning. Anyone engaged in long term financial planning over the years would know about this phenomenon.

Second, I would suggest that our lack of foresight arises because we don't always include God in our forward thinking. The biblical witness and experience of countless people of faith, is that God seems to have a habit of completely changing the rules of the game, especially where there is healing, wholeness and transformation on God's agenda. The greatest ever of those planned changes was Christ, in whom God revealed "...what no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor human heart conceived... what God has prepared for those who love him" (1 Corinthians 2:9) And to the prophet Jeremiah (29:11) God said: "For surely I know the plans I have for you... plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope."

Have you ever considered that God has a radical plan for you, for your own future, or perhaps at this time a plan for dealing with a predicament which is pinning you down? Something which your modest and 'straight line' plans have not even thought of?

And for the Parish of St. Paul's, it is advisable at any time, but particularly in this time of welcoming new clergy leadership, to shelve our straight line plans, and to await what God has prepared for us who love him, as St. Paul put it. And to await our future with hope, as the prophet Jeremiah put it. The promise is that when we entrust ourselves and our future to God's will, there are things we haven't even imagined yet, towards which God calls us and desires for us.

We may extrapolate and plan for what we think we can see ahead, and there's absolutely nothing inherently wrong in that. But we need to be aware

that God does indeed have thoughts and desires for us which are likely outside our lines of thinking and way beyond our imagining. When we open ourselves to God's grace, they are worked into our lives and into our community.

This will be my last Contact submission, pending the start of the ministry of the Rev. Clara Plamondon with you. I commend Clara and each of you to God's never failing care, and thank you for your friendship and support over the previous most enjoyable nine months.

Wow, finally some sun from the Heavenly Father to help make our days brighter. The past week I heard from an elderly gentleman, "Happy Earth Day" and he then went on to say that the Assisted Living facility that he is in had a lot of visitors and that it was good. As I shared on Sunday, our seniors are very much a part of Earth Day just as we are. Like our seniors, our young people have a lot to tell us about life, and we must take time to listen to all that is being said. Encourage people to talk.

In my everyday work, I work with people who suffer from dementia - a very debilitating disease, and this disease affects many family members and friends. The challenge is learning how to dance or walk through the stages that present themselves. As I have said before anger is one of the biggest issues that is very present with this disease and it can affect the whole family. Some family members are not able to understand what is going on. The best thing that can happen with someone who has dementia is make or take small steps. Decisions can be made for them, but make it so they have come up with the idea and that will help to remove a lot of the angst. Pose only ask one question at a time and make it a one choice answer by saying something like Would you like to do and whatever that is. Or How about we do this, and make it present. Do not present something on a Monday and then expect them to remember on Wednesday. That will not necessarily happen in a person with dementia. They will not remember or will get very frustrated as they cannot remember. They will know something is

going to happen but they will get anxious because they are expected to remember and they are at the point in their lives that they are not able to remember.

Every person can use a little bit of help. The person with dementia may be able to be present through an entire church service – something that has been very ingrained. Someone might, if able to listen to the music they like and know, be very present at that time. It is because it is further back in the memory and something that has been ingrained in them.

Always remember to walk with a person who suffers from dementia – be their friend and most importantly take care of yourselves.

Blessings to each and everyone of you, enjoy the sunshine and always remember "you are not alone you live in Gods world"!

NOTES FROM THE TREASURER

Although Open and Envelope offerings are under March 2017 by \$3500.00, we need to remember that we are comparing 13 Sundays in 2017 with only 12 in 2018, so our givings are actually on par with this time last year. However, we are under budget by \$11,851.27, which is not good. Starting in June, our payroll figure will be about \$4,000.00 higher each month.

Thanks to the efforts of our Stewardship Committee, the St. Paddy's Day event netted just over \$1,700.00. We also have a portion of the Lent/Easter offerings showing this month under Church Festivals.

We were able to pay the \$1,000.00 towards the loan interest this month. All other expenses continue as predicted.

Our end result is a deficit of \$37,315.93. If we subtract last year's deficit of \$24,761.97 that was brought forward, we have actually spent \$12,553.96 more than we have received in the first 3 months of the year. We continue to survive on the balance in the Project Account.

Canadian Foodgrains Bank is inviting educators and youth leaders to join us in Uganda to learn more

about hunger, food security and the culture and history of Uganda. The trip is for educators who want to learn about global hunger, are interested in longer-term action and advocacy efforts, and are ready to engage their students in the issue of global hunger upon their return to Canada. The tour will take place approximately **August 2-17, 2018**. (Exact dates will depend on flight availability).

The delegation will learn about food security issues in Uganda, visit relief and development projects supported by the Foodgrains Bank, and explore ways to engage Canadian youth in issues related to world hunger. The group will be made up of about eight participants and two Foodgrains Bank staff. Upon return to Canada, participants are expected to engage in community awareness activities and advocacy initiatives. (We are available to support and encourage you!)
