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## LENTEN MESSAGE

Dear friends,

We are preparing for the season of Great Lent – the forty days before the celebration of Our Lord’s glorious Resurrection at Easter. Lent begins here in the winter when the earth is frozen and dead and culminates in the springtime. In fact, the English word Lent originally meant ‘spring.’

Though often thought of as a dark and gloomy time because of its penitential spirit, Lent is in fact a joyous and holy season set apart for the cultivation and blossoming of the fruit of the Spirit within us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Gal. 5:22). As we know from horticulture, new growth can only come if the old is pruned away. That is why the Lenten spring involves self-examination and repentance.

Lent begins with a call to repentance on Ash Wednesday; I invite you to join us at St. James for our Ash Wednesday services on 26 February at noon and 7:00pm. The origins of Ash Wednesday lie deep in the Bible, especially in all those Old Testament passages that speak of ‘repenting in dust and ashes.’ And so, we receive ashes on our foreheads as a sign of this repentance.

But there is deeper significance in the tradition of ashes – one that is brought to light in the mystery of Christ’s death and resurrection.

In a forest, the ash that is left after a fire is not just the dark remains of destruction, but a fertilizer – a source of new growth and new life. Out of the ash of death, new things bloom from the earth. It is a beautiful reversal born of the wisdom of our Creator and Sustainer.

And so, the cross of ash upon our foreheads symbolizes not just the death of the old growth of sin, but through that, our resurrection to newness of life and righteousness in Christ.

It is to this end that all of our extra prayers, disciplines and fasting are directed over the 40 days of Lent – certainly not that we should feel proud of our achievements in them, but that we may become more keenly aware of our complete dependence, from cradle to grave, on the Lord of life and death.

In the words of a poem for Ash Wednesday by Malcolm Guite, ‘Hope could rise from ashes even now / beginning with this sign upon your brow.’

I invite all of you to the observance of a holy Lent, so that at Easter, we may all be renewed in the hope of our risen Lord Jesus Christ.

## AL LAWRIE – GLASS ARTIST

One of the highlights of our successful roof fundraising campaign was the cross suncatchers, with a piece of historic St. James stained glass in the centre. When the lancet windows in the bell tower were replaced due to deterioration, the old glass was saved and pieces were sold as silent auction items. One purchaser of several pieces was the late Peter Elms, local Caledon East historian. He actually kept the glass in his local history file boxes. They came to light when Diane Allengame began processing Peter's records prior to sending them to the Archives at PAMA in Brampton. What serendipity to find these historic pieces after so many years!



Al Lawrie agreed to use this historic glass as a centre medallion in a cross he was designing of contemporary glass. These were to be used to recognise the extraordinary gifts from the parish to support the renovation/restoration of the roof and other exterior building elements of St. James. Each cross would be blessed in the church and given to donors who made significant financial gifts. Over 30 crosses have been made, blessed and given to members of the parish!

Needless to say, this was not the first glass work of art designed by Al. He has been working with glass for about 17 years. "I'm a bit of an artist and I find, unlike paintings, glass is a changing medium but it doesn't fade. The colours constantly change when hung in a window due to light levels and seasons. Someone told me once I'm 'painting with glass'."

Coloured glass pieces fill a number of Al and Gillian's windows at home. The largest piece he's made is 34" x 25" - including one rendition, inspired by a photo, of a flower bed of Impatiens in their garden. Al tried counting the pieces but there are too many (some are tiny) -- his estimate is at least 650.

As all artists, Al has a sharp eye for colour. While working on a lamp shade, he was attempting to picture Dogwood branches on a backdrop of a red/dark sunset. Having underestimated the pink colours he'd need for the petals, Al began a search for them throughout the GTA, London, Ontario and then Vancouver (ok, the Lawries were going there for personal reasons as well!). He ended up finding the glass in a little town in Western New York. It took four years before that lamp shade was finished and a lot of perseverance!

Used to such complex projects, producing more than 30 of the same design didn't exactly fuel Al's creative juices, but he says "I am so pleased that they contributed to our very successful roof fund. Gill and I love St James; it's become a big part of our lives. I've been practising my bagpipes in the sanctuary when there's no one else in the building and it's totally silent. I leave the lights off; I just enjoy the peace and the beauty of those windows. I have the place all to myself. I kneel down and pray and feel totally close to God. It's a lovely place."

Thank you, Al, for the countless hours spent making the suncatchers, and thank you to everyone who donated to our successful fundraising event. You can now enjoy Al's artistry in your historic glass memento of St. James every day.

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## WARDENS' REPORT

It has been a busy time for your Wardens and the Treasurer getting ready for the Auditors to begin their work in January. We can report that we managed to make our financial statements for 2019 available to our auditors BDO on schedule this year! Todd was able to complete the package at the end of January with the last piece of data which was the investment portfolio results from the Diocese. BDO came in to the church one day in January to carry out their document audit, and there were no issues from that exercise. We await BDO's draft Financial Statements in the near future.

Last year Todd arranged for the Fire Chief of Caledon to perform a fire safety audit on our buildings. There were a small number of improvements listed from the audit which have to be completed by 2 March 2020, mainly to do with providing emergency bells and lighting in the church basement, and emergency exits from the church itself. These are now physically complete and all that is left is the various inspections by the relevant authorities. This should be complete by the last week in February.

The roof campaign was an amazing success and your donations totaled some \$36,000! So, with the monies already donated to the roof fund we are well on the way to meeting the quoted costs. The Renovation Guys have been unfortunately beaten by the weather in November last year, but we hope to see them early in the Spring!



It was a joy to have Bishop Jenny here on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of February. She gave another amazing sermon, and I am sure we all were pleased to have Father Chris formally installed as our Incumbent.
