I. God is the Source

Whom is 2 Corinthians 9:10 describing? What two pictures does it give us?

What is said about God in 2 Corinthians 9:8?

How would you describe God as provider and supplier?

What do Psalm 104:24 and Colossians 1:17 tell us about God?

Why do we have the tendency to want to divide between what belongs to God and what belongs to us?

What does Psalm 24:1 tell us about this?

Describe how Adam and Eve rebelled against God as the supplier and provider?

II. God Will Provide

What does 2 Corinthians 9:10 tell us that God will do to our store of seed?

Why do we often feel inadequate about the plan and the purpose and the ministry; the sowing of seed that God wants us to do?

What kinds of things do you say when you feel inadequate about yourself?

What did Moses tell Joshua in Deuteronomy 31:8?

How do we become insecure about “the supply” that we have in our physical lives?

Why do we believe that God will provide? Describe this God.

Is God’s provision always what we expect? Explain.

III. Results

Read 2 Corinthians 9:10 again. What is the result of God supplying that is told to us at the end of verse 10?

What other word could be used for “harvest” in 2 Corinthians 9:10?

How do you define the word “righteousness”?

How does the word suggest that righteousness is subjective? Why is the righteousness as described in verse 10 not subjective?

What does it mean to have a harvest of righteousness in our lives?

What is the next result that is told to us in the first part of 2 Corinthians 9:11?

We often think of being generous as pertaining to the amount given. The Greek word here means: “with simplicity, with sincerity and devotion”. How does this impact the meaning of the word “generous”?

What is the message about God given to us at the end of 2 Corinthians 9:11?

How is it easy to lose our focus when people respond to our giving and serving?

Where do you need to trust in God’s supply and provision in your lives?
