Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire. God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.

Matthew 11:16-19, 25-26 The Message **27-30** The Voice Hear these words of Jesus... he speaks of judging by appearances... he speaks of the ordinary folk of life knowing what the truth of living faithfully is... he speaks of God's willingness to share the burdens of our living so that we can live love in the world. Jesus said...

16-19 "How can I account for this generation? The people have been like spoiled children whining to their parents, 'We wanted to skip rope, and you were always too tired; we wanted to talk, but you were always too busy.' John came fasting and they called him crazy. I came feasting and they called me a lush, a friend of the riffraff. Opinion polls don't count for much, do they? The proof of the pudding is in the eating."

25-26 Abruptly Jesus broke into prayer: "Thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth. You've concealed your ways from sophisticates and know-it-alls, but spelled them out clearly to ordinary people. Yes, Father, that's the way you like to work."

27 Jesus resumed talking to the people, but now tenderly. "The Father has given me all these things to do and say. This is a unique Father-Son operation, coming out of Father and Son intimacies and knowledge. No one knows the Son the way the Father does, nor the Father the way the Son does. But I'm not keeping it to myself; I'm ready to go over it line by line with anyone willing to listen.

28 Come to Me, all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. 29 Put My yoke upon your

shoulders—it might appear heavy at first, but it is perfectly fitted to your curves. Learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble of heart. When you are yoked to Me, your weary souls will find rest. 30 For My yoke is easy, and My burden is light.

Today, our Hebrew Scripture reading speaks to us of hospitality and following God into the unknown. Abraham sent out his servant, Eliezer, to find a wife for his son Isaac. Eliezer returns to Mesopotamia, the land of Abraham's birth, to find a wife.

Genesis 24:42-49 The Message

42-44 "Well, when I came this very day to the spring, I prayed, 'God, God of my master Abraham, make things turn out well in this task I've been given. I'm standing at this well. When a young woman comes here to draw water and I say to her, Please, give me a sip of water from your jug, and she says, Not only will I give you a drink, I'll also

water your camels—let that woman be the wife God has picked out for my master's son.'

45-48 "I had barely finished offering this prayer, when Rebekah arrived, her jug on her shoulder. She went to the spring and drew water and I said, 'Please, can I have a drink?' She didn't hesitate. She held out her jug and said, 'Drink; and when you're finished I'll also water your camels.' I drank, and she watered the camels. I asked her, 'Whose daughter are you?' She said, 'The daughter of Bethuel whose parents were Nahor and Milcah.' I gave her a ring for her nose, bracelets for her arms, and bowed in worship to God. I praised God, the God of my master Abraham who had led me straight to the door of my master's family to get a wife for his son.

49 "Now, tell me what you are going to do. If you plan to respond with a generous yes, tell me. But if not, tell me plainly so I can figure out what to do next."

Following this, Eliezer reaches a marriage bargain with Rebekah's parents and Rebekah returns to Canaan with him to be Isaac's wife.

Message/Reflection: In this together

I chose two of the readings that are in the common lectionary for today.

One is from the Gospel of Mark giving us the voice of Jesus that reminded us that God speaks to all of us and will share our burdens with us. In this reading, Jesus clearly names that humanity can be very fickle and contrary, judging people without knowing their stories, dismissing those who are different.

In the midst of this naming of the foibles of people Jesus stops and turns to God.

In his prayer he names his frustration, he reminds himself that God works with and through everyone. After connecting with the Holy, we see him calm down and take a different approach.

He reminds the people around him that he is willing to share the power and knowledge of God with them when they are willing to listen. He reminds them that, they too, can share their frustrations with God and in doing so, their burdens will be lifted.

"Come to me," he says, "Learn from Me" The implication is that when our burdens are shared, they are more manageable. When we are willing to learn of new ways of doing things, when we calm down, a different approach may be what we need to see the richness of life instead of the torn fabric.

The second reading comes to us from the Hebrew Scriptures. These are scriptures that would have

been part of Jesus faith upbringing. These are the stories that he would have grown in his faith knowing and exploring.

This Genesis reading introduces us to Rebekah. As with many of our biblical characters, if we were to hear more we would find out that Rebekah carried burdens and made mistakes. But in the snapshot that we explore today, we see goodness and faith that would move her forward in her life journey in unexpected ways.

She meets a stranger at the well. The stranger asks her for water, for hospitality, she offers much more than is needed. She meets, greets and exceeds the minimum needed in that moment. Because of her generous hospitality, she finds herself on a journey that would take her away from her family, her homeland and all that is dear to her. She follows these calls to journey in unfamiliar ways with courage and faith.

God guides Eliezer to find her. Her parents invite her voice into a decision about her future – a most unusual thing by most accounts. God is with her on the journey.

There are many times when we find ourselves being challenged to hear God's voice. We resist. We don't like being told we've made mistakes. We don't like being told that we need to go in a totally different direction than we have been travelling. We tend to

experience those reactions individually. We have forgotten that sharing and working together is what invites us into new ways of being and loving God's world. It makes the whole world a better place.

We forget that it is entirely possible that God is standing before us asking us for a small piece of hospitality and hoping that we have learned to offer more than is needed for the Love of God.

The opportunities to be hospitable, to care come to us in many ways, times and places. The challenge to be the best that we are is only sustainable if we will work together as God's Loving People and with our Loving God.

Last week, Shaune Switzer, in his weekly music gift to us, sang the song "Landslide" by Fleetwood Mac. This song is about changes in life, it is about life struggles and relationships. It speaks of the challenges of changing directions. It speaks of the need to do things differently for the good and success of others.

In the lyrics we might recognize the challenge that Jesus gives the people to re-think how they perceive others, how they share their burdens and live their faith.

I wonder if, in the introductory story of Rebekah, Jesus might have recognized the value of responding with abundance? In Rebekah's story might Jesus have seen the value of calling on God to offer solutions, of consulting with others to create the best outcome.

We continue to live in a world that seems to be spinning out of control. We are still being asked to be on a controlled road of separation for the sake of others. We are now also being asked to examine the way we live to see if it is tilted toward favouring portions of God's people above others.

In today's readings and in the Landslide song, I hear reminders to us to offer abundant hospitality, to be part of a world that offers more than is asked for (not less), to truly listen to people's stories and to be unafraid to speak and hear the truth even when it makes us uncomfortable.

I hear that questions are important, that naming our frustrations and wonderings about what happens next are normal and good. I hear that we do better when we share and work together for the good of the world and that God knows our struggles to be the best we can be and has promised to walk with us in and to the unknown.

In this time of unrest, I invite us to take some time and talk to God about our frustrations and our wonderings about how we can live well through this. I invite us to stop and see God in the faces and voices of the people who need our care and compassion in abundance. I invite us to ask ourselves how abundantly we are offering

hospitality to God's world? Are we trying to do this alone or are we sharing and teaming up together?

Come to me, says God. Learn from me, says Jesus. How are we responding to God's invitation?

Offering Invitation

Almighty God,

You come to the well asking for our hospitality, asking for us to offer you welcome. You remind us that burdens shared become opportunities of caring. As we hear your words today, may we respond with graciousness, compassion and humility as we offer our best to welcome you here. **Amen.**
