Scripture Reading(s):

Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire.

God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.

Ezekiel 37:1-14

This story may be one of the best known in Ezekiel's prophecies. God's promise of a new heart and a new spirit echoes Jeremiah's new covenant prophecy (Jeremiah 31:31-34). What God's people need more than anything is for God to do a work of grace within them.

Like other prophets of his day, Ezekiel was convinced that heaven must intervene in order to fix what was wrong on earth. It was not enough for people to try harder and do better.

Ezekiel said that this work of grace begins with God cleansing the people with fresh water. Idolatry and various sins made them impure and unclean, so before they could be restored, they must be made pure by the washing of water. Then, once God gave them a new heart, the people would become willing covenant partners; they would give up on their rebellious, hurtful ways and embrace God's designs for their lives. With a new spirit—which seems to be nothing other than God's Spirit living in and among them—they would have the desire and ability to live out God's reasonable demands on them.

God insisted that all God intended to do to save and redeem was to restore God's good name. God's covenant people have given God a bad reputation among the nations, so God had to act so that they could restore God's reputation.

God is not only the Creator of life, but also the Restorer of life.

Ezekiel 37:1-14 The Voice

Ezekial:1-2

The Eternal had a hold on me, and I couldn't escape it. The divine wind of the Eternal One picked me up and set me down in the middle of the valley, but this time it was full of

bones. God led me through the bones. There were piles of bones everywhere in the valley—dry bones left unburied.

Eternal One: 3

Son of man, do you think these bones can live?

Ezekiel:

Eternal Lord, certainly You know the answer better than I do.

Eternal One: 4-6

Actually, I do. Prophesy to these bones. Tell them to listen to what the Eternal Lord says to them:

"Dry bones, I will breathe breath into you, and you will come alive. I will attach muscles and tendons to you, cause flesh to grow over them, and cover you with skin. I will breathe breath into you, and you will come alive. After this happens, you will know that I am the Eternal."

Ezekiel: 7-8

So I did what God told me to do: I prophesied to the bones. As I was speaking, I heard a loud noise—a rattling sound—and all the bones began to come together and form complete skeletons. I watched and saw muscles and tendons attach to the bones, flesh grow over them, and skin wrap itself around the reforming bodies. But there was still no breath in them.

Eternal One: 9

Prophesy to the breath. Speak, son of man, and tell them what the Eternal Lord has to say: "O sweet breath, come from the four winds and breathe into these who have been killed. Make these corpses come alive."

Ezekiel: 10

So I did what God told me to do: I prophesied to the breath. As I was speaking, breath invaded the lifeless. The bodies came alive and stood on their feet. I realized then I was looking at a great army.

Eternal One: 11

Son of man, these bones are the entire community of Israel. They keep saying, "Our bones are dry now, picked clean by scavengers. All hope is gone. Our nation is lost."

Ezekiel 12-13

He told me to prophesy and tell them what He said.

Eternal One: 14-15

Pay attention, My people! I am going to open your graves and bring you back to life! I will carry you straight back to the land of Israel. Then you will know that I am the Eternal One. I will breathe My Spirit into you, and you will be alive once again. I will place you back in your own land. After that you will know I, the Eternal, have done what I said I would do.

Ezekiel: So said the Eternal One.

Prayer for Grace

During the season of Lent, we are asked, through story and conversation to explore what living in faith means for us. We are asked to consider our commitment to God. We are to think about the attitudes, decisions and words we use.

What would God have us choose?

Faithful and Patient God,
In this Lenten time of contemplation
and faith-filled searching for your truth,
We recognize that we need
to take time to really listen for you.
We say that we love you
and follow the example that Jesus gave us...but...
we get caught up in our moments of challenge,

we forget to stop and feel
your presence beside us.
We let fear replace our faith.
We make decisions based on our own needs
We ask the question
"Why is this happening to me, God?"
Instead of admitting
"I need your strength to do this"
Shake us up, God,
Make us uncomfortable.

Remind us again that you stand with us offering courage, strength and wisdom Remind us again that the world does not revolve around us it revolves around you. May your words and wisdom soak into our soul, loving us, leading us, Be with us as we learn to journey together with you. Amen

Words of Assurance

In all of our stories of God, we hear God's voice with us.

Every day God gives us boundaries to hold us together and sign posts to move us forward.

Every day, God is with us, waiting for us, loving us.

God said: I will be their God, and they will be my people.

God is. We are.

God is with us. We are not alone. Thanks be to God.

Message/Reflections... Life giving breath.

This Old Testament picture of God breathing life into something that was scattered and life-less is an amazing miracle.

People had not been receptive to the life giving, life guiding word of God and had become so dry, so disconnected that they fell apart. The breath of God, the connection to God was what brought them back to life.

In the scripture introduction, we heard that Ezekiel observed that it would take more than a few people offering their best to turn the world around. It would take the power of God. We also heard that God acted because the actions and words of the people were ruining God's reputation and that this had to be stopped.

I read this scripture and thought about how it speaks to the world today. Our world appears to be falling apart around us, we feel as though we are disconnected within ourselves and from our communities. We are being asked to live in different ways than we ever have before. There are times when we feel as though our bones are falling apart and we don't know how to pull them together again.

From the words and story of a prophet of old, who hadn't yet met Jesus but who knew God we find an answer: Listen for God. Stop running scared. Stop thinking that we have the solution by ourselves. It is not enough for one person to do their best. We must do it together.

Currently, Dr. Deena Hinshaw, our Alberta Health Officer, holds the role of a prophet in our world. She is able, with a team of knowledgeable people to see how we can work together to keep ourselves well, living, connected. She is telling us that what is important at the moment is to make every daily decision with our family and neighbour in mind.

We cannot be running off alone... because doing that may collapse a whole society, a whole group of people.

The first breath of God into our lives is that of love. We are offered love. We are asked to share love. We are asked like Ezekiel, to stand to the side of the broken and disconnected and prophecy to the power of loving and living together. As people of the church, with God's reputation in our hands, we are asked to pause and think how we will do this.

The first thing Ezekiel did was to remind people that God was with them and that if they were open to the spirit of God guiding their living that connections would happen again. When they felt the love of God, they would no longer be disconnected, they would not be alone. Ezekiel went out and shouted to the bones who weren't sure

that they wanted to hear that God was with them. When he persisted, when they heard, they began to come together.

Our churches and communities have felt disconnected, but as we have heard and reacted to sharing love in our communities, we have begun to come together. We have phone trees with folk calling others. In the calls shared both callers and recipients are finding joy and sharing that is bringing us back together. Our local towns are exploring how to ensure that every person is shown that they are cared for. Our local businesses are finding ways to offer support in very different ways.

The Spirit of Love is moving through us again.

In the Ezekiel story, even as love and life was offered to them, the people whined and said "but it's not the same, we need it fixed now, we can't do anything to help"

And God said: "Smarten up! I will bring you out of the misery into something better. It won't be what you are used to, but I will be with you and I will give what you need to live well again"

In our current story, many of us are whining too. Life is not the same as it was. We think that what we can do won't make a difference.

Hear God's voice saying to us "Smarten up!"
We can remember that "Loving our Neighbour"
commandment given to people thousands of years after
Ezekiel, and we know that we can do something.

We can stop for God. Light a candle. Say a prayer. Offer your frustrations to God. Listen for God's words of love, hope and action. Feel that Spirit move you to be God in the world in different and wonderful ways.

We can stay home. We can call people on the phone – just for a chat. Many of us are able to figure out the intricacies of online video chats... and then we can see faces – more than one at a time! – along with the voices. We can help our wobbly bones stand together. We can ask who needs help and then call on others to make it happen.

God connects us through many generations of story, many generations of love. We know this. As people who say we love God and follow Jesus, we know what we are to do. What are our words and actions doing to God's reputation in the world?

Let us open our spirit to God so that we can gather our bones together. Let us remember that God has the wisdom to knit us together in ways that will move us forward into new living together, connected by love for God and love for each other.
