Background Checks... Really?

With September comes the time to gear back up all of the Fall activities and programs. **On September 13th**, BLAST starts firing on all cylinders again with activities in Creation, Thou Art, Acts 2, and Daily Bread. That morning (at 9am), we will have a Volunteer Training for adults who will be coordinating, participating and helping with BLAST. In addition to going over child safety guidelines, every volunteer will have to fill out forms that allow us to do a police background check. Even people who have been long-term members of the congregation and helped out before will need to do this.

There is an obvious question that immediately emerges, *Is all this really necessary?* **The quick and clear answer is, YES!**

From a legal standpoint, we are legally responsible for the health and well-being of the children when they participate in our program. If we have not taken appropriate measures to make sure inappropriate adults have been allowed access to our children, then the congregation will be held legally responsible.

Financially, insurance companies are beginning to deny coverage to congregations who are not taking these necessary precautions to provide for the safety of the children and, hence, open themselves up to legal action.

But even more fundamental than these legal and financial reasons, is the simple commitment that we have to do what we can to make sure that Church of the Cross is a safe and life-giving place for all people who participate here. Each Sunday before we release the children to head off to BLAST, we invite the congregation to extend their hands with palms up toward the children. We do this as a gesture to recognize that all the blessings that we have received come from God. These blessings include food, shelter, health, relationships, and the knowledge and revelation of God through Jesus the Christ. As we extend our hands toward our children in worship, we indicate our heartfelt desire to have them receive these blessings and especially to receive the stories of the Bible that give depth and understanding to God's love and grace.

Can you imagine a worse tragedy than to send them off to BLAST and to—unknowingly—expose them to someone whose intentions are other than the spiritual and physical well-being of the children?

Our policy is clear... whoever is involved in any of our children's or young people's ministries (BLAST, youth group, confirmation, summer camp, etc.) must go to a volunteer orientation.

The first one is 9am, Sunday, September 13th.

Aren't our children worth it?

The Holy Spirit's Call to Action

I recently served senior youth week at Camp Kuriakos; 5 days with students, grades 9-12. We spent an entire day dealing with the subject of persecution and our call as Christians to be of service to those who suffer.

As we dealt with this spectacularly large topic, this Hindu proverb came to mind:

There are three mysteries of life: water to the fish, air to the bird, and you to yourself.

We grow so accustomed to our freedoms and privileges that it is easy to forget that we have them. Our freedoms and privileges become invisible to us, like water to the fish and air to the bird, so much so that we can forget that not everyone is free.

Some people are oppressed in physical ways: they are jailed, or have their travel restricted. Or they suffer from a lack of resources that cause daily hardships; a lack of water,

transportation, food, or medical supplies can create oppressive living situations and even cause death.

Other people are oppressed mentally or spiritually: they are not free to worship, their talents and efforts are rejected, or they are ostracized from their community by their sexuality, age, tribal affiliations, physical characteristics, or other things beyond their control. Some people are caught in the crossfire of violent conflicts. They are forced from their homes, or maimed or killed for a myriad of other reasons.

What is the source of oppression and persecution? It seems to me that human beings in general can be viciously cruel by nature, especially when their power

or wealth is threatened or they are afraid. When people have something to lose, they can put a lot of energy into trying to protect it at all costs.

Perhaps this is why Jesus taught his disciples (and us) to "store up treasure for ourselves in heaven." Perhaps Jesus was teaching us all to live like we have nothing to lose, and to lend a hand and our hearts to those who have lost everything.

This verse, written by St. Paul to the church in Galatia, also comes to mind:

For freedom Christ has made you free, so submit yourselves to the yoke of slavery no longer.

Galatians 5:1

We are called to be free from the encumbrance of protecting our position, wealth, and power, and therefore to be free from the vicious cruelty that can accompany the fear of their loss. We are called

to be free from selfish gain and lust for the things that corrupt our spirits and the spirit of the radical welcome and hospitality Jesus offers to all.

These freedoms are not just for us; our freedoms call us to work on behalf or freedom itself for the life of the whole world. As Fannie Lou Hamer, the famous civil rights activist once said, "No one is free until everybody's free." That's what I saw at camp. I pray that a new vision of freedom, and the responsibilities that come with it, will belong to all of us.

The ELCIC National Convention July 9-12 2015

The 2015 ELCIC National Convention met under the theme of Lutheran World Federation's preparation for the 500th anniversary of the Reformation: "Liberated by God's Grace." This banner flies over all national conventions of the LWF partners from now through 2017.

Here are highlights of the actions of the convention at a glance

Reformation Challenge

In honor of the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation, the ELCIC will challenge ourselves over the next three years to:

- 500 new refugee sponsorships
- 500 new bursaries for students in schools of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land
- 500,000 trees to be planted in Canada and around the world
- \$500,000.00 to be raised for the Lutheran World Federation Endowment Fund

National Bishop Susan Johnson Re-Elected To Third Term

Bishop Johnson is the fourth bishop to serve the ELCIC. This will be her third four-year term as National Bishop. She was first elected in 2007 and re-elected in convention on the third ballot.

Constitution and Bylaws Approved

Constitutional changes give greater flexibility to the gathered national assembly, allow for a smaller National Convention (which will be held every three years rather than biennially) and create a smaller National Church Council. Under the new constitution, synod will select delegates to the National Convention.

Policy Regarding Authorization of Lay Ministers

A 2-year church-wide study process was conducted to explore the current reality of rostered ministry in underserved communities. The resulting policy allows synods to authorize lay ministers to function in pastoral roles.

The Doctrine of Discovery

The ELCIC in convention repudiated and renounced the Doctrine of Discovery as fundamentally opposed to the gospel of Jesus Christ and our understanding of the inherent rights that individuals and peoples have received from

God. The Doctrine of Discovery was adopted by European countries in the 15th century, and endorsed Christianity as superior to other world religions. It began colonialism and the age of imperialism. The repudiation of this doctrine is a new gateway in making reconciliation with indigenous people our constant and practiced way of life.



Climate Justice

The ELCIC affirmed the position of the Lutheran World Federation on climate

justice and among other actions, calls upon its members and congregations to become eco-friendly with a goal of becoming carbon-neutral by 2050.

Criminal Justice

The "ELCIC Resolution on the Criminal Justice and Correctional Systems in Canada," among other things, invites all congregations and members of the ELCIC to seek a deeper understanding of Canada's criminal justice and correctional system. It encourages congregations and members to engage in projects, programs, and ministries that provide support for victims, offenders, and correctional services staff. A key focus of the church's interest is in restorative justice.

Welcoming the Stranger

The convention endorsed a pledge to welcome strangers, refugees and internally displaced persons while challenging others to do the same.

An expanded version of these highlights is available in the August 2015 church council minutes.



Soup sisters will restart on Oct 1st.

THREE vegetable soups will be made: a summer borscht, a summer squash and a summer greens soup. We will utilize crops from gardens. The summer greens needs 4 lbs of zucchini, onions, garlic, broccoli florets and stems, spinach, kale and Swiss chard.

The sweet summer soup needs carrots, ginger, orange juice, yams, sweet potatoes and red lentils.

For the Borscht we need beets and their tender tops, carrots, cabbage, tomato juice, fresh dill and parsley, celery and Swiss chard.



Message from our Bishop

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ -

I thank my God every time I remember you... (Philippians 1:3).

This year I am inviting you to reflect on portions of Paul's

letter, to all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi (1:1b), as you gather for church council, adult study, youth group, coffee group and are engaged in learning, discernment and reflection together. Relying heavily on the writings of Fred Craddock and of David Lose, each article will include a brief reflection on a Scripture passage, questions for reflection and discussion, and a prayer. I encourage you, as we begin, to read Paul's letter in its entirety in one sitting; remembering as you read that this is a letter – of Paul –

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Philippians 4:4

to a church.

What does it mean to rejoice? Really? We may say that word all the time...at least in church. And we've read it here in Paul's letter numerous times already. But what does it mean, really?

In brief, rejoicing is simply to take joy in something, or to be more precise, to rejoice is to experience and express delight. Both of those verbs matter. It is one thing to experience delight, to be aware, that is, of something bringing you delight, joy, pleasure or contentment. That's important. But expressing it matters too. It matters a great deal, actually, because expressing our delight helps us not only become more aware of it but also to share this experience with others. Expressing it, that is, often multiplies its benefit. So it's one thing to experience delight – which is great – and it's another to express delight – that's even better.

But notice that Paul doesn't only say rejoice, he says "rejoice in the Lord." What does he mean? Simply that in this relationship there is the potential to experience faith, hope, love, contentment, confidence, courage, and more. And as we notice these things – that prayer brings a sense of confidence and contentment, that singing a hymn raises our spirits, that reading Scripture may strengthen our

faith and grant us courage to face the challenges ahead – we also discover ways to give them voice. And as we voice these things, they grow.

So delight in the gifts you receive from God's relationship with you...and express them. Give thanks for what is beautiful and hard and challenging and hopeful in your life and in your life of faith and see what happens.

Or, as Paul says, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say it, Rejoice!"

Read and Reflect: Philippians 4:4 Discuss and Reflect:

What in this reading leads you to say, "I wonder about...", or, "I noticed..."

Comment on the following: rejoicing is simply to take joy in something, or to be more precise, to rejoice is to experience and express delight. Both of those verbs matter.

Comment on the following: Paul doesn't only say rejoice, he says "rejoice in the Lord." What does he mean?

Share together the gifts you receive from God and from one another. Express them. Give thanks. Rejoice.

Pray together: Gracious God, help us not just to notice the blessings of this life and our life with you, but also to name them, give thanks for them, share them with others, and see them multiply. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen (Philippians 4:23).

The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 15:13).




Around Town
