At the end of August, we get to see the final results of our annual "summer slump" in offerings. We did not fare well this year. Our Open & Envelope offerings were under the budget we passed for 2018 by \$21,950.22. We are also under our August 2017 total offerings by about \$10, 000.00. It is hard to put any kind of positive spin on these numbers. We have to be thankful that we have the Project Account to cover the growing deficit. However, as that account is shrinking, Parish Council has passed a motion that we not pay our Diocesan assessment or the \$1,000.00 per month we were applying to the building loan interest, until such time as our cash flow improves.

We must continue to be vigilant about our expenses and encourage everyone to keep their offerings up to date. It sure would help if we could get more people to sign up for Direct Deposit.

THE LATEST NEWS FROM OUR EUROPEAN CORRESPONDENT

The following is an article submitted by Roseleagh Lalande. She and Claude are currently on vacation in Spain and have a very interesting story to tell.

Read on ...

Hi St. Paul's parishioners,

Some of you may know that I have finally retired. Claude and I decided to take a European holiday and have some quality family time with our two sons here and their families. We headed off to Edinburgh and had a lovely time with our son Eric and family.

On September 1st, Claude and I started walking the Camino. There are lots of Caminos but we decided to do the one starting in St Jean Pieds du Port in France and trek the 800 kms to Santiago de Compostela known as "The way of St. James". For those of you who are unaware a bit if history for you. There is no historical record that James preached in Galicia but there is testimony to that effect. It is said that after Christ was crucified James sailed to Galicia and started his ministry here. It seems he met with limited success and he returned to Jerusalem where he was beheaded by Herod. His disciples brought his body back to Finisterre for burial. Queen Luna vowed to destroy his body, so his disciples escaped over the river Tambre with the bridge collapsing as soon as they has crossed. They laid James body to rest in Libredon now Santiago.

The story starts again in 813 a.d. when a shepherd was drawn to a field by a bright star. The bishop of Iris Flavia confirmed the discovery of the grave of the apostle and the story of st. James was resurrected.

The Middle Ages saw lots of pilgrims traverse this route once the crusades collapsed and they lost accessibility to the holy land. The way is portrayed all along the route with a scallop shell. This is the map that Claude and I are following which can be challenging at the best of times. We have not got seriously lost yet and we have completed 500kms.

We started in St. Jean Pieds du Port with a two day strenuous hike up the Pyrenees. Needless to say it was an arduous climb. We stay in Albergues which are definitely out of our comfort zone. Some Albergues sleep a couple of hundred people in-bunk beds. Lots of night noises going on! We have shared bathrooms and a pilgrim meal together.

We have visited many churches from medieval times along the way and have received the "pilgrim " blessing. I can't begin to describe to you the attitude of the pilgrims. An Albergue posted a sign which stated " tourists demand. Pilgrims give thanks. "We have had great conversations and laughter with people when we can't understand their language. Somehow we find a commonality. We walk about 25 kms per day. It has been unusually hot so we are up early and usually on the road in the dark by 6:30 and stop by 2:00 p.m. We have taken two days off, one in Pamplona and one in León. Great to explore these two fabulous cities and rest our feet.
