In today's Gospel lesson Jesus is teaching the disciples the difference between the words that we speak versus the things that we eat. There was a law back in Biblical times you could not eat with "defiled" hands. This is not too far from where we are today with the mandate to wash our hands often and use hand sanitizer, etc.

When we say mean, hurtful, angry words (and I would add when we text or email them) it is like pounding a nail into a wooden fence post. You cannot change what has been said, you can certainly seek forgiveness and apologize. But even though you can take the nail out of the post, the hole is still there.

God calls us to use words to build up one another and to encourage. We must watch what we say, as my mother taught, and to use words to uplift, help, assist, bring comfort and help another.

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Confession and Forgiveness

All may make the sign of the cross, the sign marked at baptism, as the presiding minister begins.

Word

First Reading: Isaiah 56:1, 6-8

The prophet calls upon Israel to do justice in view of God's imminent intervention to save. Righteousness and obedience define who belongs to the Israelite community—not race, nationality, or any other category.

1Thus says the Lord:

Maintain justice, and do what is right, for soon my salvation will come, and my deliverance be revealed.

6And the foreigners who join themselves to the Lord, to minister to him, to love the name of the Lord, and to be his servants, all who keep the sabbath, and do not profane it, and hold fast my covenant—
7these I will bring to my holy mountain,

and make them joyful in my house of prayer;

their burnt offerings and their sacrifices will be accepted on my altar;

for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples.

8Thus says the Lord God, who gathers the outcasts of Israel, I will gather others to them

besides those already gathered.

Psalm: Psalm 67

Second Reading: Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32

God has not rejected Israel. Rather, the call and gifts of God are irrevocable so that, while all have been disobedient, God has mercy upon all.

[Paul writes:] 1I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. 2aGod has not rejected his people whom he foreknew.

29For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. 30Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, 31so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. 32For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

Gospel: Matthew 15:[10-20] 21-28

Jesus teaches his disciples that true purity is a matter of the heart rather than outward religious observances. Almost immediately, this teaching is tested when a woman considered to be a religious outsider approaches him for help.

[10[Jesus] called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand:11it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." 12Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" 13He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. 14Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." 15But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." 16Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? 17Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? 18But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. 19For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. 20These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."]

21Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. 22Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." 23But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." 24He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." 25But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord,

help me." 26He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." 27She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." 28Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.



Sermon

Words Matter

Signs, Signs, everywhere there's signs was a hit song in the 1970's by the Five Man Electrical Band. The song talked about signs and how much power they had then and still have over us today. I mean who among us hasn't seen on Social Media "The Sign Guy?" This guy stands on a street with sunglasses and holds up a cardboard sign with different messages.

I am fascinated by words, aren't you? They have so, so much power, our words. I am sure you all know the power or words. They hurt us, sometimes forever. They can also build us up and encourage us. In fact, there are several Bible verses about the words that we use.

Proverbs has several, like Proverbs 15:4 "Gentle words bring life..." or Psalm 19: "Let the words of my mouth be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord." Ephesians chapter 4 "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths but only what is helpful for building others up." There are many others but it's clear God wants us to speak in love and grace.

In today's Gospel story Jesus is again confronting the Pharisees and, at the same time, giving a life lesson for the disciples (which includes us). There was a law (not unlike today perhaps) that said you must wash your hands before you eat, or your food would be defiled. Jesus is teaching it is NOT what goes into your mouth, but what comes out and what comes out comes from the heart the Lord teaches.

Our hearts! Really? Didn't you think, like me, speech came from a place in our brain? Either way the heart is where words come, and angry heart...well, we've all been there. We use words to intentionally tear down just as easily as we can use words to build up. The choice is ours and it is up to us. Jesus knows our hearts.... darkened by sin, we are liars and cheaters and we often speak carelessly.

The good news is that we can go back and apologize, we can seek forgiveness for what we have said and I know we have all been there, done that. Words are like hammering a nail into a fence post. We can pull the nail back out but the hole is still there. If you have a "hole" in your heart today by words said to you in the past, let them go, forgive the speaker and change those words to God's words.

In The Gospel of John we are introduced to the "Word made flesh!" All of God's words are summed up in Jesus...who spoke extraordinarily little from the Cross. But went there as God's sacrifice for us all, and died for us, and then the sign said "Resurrection!" The Lord defeated death and that gives you and I hope we can start anew, we can "re-speak" so to speak!!

English is a very odd language I believe...as a Chaplain I would often, tongue in cheek, tell patients they needed to be patient! Isn't it fascinating these two words look and sound alike and go together? Unlike, perhaps, the "terminal" at the airport or my doctor having a "practice" and don't even get me started on Colonial or Bologna!

I remember seeing signs all around after 9-11 all saying the same message: God Bless America! And one of those signs the letter "D" had dropped off. And friends, I think that's a great message for us today speaking of signs! Let us change our words to offer words of encouragement, hope and love as you and I leave today to "Go_ Bless America!

Apostles' Creed
