Integrity: A Foundation for the Body of Christ

Over and over again, the writers of the New Testament instruct the early church to "build up the body of Christ."

St. Paul's image? The human body: "The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you!' " (1 Corinthians 12)

The author of Acts? a community of believers, pooling resources and holding all things in common, for the good of all, so there was no one in need of anything (Acts 4:32-35).

Each community in the early development of the church has a trademark characteristic, whether it is hospitality, generosity, or prayer, that lends its support for ministry. Although the characteristics and strengths of Christian communities may differ, they all have one thing in common: The community cannot stand if it doesn't have integrity.

Simply put, "integrity" means giving your word and keeping it. Integrity involves making promises, and then living up to the promises you have made.

How does integrity support and encourage members of the church today?

Nothing can happen unless you give your word. There is no church, just as in the beginning there was no light, until a word is spoken. And a word, once given, must be kept in order for promises to be fulfilled. For example, It is one thing to say, "I will be at church every Sunday;" and it is another thing entirely to keep that word. As life happens (births, sicknesses, parties, opportunities, athletic events, vacations, etc.), it becomes a challenge to make it to church each week.

When faced with a challenge, most of us give in to whichever choice poses less resistance or work. "I'm too tired," we say, "to go to church today." Yet, whenever we act against the word we have given, other people suffer, sometimes in minor ways, sometimes in major ways.

What would it be like <u>for other people</u> if we made big outlandish promises and then did everything in our power to keep them? (For one thing, the church would be full of people!)

What would it be like for you if: 1) other people kept their promises; and 2) you kept your promises?

THINGS YOU CAN DO:

Give your word freely. Practice making promises and keeping them. Start small and build up. Notice how your promise making and promise keeping makes a difference or other people.

Make promises that inspire you and others. Make promises that build up the community. Be someone to whom other people can make promises. Be risky and outrageous! Who might other people get to be, if only they made bigger promises? Be

both giving and forgiving.

Consider to whom you are REALLY making promises....

Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. ² We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God. ³ And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. ⁴ In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. ⁵ For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. ⁶ For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

⁷ But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. ⁸ We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; ⁹ persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; ¹⁰ always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. ¹ Corinthians 4:1-10



Easter Sunrise worship 7:12 am Mark 16:1-8 The women discover the empty tomb and we celebrate at dawn!



God Moments

When I started writing this "God Moments" column I

had just arrived and it was really easy to recognize where God was at work in this community because it was all new to me. Now I am six months in and instead of keeping my eyes peeled for how God is working, my attention is focused on everything I have to get done each week. What once amazed me as God's work here, I now take for granted as what always happens here.

A few weeks ago as I dwelled in the Old Testament text for the fourth Sunday in Lent (Numbers 21:4-9), I thought about how the Israelites praised God for delivering them out from Egypt (Exodus 14-15) and were initially amazed by God's provision of manna (What is it?, Exodus 16:15). However, as they spent more time in the wilderness they began to take the daily miracle of manna for granted. By Numbers 21 they complain "'we detest this miserable food.' Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died." (21:5b-6). At God's

command "Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live." (21:9). They had to look up at God's to experience the life that God was offering them.

I realized that I've been looking down, taking what God is doing here for granted, when I need to look up in order to recognize what God is doing here all the time. When I look up, I begin to see how God is working here – in worship, in bible studies, in council meetings and in all the small groups – to reawaken and renew the life of this community. Lent is a great time to pause and look up to see what God is doing, and as we enter into the season of Easter I encourage you to look for how God is providing resurrection hope in your life and in the life of this community.

I have, just recently, become a much improved listener. This is because we have a new speaker in our family, my granddaughter: Melissa Teran Christensen. Granted, the majority of her speech could be best described as "qibberish", but every once in awhile she comes out with a perfectly formed sentence like "This cookie is really good" or "I'm not to play with the remote" as she merrily changes Grandpa's television station with a twinkle in her eve. But Melissa has my attention and I have learned that attentive listening whether she's babbling merrily

along or if she's gone silent....I am in tune with her every word and action.

And here at Church of the Cross, we have a new group of listeners: The LEAD

Listening Team. Our Congregation is continuing our journey to grow and develop leaders with deep, bold and consequential faith. This journey is called LEAD which stands for Living Every Day As Disciples. If you recall, last summer we completed the LEAD Assessment which helped our Council assess where we are as a congregation. From that assessment we determined the vital behavior we need to develop within our congregation is listening. This listening behavior includes listening to God, listening to our congregation and listening to the community at large.

The Listening Team training will help us hone our deep listening skills, tuning in to God more clearly, with a firm belief that God is working in others just as surely as God


is working in our own lives. Our purpose is to lead our dictation congregation into new partnerships and participating and supporting God's mission in new ways.

News from the SW Area Refugee Mission


our new name and acronym is S.W.A.R.M.—like God's busy worker bees :-)

We are delighted to share the joyous news that Ehsan Aldayoub, one of our Christian refugee friends, was married February 16/2018. Ehsan's wife Waad, is still caught in Syria and he cannot return to Syria after escaping the war 2 years ago. Their marriage in Lebanon was with travel permission from the Canadian and Lebanese governments. The bride and groom (both engineers) met in their Christian Orthodox church in Syria. We ask for prayers for this young couple, divided by war, red tape, and challenging finances. They trust that God will help them to be united in Canada.



... Bishop's Message

Dear Beloved of God -

I love the account of Jesus journeying on the road with two of his followers to Emmaus.

Their hearts are heavy with grief. As they walk they are talking with each other about all that had taken place, and while they were walking and talking, Jesus comes to them and walks with them.

"What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" Jesus asks. "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" "What things?" And the conversation continues. And then Jesus, beginning with Moses and all the prophets, interprets to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

Invited to stay with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him...and they returned that hour to Jerusalem to the eleven and their companions. Then they shared what had happened on the road, and how Jesus had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

In our increasingly polarized world, amidst fears both known and unknown, Jesus our risen Lord continues to walk with us and to make His presence known in the breaking of the bread.

Eugene Peterson in his book, Practicing Resurrection, writes: "The practice of resurrection is not a do-it-yourself self-help project. It is God's project and God is engaged full time in carrying it out. Grace is everywhere. God is Christ is actively doing for and in us everything involved in the practice of resurrection. So, what is there left for us to do? Receive. Receive the gift."

May we, this Easter, once again recognize our Risen Lord, Jesus, walking with us – opening our hearts and minds to God's living Word – and filling us with the hope and peace that surpasses our human understanding.

A HOME LITURGY FOR HOLY WEEK

Each day during Holy Week, the youngest person present at the evening meal asks a question.

Items needed: A Bible; six candles (one of them red); a palm cross; a copy of the Lord's prayer; a bottle of perfume; a small purse with coins; a bowl of water and a hand towel; a wooden cross; the makings of an Easter garden and a special Easter candle (see the activities for Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday for details).

Palm Sunday

Place six candles on the family table and arrange them in the shape of a circle. Light the six candles. Place a palm cross in the center of the circle.

Reading: Mark 11:1-11

When they were nearing Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany on Mount Olives, he sent off two of the disciples with instructions: "Go to the village across from you. As soon as you enter, you'll find a colt tethered, one that has never yet been ridden. Untie it and bring it. If anyone asks, 'What are you doing?' say, 'The Master needs him, and will return him right away.' " 4-7 They went and found a colt tied to a door at the street corner and untied it. Some of those standing there said, "What are you doing untying that colt?" The disciples replied exactly as Jesus had instructed them, and the people let them alone. They brought the colt to Jesus, spread their coats on it, and he mounted. ⁸⁻¹⁰ The people gave him a wonderful welcome, some throwing their coats on the street, others spreading out rushes they had cut in the fields. Running ahead and following after, they were calling out,

Hosanna!

Blessed is the One who comes in God's name! Blessed the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in highest heaven!

¹¹ [Jesus] entered Jerusalem, then entered the Temple. He looked around, taking it all in. But by now it was late, so he went back to Bethany with the Twelve.

Question: "Why do we have six candles and this palm cross on the table today?"

Answer: "Because this is Holy Week. In six days, it's Good Friday, and Easter is coming. Today we remember how all the people welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem by waving palm branches."

(You might discuss the ways your family welcomes Jesus into your home.)

Holy Monday

Light five of the candles in the circle. Place a copy of the Lord's prayer in the center of the circle.

Reading: Mark 11:15-19

^{15–17} [Jesus and his disciples] arrived at Jerusalem. Immediately on entering the Temple Jesus started throwing out everyone who had set up shop there, buying and selling. He kicked over the tables of the bankers and the stalls of the pigeon merchants. He didn't let anyone even carry a basket through the Temple. And then he taught them, quoting this text:

My house was designated a house of prayer for the nations;

You've turned it into a hangout for thieves.

¹⁸ The high priests and religion scholars heard what was going on and plotted how they might get rid of him. They panicked, for the entire crowd was carried away by his teaching.

¹⁹ At evening, Jesus and his disciples left the city.

Question: "Why do we have five candles and the Lord's Prayer on the table today?"

Answer: "Because this is Holy Week. In five days, it's Good Friday, and Easter is coming. Today we remember that Jesus threw the money-changers out of the temple. 'My house shall be called a house of prayer,' he told them. His special prayer is for us all."

(You might discuss the ways your family prays together.)

Holy Tuesday

Light four of the candles in the circle. Place a bottle of perfume in the center of the circle.

Reading: Mark 14:3-9

Jesus was at Bethany, a guest of Simon the Leper. While he was eating dinner, a woman came up carrying a bottle of very expensive perfume. Opening the bottle, she poured it on his head. Some of the guests became furious among themselves. "That's criminal! A sheer waste! This perfume could have been sold for well over a year's wages and handed out to the poor." They swelled up in anger, nearly bursting with indignation over her. ⁶⁻⁹ But Jesus said, "Let her alone. Why are you giving her a hard time? She has just done something wonderfully significant for me. You will have the poor with you every day for the rest of your lives. Whenever you feel like it, you can do something for them. Not so with me. She did what she could when she could—she pre-anointed my body for burial. And you can be sure that wherever in the whole world the Message is preached, what she just did is going to be talked about admiringly."

Question: "Why do we have four candles and some perfume on the table today?"

Answer: "Because this is Holy Week. In four days, it's Good Friday, and Easter is coming. Today we remember the woman from Bethany who anointed Jesus' head, who recognized that he was the King of all kings and would soon die."

(You might discuss the ways your family honors or praises Jesus.)

Holy Wednesday

Light three of the candles in the circle. Place a small purse with coins in it in the center of the circle.

Reading: Mark 14:10-11

^{10–11} Judas Iscariot, one of the Twelve, went to the cabal of high priests, determined to betray him. They couldn't believe their ears, and promised to pay him well. He started looking for just the right moment to hand him over.

Question: "Why do we have three candles and this purse full of money on the table today?"

Answer: "Because this is Holy Week. In three days, it's Good Friday, and Easter is coming. Today we remember that Jesus was betrayed for money, and that Jesus wants us to give what we can to help those in the world who are poor."

(You might discuss the ways your family uses money in light of today's and yesterday's readings.)

Maundy Thursday

Light two of the candles in the circle. Place a bowl of water and a hand towel in the center of the circle.

Readings: Mark 14:22-25; John 13:4-5, 12-15

Mark 14:22 In the course of their meal, having taken and blessed the bread, he broke it and gave it to them. Then he said, "Take, this is my body." Taking the chalice, he gave it to them, thanking God, and they all drank from it. He said, "This is my blood, God's new covenant, poured out for many people. I'll not be drinking wine again until the new day when I drink it in the kingdom of God." [Jesus] got up from the supper table, set aside his robe, and put on an apron. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the feet of the disciples, drying them with his apron.... After he had finished washing their feet, he took his robe, put it back on, and went back to his place at the table. 12-17 Then he said, "Do you understand what I have done to you? You address me as 'Teacher' and 'Master,' and rightly so. That is what I am. So if I, the Master and Teacher, washed your feet, you must now wash each other's feet. I've laid down a pattern for you. What I've done, you do.

Question: "Why do we have two candles and this towel and water on the table today?"

Answer: "Because this is Holy Week. One candle is for Good Friday and one is for today, Maundy Thursday. Today we remember the last Passover meal that Jesus celebrated with his friends and that he washed their feet. Our communion service is based on this meal."

(You might discuss the ways your family meals bind you together and the way the communion meal binds you together with other people.)

Good Friday

Light the red candle in the circle. Place a wooden cross in the center of the circle. Blu-tack the palm cross to the inside of your front door and leave it in place until Pentecost Sunday.

Blow out the candle.

Question: "Why did we blow out the candle today?"

Answer: "Today is Good Friday. This is the day that we remember that Jesus died and went home to God."

Reading: Mark 15:21-39

²¹ There was a man walking by, coming from work, Simon from Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. They made him carry Jesus' cross. ^{22–24} The soldiers brought Jesus to Golgotha, meaning "Skull Hill." They offered him a mild painkiller (wine mixed with myrrh), but he wouldn't take it. And they nailed him to the cross. They divided up his clothes and threw dice to see who would get them. ^{25–} 30 They nailed him up at nine o'clock in the morning. The charge against him—the king of the jews was printed on a poster. Along with him, they crucified two criminals, one to his right, the other to his left. People passing along the road jeered, shaking their heads in mock lament: "You bragged that you could tear down the Temple and then rebuild it in three days—so show us your stuff! Save yourself! If you're really God's Son, come down from that cross!" 31-32 The high priests, along with the religion scholars, were right there mixing it up with the rest of them, having a great time poking fun at him: "He saved others—but he can't save himself! Messiah, is he? King of Israel? Then let him climb down from that cross. We'll all become believers then!" Even the men crucified alongside him joined in the mockery. 33-34 At noon the sky became extremely dark. The darkness lasted three hours. At three o'clock, Jesus groaned out of the depths, crying loudly, "Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" 35-36 Some of the bystanders who heard him said, "Listen, he's calling for Elijah." Someone ran off, soaked a sponge in sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Let's see if Elijah comes to take him down." 37-39 But Jesus, with a loud cry, gave his last breath. At that moment the Temple curtain ripped right down the middle. When the Roman captain standing quard in front of him saw that he had quit breathing, he said, "This has to be the Son of God!"

(Everyone is quiet for a few minutes.)

Holy Saturday

Reading: Mark 15:42-47

^{42–45} Late in the afternoon, since it was the Day of Preparation (that is, Sabbath eve), Joseph of Arimathea, a highly respected member of the Jewish Council, came. He was one who lived expectantly, on the lookout for the kingdom of God. Working up his courage, he went to Pilate and asked for Jesus' body. Pilate questioned whether he could be dead that soon and called for the captain to verify that he was really dead. Assured by the captain, he gave Joseph the corpse. ^{46–47} Having already purchased a linen shroud, Joseph took him down, wrapped him in the shroud, placed him in a tomb that had been cut into the rock, and rolled a large stone across the opening. Mary Magdalene and Mary, mother of Joses, watched the burial.

Together make an Easter garden on a tray or a plate. An Easter garden includes a model of a cave, with a stone covering the entrance that can be rolled away on Easter Day. Spring flowers are traditionally included in the garden. use your imagination. Place your Easter garden in the center of the circle of candles.

Easter Sunday

Place a special Easter candle beside the model of the tomb/cave. Light all seven candles. Roll away the stone from the garden tomb/cave. Decorate the candle circle with flowers, Easter eggs, or anything else you would like that will make your Easter garden and candle circle festive.

Reading: Mark 16:1-8

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so they could embalm him. Very early on Sunday morning, as the sun rose, they went to the tomb. They worried out loud to each other, "Who will roll back the stone from the tomb for us?" ⁴⁻⁵ Then they looked up, saw that it had been rolled back—it was a huge stone—and walked right in. They saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed all in white. They were completely taken aback, astonished. ⁶⁻⁷ He said, "Don't be afraid. I know you're looking for Jesus the Nazarene, the One they nailed on the cross. He's been raised up; he's here no longer. You can see for yourselves that the place is empty. Now—on your way. Tell his disciples and Peter that he is going on ahead of you to Galilee. You'll see him there, exactly as he said." ⁸ They got out as fast as they could, beside themselves, their heads swimming. Stunned, they said nothing to anyone.

Question: "Why do we have Easter eggs and all these flowers and candles today?"

Answer: "Because today is Easter, the last day of Holy Week. Today we remember that Jesus rose from the dead and showed us the new life God offers to everyone, not just after we die, but through all our moments and our days now."

(Cheer or shout "Alleluia!)

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
