Clara's + Corner ...

Just in case you hadn't noticed: Easter is just around the corner.

I was thinking about how we tell the story about the Resurrection. It's not easy trying to explain something that doesn't make sense; that cannot be proved by the usual scientific methods we might want to rely on.

We can point to examples in nature of how something can die and then something different emerges – like a seed buried in the earth and emerging as a new plant capable of producing fruit. We might look at the life span of a butterfly and how it slowly transforms from larvae and eventually to a beautiful butterfly.

None of these examples quite get to the heart of how Christ gave up his life on a cross, was buried and now is alive again. The stone has been rolled away and Jesus is no longer dead. It is an amazing story and well...it really is a mystery. We can't fully explain how these things happened. All we can do is believe and have faith, and rely on the eye witness accounts that we turn to in the ancient stories of the Scriptures.

I have this strong memory of a long ago Easter when I was a young child. Our family custom was to have an Easter egg hunt on Easter morning. My sister and I would eagerly wake up with great

excitement knowing that we would get to search for Easter eggs from the Easter bunny. It wasn't as if we had a strong belief in the Easter bunny – but it was part of our family tradition. As it happened one Easter, when we woke up my Mom called us to hurry up and get dressed because she wanted to show us something pretty amazing. So we quickly dressed and joined her outside where we discovered rabbit tracks in the snow. I remember standing in awe and thinking...wow! How did that happen? Maybe there really is an Easter bunny!

Our family laughs about it now, but at the time, my Mom wisely didn't squelch our child-like wonder at the mystery of how our Easter eggs and chocolates arrived at our home that year. It was a mystery and it added something to the experience and wonder of things that are not always easily explained. Mom would later also add the story of another mysterious and wondrous story of how Jesus rose from the dead. That too caused us to wonder and be curious.

Perhaps there is something to be said about the mystery and wonder of God. We may not have all the answers, but we still marvel and rejoice at what God has done!

Let's not lose that child-like delight and wonder of this most amazing season! Who knows what God might have in store for us? You never know!

Recently, we had the last remaining copper down spout stolen from the northeast corner of the church building and it will need to be replaced.

This coming year, we have a young and vibrant council and I know that they will be full of enthusiasm to express their new ideas which will lead St Paul's into the surrounding community. I am looking forward to working with each one of them.

As Wardens we are currently involved with Rev. Clara and Janice Valecourt in the interviewing process to hire candidates for the two clerical positions in our church office.

I want to express my gratitude to Rev. Clara for the confidence that she has placed in me by appointing me to this position. Also, the parishioners of St. Paul have been most generous in their support of my appointment, I am overwhelmed. I will certainly do my utmost to support Rev. Clara and you, my family of St. Paul.

NOTES FROM THE TREASURER



The last Financial Statement available is to the end of February 2019.

Total Outgo for 2 months	48,493.87 \$ (12,226.25)
Balance fwd. Jan. 1/19	(36,103.61)
Balance (deficit)	\$ (48,329.86)

We passed the budget for 2019 in February. Our Open and Envelope offerings for February were already almost \$4,000.00 under budget. We ended the month with a deficit of \$12,226.25, before bringing forward the accumulated deficit of \$36,103.61. However, it is early in the year, and some of our other Income sources (such as Festivals and Fund Raising) have yet to appear.

Although I know we continue to be vigilant about our spending, we occasionally get dealt an unexpected curve ball. Some of you may be aware that we have been hit by vandals a couple of times in the past year or so, who have taken our copper down spouts off the church for "resale". This recently happened again, to the last copper one we had left. However, this time they twisted it off and did damage quite high up on the building. So, replacement (with non-copper metal) will involve the use of scaffolding, and the estimate for repair is just under \$3,000.00. That puts our Repair and Maintenance budget over the top already!

Most readers will be aware that this is my final Contact article as Parish Administrator.

I'm sure that the announcement in January of my retirement as Parish Administrator took many parishioners by surprise so I would like to take this opportunity to say a few words.

When I was first appointed as Parish Administrator in December 2009, I really didn't know what to expect in terms of workload or the variety of work that I would be asked to undertake.

Looking back on that first 12 months I really didn't know if I was coming or going but I stuck at it and with God's help and the help of those around me, we were able to make a success of it.

It's true to say that the workload has increased quite substantially over the years. Most of these changes have been gradual, evolutionary you might say, but nevertheless the church office is quite a different place now than it was back when I began this journey.

The most significant change is, of course, our wonderful new facility which we moved into in September 2016, having been housed temporarily at 80 Chapel Street from April 2015. On moving into the new facility, I soon discovered that the additional rooms available to rent and an increase in demand from the local community, meant that the position of Parish Administrator was becoming more than one person could comfortably manage along with everything else that the job entailed.

Never having been one to shirk a challenge though, I knew that it was important to provide some continuity through Fr. Brian's retirement, the interim ministry of Ven. Alan Naylor and Rev. Clara's first year as Rector of St. Paul's.

Timing is very important and I truly hope that the timing of my departure is good for St. Paul's. I wholeheartedly believe that in Rev. Clara this parish is in very capable hands. We have some wonderful volunteers, not only in the church office but everywhere within the parish, and equally importantly we have some very enthusiastic newcomers to our church. I would like to congratulate my successors in their appointment as Parish Administrator and Facility Co-ordinator, respectively, and wish them both the very best for the future.

I would also like to take the opportunity to express my gratitude to all of the people that have helped me perform the role of Parish Administrator, and in particular Sue Gueulette, Caroline Grimmer & Heather Lester for making my job a lot easier and helping me to maintain my sanity!

If you didn't already know, I'm sure you have realised that drinking tea is something that I take very seriously, so don't be too surprised if I drop in from time to time to make sure that standards are being maintained!

Just one final thought ... none of this would have been possible had I not been selected from the list of applicants for the Parish Administrator position back in November 2009. I would, therefore, like to say a heartfelt thank you to Fr. Brian Evans, Evan Mitchell and Kathie Day for believing in me & giving me the opportunity to serve St. Paul's Anglican Church.
