

M/S Lyman Butterfield/ Aleksa Harkness, carried. Also noted, a correction to the spelling of the names of Jean Wason and Frances Jepson in the report of people who have died in 2016.

Looking forward, priorities for 2017

- 1. Engage people in leadership. Leadership gives direction, creates, enables, opens the way to growth. Suggestion of a team of 3 who love to get to know others and can provide support and encouragement for them to get more involved in whatever area they have an interest in.
- 2. Name for ourselves who we are and deepen our sense of community among us. Test and tweak our statement so it's integrated in what we do; does it speak to us, how is it affecting what we do? Deepen relationships over food, maybe outings, musical events, sharing work. Initiatives come from the congregation. Please give the Board input with ideas.

- 3. Let people know who we are. What we have been doing has been letting people know who we are and has been connecting neighbours with neighbours. We need to host meaningful events that reflect who we are. The Board is committed to more active communication with the congregation inviting further ideas and actions.
- 4. Move outside and become involved with people outside. Who we are leads to certain actions. We can become knowledgeable and involved and encourage the James Bay community to be involved. Our concerns include: 1 James bay neighbourhood; 2-larger social justice issues; 3- having a presence around First Nations and what does Truth and Reconciliation mean for JBUC, and also the refugee crisis in the world (there was a lot of community interest in the Refugee Initiative) and more interfaith dialogue.

Responses from the congregation:

- 1. Appreciation of the inclusiveness;
- 2. TV screens in sanctuary would allow deaf people to follow the service;
- 3. Would like to see more gathering around food, including music and dance and the community beyond the church.

AGREED by consensus that as a congregation we will move forward with these priorities in 2017.

Presentation of Financial Report for 2016 by Cheryl Caldwell, Chair of Finance

The highlights of the year were reviewed, most of which are in the printed Financial Report. Suggested possible reasons for lower offerings were that we had fewer visitors and that some money may have been directed instead towards our two initiatives of last year, the James Bay Refugee Initiative and the Intern Initiative.

Motion: that the 2016 Financial Report be received as presented by Cheryl. M/S Gary Brandstadt/ Joan Ryan.

Questions/ discussion:

A concern was expressed about this and previous offering budgets being perhaps overly optimistic. (See response later.) Regarding whether we will need to pay back grant money received for the Abundant Community Initiative Karen explained that we are inquiring as to whether that money could be kept and redirected towards another neighbourhood initiative. In any case, it is an "in and out" item.

Motion carried.

Presentation of 2017 Budget proposal by Cheryl Caldwell

In regard to income, both pledges and PAR offerings are up from last year, as is our attendance on Sundays, there are no special initiatives this year, the estimated income from the Thrift Shop is on the low side, and rental income will be higher than last year.

There are no special expenditures for 2017 other than the "patio project" to create a hospitable space for hosting food/ coffee for the community at times such as Thrift Shop days. Funds for this will come from the Grace Fund.

There are no foreseen major calls on the Property budget but if we have a surplus this year we would do well to use it to start a contingency fund for building maintenance.

Motion: that the 2017 budget be adopted. M/S Ralph Huston/ Louise n'ha Ruby.

Questions/ Discussion

In response to a question about the move to increase the Minister's salary to full-time, it was explained that the Board had begun moving on this but it needed more direction and discussion from the Congregation so has been put off until the fall. Another question as to how much of the refugee initiative money went to paying for rent before the apartment was occupied couldn't be answered at this moment.

Motion carried.

Further comments by Cheryl

Cheryl offered her thanks to the Board, reaffirmed our commitment to ongoing discussions with the congregation and to quarterly financial updates, and especially wished to thank Vanya and acknowledge her meticulous and patient work with her on the financial records and documents.

About Nominations

Marg reminded everyone that we would welcome nominations for the Board, especially for the positions of Chair and Recording Secretary. Anyone who would like to offer themselves or suggest someone else is requested to speak with Karen.

Thanks were offered to all who attended.

The meeting closed at 12:10 with the singing of a hymn.



JBUC Congregational Meeting Minutes January 8, 2017

Location: JBUC Sanctuary Lower Hall

Chair: Nola Adams Recorder: Cheryl Caldwell

Time: Immediately following worship service

Thank you for staying for this brief business meeting today.

Only JBUC Members participate in elections.

Nola introduced Duncan McLean and Karla Willems.

1. RM/S <u>Susan Ross/Kim Tadei</u> that Duncan McLean be elected to the Ministry & Personnel Committee.

Discussion – none. Motion was carried.

2. RM/S <u>Doug Lunam/Jeremy Williams</u> that Karla Willems be elected to the Ministry & Personnel Committee.

Discussion – none. Motion was carried.

Chair declared the meeting closed at 11.45 a.m.

Congregational Meeting July 23, 2017

This meeting was formally called (ie giving due notice) for a congregational conversation. Karen outlined the steps leading up to this conversation:

- A conversation with Gordon in the Spring about our priority of deepening our connections in the neighbourhood, and Gordon's passion for communication and community engagement
- Karen brought to the Board the proposal that we consider investing in staff time to move forward with our priority of deepening connections with the neighbourhood, and that she was in conversation with someone with broad experience in various communication methods and community engagement.
- The Board met with Gordon Miller on June 26th for a first interview. All members of the Board were immediately taken by Gordon's passion for engaging with people, the breadth of his creative ideas about how we could connect with a wide range of people and build relationships that would let people know more about James Bay United. We were impressed by his ability to help us see things from a different perspective, and sense our possibilities instead of our limitations. We agreed we wanted to explore this opportunity further.

- We proceeded to speak with references and to investigate funding sources to cover the costs of a contract.
- After doing significant reference checks, we met again with Gordon to consider his proposal
 of the initiative he would undertake with JBUC.

Cheryl Caldwell offered details of funding a Communication and Neighbourhood Engagement Initiative:

The estimated cost for one year is approximately \$37,000, which includes a contract with Gordon for 20 hours per week over 48 weeks as well as office supplies and advertising.

The Board suggests setting aside \$40,000 which includes a small contingency allowance. We have identified three funding sources for this project:

- **Abundant Community Initiative**: \$12,000. We have already included this in our 2017 budget so those funds are already earmarked.
- **ProVision Grant**: \$20,000. We are going to be making a new grant application to the Victoria Presbytery ProVision Fund. We are optimistic that our new application would be considered favourably. What we are proposing aligns well with the objectives of that fund.
- **Grace Priority Fund:** \$8,000. We are looking to take \$8000 from the Grace Priority Fund. We still have funds available from the bequest we received last year from Lydia Kinnear and have recently learned that Percy Butler has left us a bequest for \$10,000.
- If the results are successful we anticipate the possibility of an on-going position. That decision will be made following an evaluation and a further conversation with the Congregation. We will identify revenue sources for the future as part of the evaluation. We are talking with Gordon and he with us about ways he could be helping to make the work he is doing partially self-sustaining.

Gordon introduced himself, and we moved into conversation, with questions, observations, responses. Gordon left the gathering. There was a "straw vote" to confirm that what we were hearing was indeed a strong sense of support for engaging Gordon in this focussed work.

The meeting concluded celebrating the anticipation of Gordon joining us in September, beginning with a one year contract. We sang a refrain that was part of our morning worship: Dare to let God encourage. Dare to let God inspire. God is making all things new. The challenge now is ours. Dare to let God, Dare to let God.

I remind myself what the year has held by leafing through my note book and day book, jotting notes all on one page to capture the year at glance. I notice many textures to the year. There are some bold new moves and some long awaited ones. There is laughter, and beyond laughter, unthinkable joy. There is sadness and anguish. There is searching and celebration. There are wide-eyed new discoveries and plenty of patience and persistence in the face of the daily round. Threaded through it all is the mystery of Christ present among us, between us, forming and transforming us -- with all our quirkiness -- into loving community.

The year began with a thud, when we found ourselves saying goodbye to Ryan, who had begun his internship with us the previous Fall. It was with deep regret, disappointment and immense consideration that the Board arrived at the decision to end the internship. The Chair of the Internship Committee of BC Conference who was present with the Board through our deliberations spoke of being moved by the sincerity of our struggle and the depth of our care ... an experience of the Beloved humming between us.

Maundy Thursday saw the safe arrival of Leyla, the young woman from Syria who we had been anticipating, and praying and preparing for, for months. At the very time many of us were gathered that evening in the "upper room" living into the story of the night Jesus gave a new commandment -- "that you love one another as I have loved you" -- the members of the James Bay Neighbourhood Refugee Initiative steering committee were gathered at the airport, with an armload of flowers and hearts overflowing with welcome and the promise of enduring friendship.

We have gathered through the year for study, for conversation, for learning, for prayer -- with two mid-week series in Lent: Opening to Abundant Life and our Choosing Life film series; in the Fall with What's With the Bible and an exploration of the Trinity, "aided" by The Divine Dance by Richard Rohr; and in December, an Advent retreat centered around praying the hours. Not only did we go places in our exploration of the topics at hand, but in each opportunity something happened in our connection, our regard and our care for one another ... Christ between us.

We concluded the Season of Creation with a special 100 kilometre Dinner, savouring local farm-fresh ingredients -- celebrating God's generous provision. Giving thanks for "God's love made taste-able" we dipped into our first course of apple and honey. This was one of many occasions throughout the year when we ate together, cooking for one another, welcoming one another at the table, sharing not only food but something of our lives with each other. Whether over pancakes and syrup, or squeezing in alongside each other on patio picnic tables, or as mystery guests in the home of mystery hosts, or dining in the candlelight before carol singing, ... not only was God's love present in the food, but experienced in our care and attentiveness for one another. Christ among us.

Week in, week out, we've gathered for worship in Jesus' name, in his love. As the liturgical year unfolded, each season has offered us its own gift, notably this year, praying the Psalms during Lent, and in the season of Creation taking as our theme *now is the time to learn hope*. It was also in the midst of morning services along the way that we celebrated and entrusted into God's care Clara Wieland and Irene Nepstad, two much loved, grace-filled women of our congregation, both living into their 102^{nd} year. It was in the course of this year also that we made it our business to create a dedicated welcome space within our sanctuary for children so that little ones too may be an integral and expected part of our gathering in the "that name, that mercy." In our eagerness to do something, and our delight in the space created, there is a sense of "the Beloved humming between us."

In the late Spring, the Board entered into conversations about getting on with our stated priority of widening and deepening our connections in the James Bay neighbourhood. This resulted in the Board convening a conversation with the congregation about hiring Gordon Miller, whose focus would be communication and neighbourhood engagement -- helping us to become more known as a congregation that nurtures hope and caring connection; and helping us to pursue partnering relationships with other neighbourhood organizations in ventures that enhance the quality of life in James Bay. Together we engaged in a lively conversation. There was clear enthusiasm for moving forward with this priority, and proceeding with the Board's recommendation --recognizing its timeliness in light of the influx of new neighbours about to take up residence in the Michigan Street development. There, in our desire to widen our welcome, to stretch out our care, to be a voice of hope, of challenge, and to be challenged ourselves to grow in generosity ... Christ among us.

In the reports that follow, you'll see more of it I'm sure -- the transforming presence of Christ in our life together. In some cases you might have to read between the lines, but I can assure you it's there ... in the quality of companionship within the crew who attend to our physical plant, in the care and conversation around the table on Tuesday mornings, in the life shared among Thrift Shop volunteers, in the care among those who "crunch the numbers." I could go on ... and so could you! If you look for it, the way-making, mending, transforming presence of Christ is everywhere!

With gratitude to you and to the One who knits us together, for my own growing in faith and in hope and love through this beloved community,

Music Director's Report

Overview

2017 was an enlivened and heartening year for music at James Bay United Church (JBUC). The Sunday choir welcomed new members, the newly founded Anthem Choir prepared 5 works of special choral music, and new connections with local musicians were formed.

Highlights

2017 marked the first full year of the new Anthem Choir—a group that brings together long time JBUC Sunday Choir members with community members and other congregants. In 2017, this group prepared 5 challenging anthems that were offered at special liturgical services through out the year.

Two highlights for me were Holy Week 2017 and Christams Eve 2017. For Holy Week, the Anthem Choir worked feverishly for 6 weeks to prepare not one but two powerful, challenging works for Good Friday and Easter Sunday. On Christmas Eve, we presented a rousing, moving Christmas Sanctus. The positive responses from both of these services were overwhelming, and I am deeply proud of the work the Anthem Choir did to enrich these worship services.

Another highlight was connecting with local soprano Annalyssa Taylor and local flutist Eden Oliver. Both Annalyssa and Eden joined the Anthem Choir for performances in 2017—Annalyssa as a guest soloist and Eden as an accompanying instrumentalist. Their musicianship was such a tremendous gift and blessing. It was a very inspiring experience for our choir to have the opportunity to perform alongside these very accomplished members of the local music community.

Last, but not least, the Sunday Choir welcomed three new members in 2017: Ralph, Claire, and Shirley. Their presence, personalities, and voices have been such a welcome addition to the offering our dedicated Sunday Choir makes each and every week.

Looking Forward

As we move into 2018, I look forward to continuing the momentum of 2017. It is my hope that through the Anthem Choir we will be able to connect with additional guest soloists and instrumentalists.

This coming summer, we are planning to offer a series of guest music lead services (Taize, celtic vespers, jazz vespers, etc) and I am looking forward to the joy and challenge of organizing these and creating more community connections through music at JBUC.

Property Report

It's been a busy and satisfying year for the property team. Along with all the minor repairs and sorting and cleaning which is an ongoing process, here are some of this year's highlights. During the winter closure the washroom in the Thrift Shop was completely renovated. Our janitorial service was reviewed, job description and contracts developed, and we hired Ahmad Ibrahim and Rabia Al Nahwlai for these positions. Later in the year Rabia took on the complete responsibility for cleaning JBUC. Thanks to Kathie Putt of M &P for her effort on this joint venture.

Twelve new chairs were purchased and assembled for the reception area.

Our rental policies and practices were reviewed, and new rental agreements were signed with our regular renters. Ensuring renters were paying the set rate resulted in a significant increase in rental income.

Our sump pump and the fire alarm, safety lights and fire extinguishers were all inspected with Ralph Huston doing the electrical work that was required. Thanks to Ralph, who has joined the property team, we now have a qualified electrician as part of the team.

The side and rear gardens of the church were completely renewed using plants from all around the property. Leaf mulch was applied to all the beds, and landscape cloth and bark mulch spread around the ramp area. Thanks to Rabia, Admad, Franklyn and Karen for their help. The back patio project was completed with tables, umbrellas, plant containers and renewed gardens making this area a great gathering place. Sunday morning lemonade and goodies were served outside throughout the summer, and our *Welcome Feast* on September 10 was the first big event out on our "new" patio.

The Thrift Shop garden underwent a major renovation with a fence installed to shut off the garden from the next door yard, a gate installed at the front of the garden, weeds cleared, and the lawn renewed with the laying of sod. Two beds have been established, a planter purchased and filled with plants, and the two areas between the building and the parking lot were cleared and landscape cloth and attractive gravel spread to clean up the area and make maintenance possible. Thanks to Martin Stewart and his trusty trailer for making this task possible and fun.

With the help of Rabia and Martin rubble and weeds and overgrown shrubs were removed from the parking lot and the back "ladder storage" area, parking bumpers were put back in place, and more gravel placed in the entrance to the back storage area.

A children's area was created in our sanctuary with help from David Bennet and Michael Bennett who re-configured the pews and stored parts for future needs.

It was a cold and dark night when Judy Krzesowski and I went to pick up 50 used chairs for the lower hall to replace the chairs that were broken and past repair, but it was very satisfying.

The front garden/gathering place project is nearly complete. A concrete patio was poured, a new sign installed and garden beds developed. Shrubs and lawn will be planted in the spring, two benches will be installed and this neighbourhood gathering place will be complete. We applied for and received a grant from the City of Victoria (\$5000) to help fund this project.

Life Long Learning Report

Early in the Spring, in the downstairs hall, Judy Krzesowski and Aleksa Harkness arranged for a screening of *The Secret Path*, the story of Charlie Wenjack, a young aboriginal boy who died of exposure while attempting to escape from a residential school to reach his family. Viewing the video was followed by a facilitated conversation with Nicole Bresser, an indigenous lawyer in Victoria. There were easily forty people in attendance, indicating significant interest.

There were two series offered during Lent: "Opening to Abundant Life" shaped by Joan Chittister's book *Following the Path- the search for a life of passion, purpose and joy* and a movie series picking up on the same theme, featuring Eagle Huntress, Still Life, Florence Foster Jenkins, Dead Man Walking, and Life Animated.

We launched in the Fall with "Soulful Wednesdays" offering us the opportunity to share a meal together before a time of worship, followed by a six week "What's With the Bible" series led by Bev Tracey, and concurrently a book study, using Richard Rohr's The Divine Dance of the Trinity.

On the first weekend of Advent, twelve of us gathered at the Bethlehem Retreat Centre in Nanaimo for a two day retreat in which Cheryl Macpherson and I teamed together to offer leadership. Taking our lead from Macrina Wiederkehr's *Seven Sacred Pauses*, we had a two day immersion in the monastic tradition of praying the hours. We came away with a rich spiritual practice through which to deepen our connection with the Holy and our own souls through the season of Advent and beyond.

Every week through the year, Aleksa Harkness selects a book from our library to highlight in the announcement page of our Sunday bulletin. (If you haven't yet browsed through the library in the downstairs hall, it's a rich and growing collection, made available to everyone who comes into our building.) You can find an itemizing of the collection on our website, along with a beautiful and substantial list of links to many other on-line soulful resources. Aleksa reports that "in 2017 we acquired books through generous support from within the congregation, from the Times-Colonist book sale, from the JBUC thrift shop, used book stores and church bazaars. Because we have chosen to run the library on the honour system, not all books are returned; we trust God will find a way to use those books in the life of the person who chose not to return them. 2018 will see the addition of DVDs which will only be available for checkout through volunteers after worship."

James Bay Refugee Initiative Report

The James Bay Refugee Initiative (launched in faith during worship in James Bay United church in 2015) is composed of several people from our church and many more from the broader community. The Intercultural Association of Greater Victoria connected us with Leyla, a 25-year-old Syrian Refugee in late 2016. We spent most of a year fund-raising in order to bring Leyla to Victoria and support her for one year.

Leyla arrived at the Victoria Airport on April 13, 2017, having traveled for almost 48 hours through 3 countries and 4 airports in order to get here. She did not know, until she changed planes in Vancouver, that there would be people to meet her and support her as she made her way in this new land. Imagine the courage!

To augment the English Leyla had taught herself solely by listening to English language songs, and began full-time

English classes at Camosun College. She worked hard and did well, and not wanting to rest on her academic laurels, Leyla enrolled in a 2-month, 5-day-a-week employment workshop and was the first of her cohort to find employment. Leyla is now employed at Visions Optical and says she can imagine a future there.

James Bay United Church played a crucial role in Leyla's sponsorship, and she is very grateful. In Leyla's own words...

Hello everyone,

To all friends who I know and I don't know I write this letter to thanks everyone help and support me to be here in Canada.

I write this letter with entire love and respect and appreciation for what you did for me. At first I want you to know that I was waiting for this opportunity to be here a year ago before I come as many people are waiting and dreaming to get what I got - it was dream and come true. In fact not all people are as lucky as me , not because only I'm here but also I have so many friends who support me and encourage me to continue and help me find my way to the new future.

Life is not easy in our homelands and many of us give up to leave in difficult circumstances because they have no other choice. But I have given this opportunity to live a better life and help my family in future as well but even here isn't easy without people support and love you, so thank you all for that.

Other thing I want you to know that it is not easy to migrate from one country to another, especially since you don't know anything about the country and its customs and rules and people.

When I arrived in Vancouver I had no idea what was waiting me here or any idea about people who being waiting for me who brought me to Canada. I was thinking that the government only sponsored me. I really scared when the officer told me that I had sponsor group waiting for you because I didn't know any of them and I was afraid to meet them.

When I arrived at the airport and I meet Sabine and Mona (ed.: Manager of Private Sponsorships and interpreter from the Intercultural Association) they told me a little about the sponsors.

At that time I start feel comfortable and I was ready to meet them we walked to them and I saw how they are happy all of them smiling to me from heart. One of them had a nice flower and other had big board write on "ف ک توریا اف ی ب کم مرح با الله ی ترح یب ف یک توریا اف ی ب کم مرح با Welcome". It was amazing. I really appreciate and I was happy. Yes, that why I want be here. It seems like what I dream about and more.

Since that time those people become my family and my friends and my big support here in Victoria. I will never forget that day and after that I get know there many of this people try hard to bring me here. To everyone for everything they did for me thank you. I'm really grateful to what you did. I don't denying that I feel lonely without my husband and I don't denying that I miss my family, parents , sister and brother but thank God I have all of this people. I'm fortunate to have them those people with me as a family. They have been with me step by step. they make my life easier here. I wondered about refugees who don't have this people, how it will be difficult for them. Also thanks for the church for helping and supporting me and the rest of

refugees from different country.

Thank you from my heart for the humanity they have and I respect and appreciate all of that my words isn't enough to say. Thank you all, with my love and respect.

Annual report of the United Church Campus Ministry at the University of Victoria, January 2018

This year the University of Victoria celebrated 40 years of cooperation with faith communities in providing for the spiritual health of the campus community. In an interfaith ceremony hosted by UVic President Jamie Cassels, the university re-affirmed its commitment to support the work of the chaplains and faith communities by signing a new Memorandum of Understanding outlining the relationship and ongoing work of the faith communities on campus. The United Church's integral missional leadership and it's substantial contribution to the spiritual well-being of students was recognized with gratitude by the University administration.

Over the years the United Church Campus Ministry has introduced thousands of students to the reality of God's Presence by growing a student community centered on contemplative learning and practice. In BC., over 65% of millennials have no or little association with Church, or are reactive to institutional religion. In this challenging context, Campus Ministry has been highly successful in providing many entry points for students to open hearts and minds to the reality of the Spirit in their lives.

Every week, students gather from around campus to participate in the spiritual learning and practice events hosted by the Campus Ministry at the Interfaith Chapel. They offer up their leadership and their enthusiasm to build a community of caring and support for each other. Three times a week the



community gathers for *Learn to Meditate*, a practice of silent meditation based on the mindfulness practices of Centering Prayer and Christian Meditation. Often the meditations are followed by a time of conversation with a soup meal provided by members of our congregations. Every Monday students gather for *Spirit in Motion* to share music and poetry at an open mic and to lead in meditation and conscious dance. Every Wednesday the community gathers for

Wine Before Supper, a simple contemplative ecumenical communion service and every month the time is dedicated to Chant and Meditation in the Style of Taizé. Environmental Studies students and others gather Tuesdays for Sacred Ecology to explore their spiritual connection to the Earth and be empowered as agents of hope and change. Each term there is a weekend Meditation Retreat at Camp Pringle for young adults, and this last year we had to turn people away because we had run out of room.

More than 1000 young people gather at the Interfaith Chapel from around campus to be part of the ministry offered by our Church, with a regular attendance of over 150 students and staff each week attending the various activities hosted by the Campus Ministry.



The United Campus Ministry is not just restricted to the campus, but participates in the ministry to all youth and young adults in our church. These past many years I, as campus minister, have given leadership and support to the BC Conference annual *Evolve* YAYA gathering and I have been an active member of the BC Conference YAYA leadership team. I drove young people from BC to the United

Church *Rendezvous* conference in Montreal this past summer and led workshops on Meditation and Sacred Ecology. I will be participating in the General Council Youth Forum with United Church youth from all over Canada and guiding young people to engage deeply with our church. In Victoria Presbytery, YAYA leaders have been meeting at the UVic Interfaith Chapel to support one another, share ideas and to strengthen our ministry to young people. All this to build relationship with young people in our Church and to introduce them to the wide network of church relationships beyond our congregations. For many of our young people, the experience of church lies beyond the congregation and their sense of identity as United Church youth is nurtured by local, campus, regional and national church youth events.

There is much to celebrate in our Church's ministry with youth and young adults. But there are dark clouds on the horizon. With the momentous restructuring of the Church unfolding over this coming year, there is no clarity whether Campus Ministry will be receiving funding to continue its mission at UVic into 2019. Historically, Campus Ministry at UVic has been funded by BC Conference, Victoria

Presbytery, Greater Victoria congregations and many individual donations. With the devolution of Presbyteries and Conferences into Regions, no staffing and funding models have yet been proposed that protect current youth and young adults ministries, including campus ministry. I am determined to advocate for our youth and young adults to ensure that the mission to support the spiritual awakening,



inclusion and well-being of our young people will receive priority funding. I can't do this alone, but need the support of everyone in our congregations to ensure that our young people will not be lost as we restructure ourselves into a more agile and missional church fit to serve God and Christ Jesus in our communities.

Highlights/Achievements of the Year:

Program: In 2017, Camp Pringle had a successful year with the new Director in her third year and continuing permanent staff. We ended the year with increased registration and rental revenues. The continued support of Conference helped our bottom line as we started the year with a carrying deficit of \$18,000. We ended the year paying off the deficit and returning capital funds to Conference that were not used for the dock project in 2016. With the 2016 Laura Butler capital bequest, we were able to install a new roof, re-do the foundation and re-tiled all the showers in the 2 story dorm building named in Laura's honor. Conference provided a \$65,000 capital grant to renovate the North Pole washroom building, upgrade the water systems and provided funding to explore new business opportunities.

Our camper numbers were up in 2017, with 527 participants in our spring and summer programs. 38% were new campers - 203 of the registrations reported being new to Camp Pringle. We saw 41 of these registrations enjoy a great Spring Break Camp where we offered a full week of CREW, Ultimate Adventure and Junior Co-Ed.

Marketing efforts included: a 10% early bird discount and we continued our social media presence and brochure distribution at Recreation Centres and Thrifty Foods by Island Parent. We continued to run a full page advertisement in the Valley Voice for 7 months. And we ran a fall and spring newsletter was sent in digital and paper form.

We increased the number of staff's ability to use our on-line Camp Brain registration system bettering our response time to parents with questions about registration.

We published a Donor Recognition piece that featured Laura Butler and her contributions to Camp Pringle. We hosted an Open House to showcase the renovations and Laura Butler's bequest. We hosted an donor evening at camp for our donors to us for dinner, camp-wide game and campfire.

In September of 2017, we opened licensed childcare for surrounding school-aged children to participate in after school care. We had 12 families register and several of our summer program stayed on to facilitate the out of school care programming. We worked in partnership with the School District Transportation Department to offer free transportation for Discovery Elementary, Ecole Cobble Hill and George Bonner students.

Once again, the majority of campers 62% came from Greater Victoria. The Cowichan Valley represented 23% of the registrations. The Mid Island was 5% and North Island represented 1% of the registrations. 6% came from Lower Mainland and another 3% were from out of province or out country.

32% of our campers reported being associated with a church. 16% or 84 (almost double from 2016) of these campers were from the United Church.

This summer 1 of the 18 Victoria Presbytery Churches had 9 campers attend and 1 of the 25 Comox-Nanaimo Presbytery Churches and the Presbytery bursary funded 1 camper. Camp Pringle awarded \$10,000 in camper bursaries to 24 campers this year.

Property: The camp was well rented in 2017 with many groups returning as they find our pricing very reasonable. This translated into overall rental revenues coming in at approximately \$286,483 in 2017. We had forecasted for \$270,000 therefore surpassing our target goal. We shifted weddings to the shoulder season and implemented further regulations. We acknowledge that for long time clients the significant rate increases over the past years pose a challenge. We worked with all our returning groups to make the rates work and have almost all groups returning in 2018. We continue to honor our 2014 rates for United Church groups to ensure the accessibility to camp.

Our Residential Caretaker, Christian Stringer oversaw the continued refurbished of part of the Laura Butler building foundation, installation of the new roof, renovations to the showers, the North Pole building and the water systems.

Budget: As you can see in the table above, Camp's expenditures were approximately \$30,000 less than projected. We received a higher operations grant from Conference and we maintained high registration and rental revenues. Expenditures we better regulated while increasing salaries and keeping under the forecasted budget. We ended the year in an overall surplus that will cover our carrying 2016 \$18,000 deficit and repay un-used capital dock project funds to Conference leaving an approximate surplus of about \$3,000. BC Conference contributed a \$140,000 operational grant in 2017 to increase staff salaries and cover an approximate property maintenance budget.

Objectives for 2018: To continue to grow our society membership, our mission and to expand our business & donor practices. To continue to grow our camper numbers. To build an appropriate water systems building. To ensure the highest level of financial management to ensure a balanced budget and the creation of a maintenance fund.

We would like to thank all the churches, Victoria Presbytery, Comox-Nanaimo Presbytery and BC Conference for their continued support.

You are our cornerstone.



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Finance Report

In March 2017, we presented to the congregation a budget for the year projecting a small surplus in our operating funds. We ended the year with a surplus of approximately \$22,000. Some of this surplus is comprised of funds carried over from the previous year for projects still in progress.

Revenue:

Our offerings came in at 98 percent of what we had forecast, representing an increase of approximately \$6000 over our offerings in 2016.

Contributions from the Thrift Shop were particularly strong in 2017. The Thrift Shop was open Saturdays from May 6 through to Labour Day weekend, which contributed to the increased income. We are grateful for the great team of volunteers who work so hard to make shopping at the Thrift Shop a successful and satisfying experience for their customers.

On the rental income front, 2017 was the first full year that the new rental agreements were in place. There was a slight shortfall from what we had forecast (due to the departure of one of our clients mid-year). Overall, we attained a significant increase in rental income from previous years.

Expenses and Initiatives:

There were some expenses (for example, salary) incurred in the first part of 2017 for the Ministry Intern initiative which ended in February 2017. Funds that were received from the ProVision fund that had not been spent for the Abundant Community Initiative were returned. Funds from the Grace Priority Fund for the Abundant Community Initiative were reallocated to the Communication and Neighbourhood Engagement program.

Last summer, we had a special meeting with the Congregation to talk about the Communication and Neighbourhood Engagement project and the possibilities that such a program could bring to our church and to James Bay. This program was launched in September when the project director came on board to lead the initiative. We obtained new funds from the ProVision fund, as well as the reallocation of the Grace Priority funds, to cover the costs of the contract.

Our downstairs patio project was completed in the summer, with the addition of picnic tables and umbrellas. The renovation for the front of the church was largely completed by the end of the year, with the help of a special donation. We were successful in obtaining a City grant that will allow us to complete the landscaping this spring.

We continue to track the Refugee Fund separately from our general operating fund. At year end there was a balance of approximately \$10,000 remaining in the fund.

2018 Budget:

Based on our analysis of revenues and expenditures, the Finance Committee with the support of the JBUC Board is presenting a budget for 2018 with a small surplus.






