Exodus 16:2-15 Contemporary English Version 2 There in the desert they started complaining to Moses and Aaron, 3 "We wish the Lord had killed us in Egypt. When we lived there, we could at least sit down and eat all the bread and meat we wanted. But you have brought us out here into this desert, where we are going to starve."

4 The Lord said to Moses, "I will send bread[a] down from heaven like rain. Each day the people can go out and gather only enough for that day. That's how I will see if they obey me. 5 But on the sixth day of each week they must gather and cook twice as much."

6 Moses and Aaron told the people, "This evening you will know that the Lord was the one who rescued you from Egypt. 7 And in the morning you will see his glorious power, because he has heard your complaints against him. Why should you grumble to us? Who are we?"

8 Then Moses continued, "You will know it is the Lord when he gives you meat each evening and more than enough bread each morning. He is really the one you are complaining about, not us—we are nobodies—but the Lord has heard your complaints."

9 Moses turned to Aaron and said, "Bring the people together, because the Lord has heard their complaints."

10 Aaron was speaking to them, when everyone looked out toward the desert and saw the bright glory of the Lord in a cloud. 11 The Lord said to Moses, 12 "I have heard my people complain. Now tell them that each evening they will have meat and each morning they will have more than enough bread. Then they will know that I am the Lord their God."

13 That evening a lot of quails came and landed everywhere in the camp, and the next morning dew covered the ground. 14 After the dew had gone, the desert was covered with thin flakes that looked like frost. 15 The people had never seen anything like this, and they started asking each other, "What is it?"

Moses answered, "This is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire. **God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.**

Scripture opened, God invited: Listen to the spirit: Land of all living.

In 1989, churches around the world began to celebrate the Season of Creation. This season runs from the beginning of September to Thanksgiving. We celebrate the creation and all the gifts that we receive from it, but also acknowledge that we can do better, be better stewards of the land that gives us life.

Today I invite us to think about the story and history of the lands we share; how humanity was gifted with the responsibility of caring for the land and all of its creatures; how we sometimes lose sight of the gift and the responsibility.

In our Exodus story today... continuing our journey with Moses that began in his basket on the Nile... we meet Moses and the Israelite people as they are moving across the desert.

God heard their cry to be taken away from slavery, God heard their cry to be given a land of their own. God heard and gave but they weren't satisfied. Although what they were given did not look like they though it should, it was exactly what they asked for and what they needed.

They were given the gift of freedom. They were taken away from poverty, from violence, but there was a journey to be travelled to get to where they were going. They resented the work of learning new things, of changing attitudes. They whined. Oh, how they whined. They looked for someone to blame for their own shortcomings and came up with Moses and God. Probably not a good choice.

What was needed was a bit of self-reflection, a wondering about how this moment in time could be cherished and lead into a new, improved way of living.

In our story today we hear that when we live our faith and respect the land, we receive what we need to make us whole.

This message has been shared with us for years – not just in faith stories of two thousand years ago, but also in stories from the Indigenous People who shared and share the land with us now. Their stories, shared by generations have been formed around gratitude. Not to take anything or anyone for granted, to be thankful for what is given. Don't take more than you need and use all that you take. Don't waste the gifts.

The land is more than land. It is the basis of who we were, and who we are and who we may be. When we make decisions that care for instead of exploit the world around us, we receive gifts of life back.

Haven't we seen that during this COVID moment in our lives? Haven't we seen that when we started making decisions based on caring for all, that the lands and seas and animals began to thrive? Haven't we seen that, there are many, people have become more physically healthy too? – you know the ones who go running, or exercise, or take the dog for a walk with friends or don't get the flu anymore.

Nothing is perfect. Just as the Israelites of the Exodus story did, we don't always see what God's end goal is, and we can be miserable on the journey. And, truthfully, sometimes the journey we are on takes a mental toll on us that is hard to work through. When life seems very hard we, too, resort to anger looking for someone to blame. Leaders who push us into unknown places for our own good and the good of our neighbours and God are our targets.

What if we stopped and thought about how we can make the best of this mess that we are in? What if, instead of 'poor me' we looked at what we could do to make the journey better for others? What if we looked at how we might help our neighbours laugh, live and love on the journey? What if we looked at making sure that we appreciated all of the goodness and gifts shared around us?

When God gave the Israelites food and water, they were warned to take only what they needed. They were asked to have faith that God would walk with them on the journey and that they simply needed to take care with each other and the land they were on. God would take care of them.

In the Psalm, Song of Praise, that we heard today we were reminded that God is all around us... in every corner and crevice of the earth. There is nowhere that we are where God would not be.

God is with us: walking with us over the desert time of not knowing, of being out of our normal – no matter how bad it might have been; offering us what we need, no more, no less. God is with us, taking us on a journey over a time and land that has always been there to share.

The ground beneath our feet is still there. As it has been for generations and will be long after we are gone. This creation of God's reminds us that we are but a small part of the story and yet, we have a responsibility to care for it, all parts of it. We must make decisions that hold respect for the land and all the creatures it holds: four-leggeds and two leggeds.

When we stop to appreciate the gifts of the earth, when we stop to feel the ground beneath our feet: when we stop to hear and heal the people of the earth who are hurting

We become the healers of God's earth.

God knows we can do this...that's why we are given this task. God is with us. We are never alone. Thanks be to God.

Responding to God's Invitation

God invites us to step forward to hear God's work for us to do God's work with humility to be God's love in the world.

May we remember through our words and actions our connection to God's creation.

May we respond by offering from our abundance so that others may find life without scarcity.

Let us respond with care, compassion,

and treasure to love God's creatures and creation as God would have us do.

Remembering

As followers of Jesus, the one we name as the Messiah we remember his story.Born of the young woman Mary, raised in a backwater town, he came to share your vision for the world.

He modelled your Kingdom, lived by its values, and in doing so enraged those with power.

Knowing what was to come, he promised that we would not be left alone; then he was arrested, tried, convicted executed.

But the story was not over.You, God of power in weakness, you raised him from death and he returned to breathe hope and life into his fear-filled followers, into us.

As we gather for this meal we remember a meal that Jesus shared with his friends on the night before his death.

We remember that he took some bread,

blessed it, broke it, and passed it to them saying: This is my body broken by and for the world. When you eat this, remember me.

Later he took a cup of wine, blessed it, and passed it to them saying:

This is the Cup of the New Covenant, When you drink this, remember me.

And so, even all these years later, we continue to eat and drink and remember, sharing in the meal of faith. And pledging, as we remember, to follow the Way that Jesus laid out for us.
