DIY Photo Ornaments

# Here's what you'll need for supplies:

Card stock for the backing

Circle cutter — there are plenty of circle cutting tools available in craft stores. You can also do it the old-fashioned way: Trace a circle around a jar lid onto a piece of card stock and cut around the circular outline. This video tutorial shows examples of how to do both options: https://youtu.be/eveC8hdyyZ8 Family photos for cutting Single paper hole punch Glue stick or craft glue String or twine for hanging on the tree Fishing hooks to attach to the string for easier hanging (optional)

### Instructions:

Cut a circle out of card stock for the backing.
Cut a slightly smaller circle out of the photo you want to use for the ornament.
Apply a thin layer of glue to the back of the photo

Apply a thin layer of glue to the back of the photo and position it in the center of the card stock backing. Smooth out so it adheres fully.

Punch a single hole in the top of the ornament with the paper hole punch.

Thread the hole with a length of string or twine, and tie the string into a loop. You can also attach the string to a fishing hook to making hanging even easier.

### Instructions:
