

We are a community of faith in the Anglican Tradition, seeking to live lives of faith, hope and love as part of this community of Downtown Victoria. We are on a journey of learning to be a welcoming, inviting, inclusive and serving community which is open to all.

Our worship reflects our rootedness in the Anglican tradition, whilst drawing on liturgies that reflect the long history and heritage of our Christian faith. Please join in as you feel able, and enjoy the words, music and opportunity for prayer and to be a part of our community.

If our service seems unfamiliar, please follow the cues from our leaflet, the ministers leading the service and those around you. Most of our Sunday morning worship services have the Eucharist, or Holy Communion, at the heart of our worship – please feel free to join us, whatever your tradition, in the sharing of bread and wine. Gluten free wafers are available: Please indicate if you need one.

Within the Anglican Church of Canada (under the advice of the Primate and the Chief Medical Officer for Canada) we would ask that bread is not dipped into the wine, as this has the potential to spread infection in a way that the sharing of the cup does not. If you would prefer not to share the cup then receiving only bread is considered 'full communion' (also known as 'Communion in One Kind').

If there is anything that you wish to talk about, please do take the opportunity to talk to the worship leaders, ministers and other members of the congregation following the service. If you wish to receive prayer for yourself or for another, there will be members of our Healing Prayer group in the south Quadra entrance who would be happy to pray with you as the Holy Communion is shared.

After our service we usually share coffee and an opportunity to get to know one another, in the Church Hall – through the door on the front left hand side. We have many visitors and newcomers here so please make yourself known to folks as you feel comfortable. Join us today for Brunch.

You are very welcome here. We don't always get it right; please let us know when we do, and when we don't. Please stay and be a part of our family, for however long you would like.







Therefore, Father, according to his command,




and we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

NOTES ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

It is unusual to have a section of the prophets as the Psalm in the lectionary. The music for **Isaiah 12** is directly extracted from the text of the Hebrew Bible using the accents found in that text as interpreted by the French composer Suzanne Haïk-Vantoura in the last century. These signs, a record of a musical tradition lost for millennia, turn the whole of the Old Testament into a song. The arrangement today is by Bob MacDonald, translator and long-time student of the textual traditions and its music.

The **Gradual Hymn** today is set to a tune called Ora Labora, written for this text by T. Tertus Noble in 1916. Noble was an English-born organist and composer, most famously known for his final appointment at St. Thomas Fifth Avenue in New York City. This tune is very well-loved by our American counterparts in the Episcopal Church.

In consultation and conversation we are wondering about changing a little of the shape of our midweek worshipping pattern and adding 'more texture' to what is on offer. As such, I would like to propose that we consider the following pattern and would be grateful for any feedback you all would like to give (send to incumbent@stjohnthedivine.bc.ca) – depending on the feedback, this new pattern would start a three month experimental run beginning on 2nd December – the first week of Advent, the New Church Year, seemed a good time to start some new things!

- Our new Monday Eucharist would continue, outside, rain or shine at 1pm (it lasts about 20 minutes and is very simple).
- Our Meditative Eucharist would move from Thursdays at 12.10pm to Tuesdays at 12:10pm
- Our Wednesday Eucharist followed by Breakfast would remain at 7:45am
- We would begin a new Thursday Evening Simple Eucharist at 5:30pm followed by soup and a simple snack. It's a chance to come to share Eucharist after work or the day's activities are (nearly) done.

I'd also be interested in gathering regularly for Morning, Midday or Evening Prayers during the week, a simple service based on the Office of the Anglican Church – probably 15-30 minutes altogether. If there is any interest in that, please let me know on the above email address, or call, or drop a note to the office, and say what times and what days would be good for you.

The Special Blue Envelope for November is Aboriginal Neighbours

Aboriginal Neighbours is an ecumenical organization initiated by the Anglican Diocese of British Columbia. The organization was formed out of its members' concerns for the First Peoples and the future of aboriginal children. Revitalization of Indigenous Languages: a Gift to Future Generations (RIL) was started by the Aboriginal Neighbours Group in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Report, Call to Action # 61, that calls upon church parties to the Settlement Agreement to establish permanent funding for culture and language revitalization projects. Undertaken in conjunction with the First People's Cultural Council, the RIL project supports elders who are fluent speakers of their language to work with apprentices, as mentors, and to pass along the language that was taken from so many in the residential schools.

Parking: Following the demolition of the cottage, Parish Council decided to recoup some of the cost of the demolition by renting more parking spots. There are now 12 rented spots in the main parking lot adjacent to the Girl Guides property which are clearly marked with signs on the concrete parking curbs. Those parking spots bring us income of over \$1,000 per month.

New Automatic Debits

If you wish to START using Automatic Debit you can do so by completing a Pledge Card or by using the Automatic Debit pamphlet found at the back of the church and at the garden door. Just fill in the Pledge Card or the Automatic Debit pamphlet authorization and attach a 'VOID' cheque from your bank account to confirm your bank and account identification numbers. Place both in an envelope, mark it "For Automatic Debit," and place it in the offering plate or give it to the Church Office. Your account will be debited either monthly or twice monthly, as you choose, to coincide with the bank debit dates, which are the 15th and the last day of the month.

New Credit Card Debits

If you wish to START using VISA or MASTERCARD you can do so by completing a Pledge Card. Just fill in the Pledge Card and ensure that your card numbers and expiry date are shown on it, which should then be put into an envelope, marked "For Credit Card Debit," and placed in the offering plate or given in to the Church Office. Your account will be debited at the mid-month.
