Parable of the valuable coins

- 14 "The kingdom of heaven is like a man who was leaving on a trip. He called his servants and handed his possessions over to them.
- 15 To one he gave five valuable coins, and to another he gave two, and to another he gave one. He gave to each servant according to that servant's ability. Then he left on his journey.
- 16 "After the man left, the servant who had five valuable coins took them and went to work doing business with them. He gained five more.
- 17 In the same way, the one who had two valuable coins gained two more.
- 18 But the servant who had received the one valuable coin dug a hole in the ground and buried his master's money.
- 19 "Now after a long time the master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them.
- 20 The one who had received five valuable coins came forward with five additional coins. He said, 'Master, you gave me five valuable coins. Look, I've gained five more.'
- 21 "His master replied, 'Excellent! You are a good and faithful servant! You've been faithful over a little. I'll put you in charge of much. Come, celebrate with me.'
- 22 "The second servant also came forward and said, 'Master, you gave me two valuable coins. Look, I've gained two more.'

23 "His master replied, 'Well done! You are a good and faithful servant. You've been faithful over a little. I'll put you in charge of much. Come, celebrate with me.'

24 "Now the one who had received one valuable coin came and said, 'Master, I knew that you are a hard man. You harvest grain where you haven't sown. You gather crops where you haven't spread seed. 25 So I was afraid. And I hid my valuable coin in the ground. Here, you have what's yours.'

26 "His master replied, 'You evil and lazy servant! You knew that I harvest grain where I haven't sown and that I gather crops where I haven't spread seed? 27 In that case, you should have turned my money over to the bankers so that when I returned, you could give me what belonged to me with interest. 28 Therefore, take from him the valuable coin and give it to the one who has ten coins.

29 Those who have much will receive more, and they will have more than they need. But as for those who don't have much, even the little bit they have will be taken away from them.

30 Now take the worthless servant and throw him out into the farthest darkness.'

1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 The Message

5 1-3 I don't think, friends, that I need to deal with the question of when all this is going to happen. You know as well as I that the day of the Master's coming can't be posted on our calendars.

He won't call ahead and make an appointment any more than a burglar would. About the time everybody's walking around complacently, congratulating each other—"We've sure got it made! Now we can take it easy!"—suddenly everything will fall apart. It's going to come as suddenly and inescapably as birth pangs to a pregnant woman.

4-8 But friends, you're not in the dark, so how could you be taken off guard by any of this? You're sons of Light, daughters of Day. We live under wide open skies and know where we stand. So let's not sleepwalk through life like those others. Let's keep our eyes open and be smart. People sleep at night and get drunk at night. But not us! Since we're creatures of Day, let's act like it. Walk out into the davlight sober, dressed up in faith, love, and the hope of salvation.

9-11 God didn't set us up for an angry rejection but for salvation by our Master, Jesus Christ. He died for us, a death that triggered life. Whether we're awake with the living or asleep with the dead, we're alive with him! So speak encouraging words to one another. Build up hope so you'll all be together in this, no one left out, no one left behind. I know you're already doing this; just keep on doing it.

Message/Reflections:

Following on the heels of last weeks story of the bridesmaid that ended harshly, this week's story also seems harsh and jarring to us. The endings of both stories seem to be very 'judgey' and we might be left thinking is this the Kingdom of God we have come to know? If it's that unrelenting is that where we want to be?

It is perhaps helpful to be aware that the gospel of Matthew was written for people who had good reason to live in fear. By belonging to this new group of "The Way" that believed in the Realm of God, they were already nervous: their leader was executed by Rome; execution crosses were very visible in the landscape as a means of intimidation to those who were seen as a challenge to the power of Rome. Playing it safe was a logical and practical choice for lives lived in fear.

As we read this story in a world many years later, we can probably see so many inequalities and misuse of power. Why would that Property Owner give substantial money to people for safekeeping without telling them what the expectations were?

Why did those who received more not offer support to the one who received the least – or at least offer advice? The one worker was scared of the Property Owner because they had seen examples of lying and cheating

and knew the owner was untrustworthy. If they didn't have the skill to multiply the money wasn't the best choice at least to not lose it?

Were they wanting to play it safe because they were terrified of making a mistake even though they didn't know what a mistake would look like?

Why would the Owner get angry at someone who followed the rules that were given?

Why set someone up for failure by asking them for more than they could give?

Greed, power, and fear are woven throughout this story.

In his context, it could be that the message that Matthew wanted to convey was that there was greater reward in taking risks and not being held hostage by fear. If the Property Owner Matthew was talking about was Rome, then the harshness of the consequences makes sense.

In many modern unpackings of this story, the valuable gold coins have taken on new meanings. No longer seen as a simple lesson in economics and the capriciousness of those in power, it has become a lesson in using the gifts we are given and the abilities that we have to increase the possibilities of growth and sharing.

We can be asked what gifts and abilities has God given you to be nurtured and multiplied? What holds you back from sharing what you have been given?

In our world today we see the clash of power when one vision of the world appears to be opposite of another. We have, and in some cases still do, experienced fear that prevents us from being and sharing our best with each

other. There are certainly, still, instances when choosing to do nothing feels like the safest choice.

But we know that choosing to do nothing is choosing not to stand up for what is right.

We know that choosing to do nothing leaves out those who are sick, poor, hungry and desperate.

We know that choosing to do nothing is not an option that Jesus wants us to take.

Tagging on to the ending of last weeks story where the listeners were warned that they would never know what would happen next, so they needed to be ready for all eventualities, the letter to the faithful in Thessalonica reminded them that they, too, had an unscheduled journey ahead.

They believed that Jesus would return, but had no idea when. Paul reminded them of the power of faith, of the power of community. Talk to each other, he said. Look out for each other so that no one is left behind.

God doesn't set us up for failure, Paul said. In fact, through the death and resurrection of Jesus we are told that we can survive any manner of trouble.

Faith in the power of God, faith in the knowledge that we are in this – whatever 'this' may be – together, faith that we can work through the fear to become more than we are, become all that God knows we can be is what will get us through these times of trouble.

In Matthew's story told to encourage fear filled people,

I see a warning about leadership who change the rules for their own benefit, and that trying to cover your butt just won't work with people who are that volatile.

I see an opportunity for people of different abilities and gifts to team up together to accomplish more together than is possible when they are apart.

The version of the Matthew story that we used for Children's Ministry this week ends with two questions for the disciples:

Were they like the worker who buried the money? Or were they like the other workers who used what they had to make everything better?

While our world is not quite as violent as Matthew's world was, it is not as respectful or cooperative as it could be either.

What questions do you hear for you to consider today?

Are we, as a church, offering our best to nurture those who are scared?

What are we choosing to do to support and help others be their best?

Are we burying our gifts or nurturing and multiplying them so that God's kin-dom pokes through the mess of life around us?

What unknown packages of valuable skills, abilities and choices has God given us that we are asked to faithfully tend to, in community with all of God's people, so that God's possibilities have a way to live in the world?

Work together, Paul tells us.
Trust in God, Paul tells us.
Don't be afraid Jesus tells us... often
Let us ask the questions that will lead us from fear into being God's caring, sharing and nurturing community.
