Do you ever wonder why THAT couple got married?

Do you ever wonder why THEY processed to the front of the church

And tied the knot?

There are lots of reasons to commit yourself to another person. Some are worse and some are better.

Some people marry for sex and some people marry for money.

Some get hitched because they are lonely or they want kids.

Some get engaged because they are getting older and they feel like they are running out of options

Some make vows because they they've found their best friend.
Some marry because they've encountered
Incredible loyalty and love.

She knew that he was the one, when she broke her wrist that Christmas. He rode with her in the ambulance.

He sat by her bed in the hospital.

He picked up her meds

and made meals for her at her home.

There are lots of reasons to commit yourself to another person. Some are worse and some are better.

But if this can be said about marriage

The same could be said about the life of faith.

Both involve commitments.

Just think of those vows Mo made

Here at the front of the church,

a couple weeks ago:

Do you renounce the ways of sin Which separate you from God?

Do you turn to Jesus Christ,

Accepting him as Lord and Saviour,

Trusting in his grace and love?

There are lots of reasons why people decide to follow Jesus. Some are worse and some are better.

Some commit to God
thinking that God will make them rich and successful.
Some become Christians because they admire Jesus' ethics.

Some profess their faith simply to please their family. Some follow Jesus to be like all their friends.

Some profess their faith because they have experienced welcome in the Christian community.

Some turn to God, because God has shown them To be faithful and true.

He was living on his own and had only a few dollars till his next paycheck.

His cupboards were bare. He didn't know what to do.

So he prayed. He prayed.

In the mail next morning there was a card from his grandma.

She had included a check.

She thought the money might come in handy.

He suddenly knew that it was more than just grandma Who was looking out for him.

Just think to yourself quietly:

What are the reasons for your commitment to Christ?

## **PAUSE**

Last week we heard the story of Joseph and Potiphar.

We saw how God's promise to Abraham,

That promise about being a blessing,

Was lived out in Abraham's great-grandson.

Joseph blessed Potiphar's household.

And Joseph ended up blessing Egypt.

[Rather God blessed Egypt through him.]

Joseph told Pharaoh to prepare for a coming famine, And the people of Egypt escaped mass-starvation.

And so we can see those promises being fulfilled: Those who blessed Israel were blessed in return. Today we skip many years ahead.

The people of Israel are still in Egypt

But Joseph and his brothers

have gone on to be with their fathers.

While the people of Israel have prospered in Egypt a new king came to power who knew nothing about Joseph's reputation.

This king subjugated Israel.

He enslaved the people.

He enlisted them on his public works projects.

The people may have felt abandoned.

But God didn't forget them.

We are told that God heard their groaning.

God calls Moses and sends him to Pharaoh Telling him, to "let my people go."

What follows is the other half of that promise

That God made to Abraham:

God will bless those who bless Abraham,
But those who curse him will be cursed.

While Pharaoh refuses God's demands

God sends plagues on Egypt.

The disasters keep escalating till Pharaoh relents And lets God's people go.

Which brings us to today's reading.

Today's reading tells us stubborn Pharaoh is having second-thoughts:

"Pharaoh and his officials changed their minds...

and said, "What have we done?

We have let the Israelites go

and have lost their services!""

Which leads to today's drama.

Pharaoh sends his best chariots to chase down the escaping people And bring them back into captivity.

Imagine what the people of Israel must have been thinking When they heard the sound of hoofbeats, saw all those chariots bearing down on them, stared at the water ahead of them, and realised they were trapped.

The people call out crying and complaining to Moses:

"Weren't the cemeteries large enough in Egypt
so that you had to take us out here in the wilderness to die?"

"""

Moses tells the people not to lose their nerve, To hold on and trust:

"Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today.

The Egyptians you see today you will never see again.

The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still.""

And we watch how the pillar of cloud

That had been leading the people by day,

Moves behind them,

A hedge between them at the pursuing army.

Meanwhile the sea that the people were now pinned against is driven back by a wind that the Lord had sent So that the waters became dry land.

The people walk between those parted waters,

But when the Egyptians follow after them

The Lord throws them into confusion,

Jamming up their chariots in the mud.

As the Israel makes it to safety
the waters sweep back over the Egyptians.
We are told that "Not one of them had survived."
vi

It is interesting to note that before the crossing of the sea

Both Israel and the Egyptians are unclear about God's commitment.

Despite losing their firstborn the Egyptians chase after Israel.

Israel, for her part wishes she was back in Egypt.

But when the Egyptian chariots get stuck

Their drivers realise the Lord is fighting for Israel.

And after the same chariots are swallowed by the sea

We are told that:

"the people feared the Lord and put their trust in him..."

"vii

For the people of Israel both then and now the story of the exodus in the central story of their faith.

When the Ten Commandments are later given, those laws includes this preface:

"I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery."

"I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery."

"You shall have no other gods before me.""viii

A famous midrash asks the question:

"If the Ten Commandments were so important why were they not said at the beginning of the Torah?

[To answer this] the Rabbis told a parable...

To a king who entered a new territory and said to its citizens:

"May I be your king?" the people replied:

"What have you done for us that we should grant you the right to rule over us?"

What did the king do?

He built a wall around the city for them, he brought the water supply within the city and fought their battles.

Then when he came before them again and said, "May I be your king?" they responded, "Yes, Yes."

And so God did for Israel."ix

The people of Israel respond to God

Because in the exodus God demonstrates God's commitment.

God has fought for them, God rescued them

even while they waited.\*

I mentioned that there are better and worse reasons For committing ourselves to God.

For the people of Israel their commitment Came as a response to God's deliverance.

In an act of power, reminiscent of creation,
God leads a people who are broken and afflicted
into a new future.

They are carried from death to life.

This same God will go to incredible extremes to keep all of God's promises.

As the story continues we will discover more about this same God "who attends to the broken and afflicted in ways beyond our imaginings."xi

Of course the God who makes a path through the sea

The God who raise the dead to life

Also demonstrates his love in less spectacular ways,

More mundane ways.

So what are the reasons for your own commitment?

And if you haven't made any commitment,

Might you have good reasons to do so?

To walk up to the front and to profess your faith?

Let me share a story about one person's commitment to Christ.

This is the story of a writer named Lily Burana,

Told her own words:

I have always been a person of gloom.

Even as a small child, I suffered bouts of depression salted with anxiety

before I even knew what the words meant.

From toddlerhood on, insomnia overtook me as I tried rocking myself to sleep.

I didn't want to get up in the morning.
I wouldn't brush my hair.
I didn't want to go to school.

But I did go to church. Until I didn't.

I'm a cradle Christian, raised on Sunday school classes
with picture books of Moses bobbing in the basket in the reeds
and Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus in the straw-dusted manger...

I attended Bible study after school, and in the summer our teacher toted us to rallies where I'd win scoops of candy for correctly reciting Scripture verses...

Meanwhile, the darkness within kept creeping...

I became less interested in church,
and by adolescence, depression, sarcasm, and cynicism
had become my holy trinity...

At 17, I dropped out of high school and moved to New York City's East Village...

While my outsider status provided an important measure of belonging and consolation, it wasn't a lasting answer to the problem of living with steady depression.

I moved to the West Coast and back again,
married, and started working as a writer
between dark spells that froze me
into writer's block for weeks at a time.

At times, you could say I was passing for normal.

But a few years ago,
when a dangerously deep and rocky depressive spell
had me in its grips,
I teetered on the brink of suicide.

Even with the cosmetic appointments of a full and happy life
—husband, family, health, career—
I felt desperate, alone, scarred, stained, and worthless.

At my lowest low, I asked God for a sign that my life meant something, that I meant something, and God delivered, [God delivered!]

in the form of a bald eagle soaring across my sightline mere minutes after I'd requested that exact omen.

I cautiously returned to church, keeping my expectations low.

Would it be anything like I remembered...

Would it be a waste of time?

What it turned out to be was fabric softener for my soul something rough and stubborn inside me was gentled.

Biblical teachings, delivered with theatricality and interpretive depth, helped me examine my depression with deliberate care and no judgment.

I loved hearing about how God not only redeems us but emboldens us:

Think of Hebrews 13:6, which quotes from Psalm 118

("So we say with confidence, 'The Lord is my helper;

I will not be afraid. What can mere mortals do to me?' ")...

I would love to tell you that God reached down and whisked away my depression.

Wouldn't that be swell?

But faith has only made living with it more manageable...

Through faith in Christ, I feel less alone,
less ashamed, and less likely to conceal my suffering.
Because I know it is heard and believed by God.

Laying down your burden is as central to Christian faith as charity or testimony.

When you've been standing on your own for so long, falling into the arms of mercy is frightening at first, but then comes a whoosh of blessed relief defying explanation...

[Lily concludes:] Doubts about the existence of God closely resemble doubts about the existence of depression:

Both are rooted in the conviction that things must be seen to be believed.

Yet as the beloved writer Madeleine L'Engle once remarked, "Some things have to be believed to be seen."

My eyes are open, in that "was blind but now I see" kind of way, and I'm beholding things with a peace and depth
I've never experienced before...\*ii

## Lily found good reasons for faith. So did the people of Israel. How about you?
