We began with recapping from June 5 and part one of our two part series.

- In the creation story of Genesis 1 we find a man and women both made in God's image.
- They are given the command to be fruitful and multiply – to fill and govern the earth. This command goes beyond procreation but extends into fruitful and flourishing living.
- Woman is created as an “ezer” for man, or helper. This is a strong term that denoting one who can make up the lack left by another. God is called “ezer” a handful of times in the Old Testament, so it is not a weak or subsidiary term.

### **Men and Women Need One Another**

- God's original plan is seen in Genesis 1.
- Human rebellion (sin) got in the way.
- Jesus harkens back to God's original plan, renewing, restoring and creating a new covenant.
- Holy Spirit affirms this in his work done in Acts. This was foreseen in Joel 2.
- Paul also affirms this in Galatians 3.28 and Romans 12.6-8.

### **There Are Obstacles**

- Social structures.
- Biblical illiteracy.
  - The texts many stumble over need to be properly considered.
  - Texts like those found in 1 Corinthians or 2 Timothy shouldn't necessarily be applied liberally as they don't concur with the trajectory of the biblical narrative in regards to women. They are highly contextual.
- Women, who need to be called into maturity to live their call.
- A lack of male endorsement.

### **What Can We Do?**

- Pray.
- Listen to one another's stories.
- Model, promote and celebrate shared leadership.
- Do the theological work.
