## **Advent, Christmas and Epiphany**

What a wonderful time of the year as we prepare to celebrate God's love for us! Our culture focuses on preparing for one day of celebration. However the Church observance covers weeks, not just of a birthday, but three different time periods that enrich our journey in life and faith. What follows are some brief thoughts about the three seasons.

We have already entered the first --- a season we call **Advent**. In this season we focus on waiting for God. In this time we remember Mary waited for nine months, and God's people waited for centuries for the Messiah. The time of waiting was difficult, but also a rich time of preparation for the Messiah's coming. We celebrate the ways that God was known throughout. In Advent we celebrate that God is in the waiting time for us, preparing us for Christ to come to us in real and meaningful ways in our lives. We also celebrate that we are waiting for Christ's promised return.

The second is **12 Days of Christmas** on which we celebrate the birth of Christ. We celebrate that God came into the world, not into a church decked out for the holidays or a palace full of servants, but into the arms and lives of a couple forced to take shelter in a stable. God came amid the difficulties of life into poverty and homelessness. We celebrate Christmas because it happens to us today. God comes to us even amid our darkness, troubles, twists and turns of our lives.

**Epiphany** falls on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of Christmas (January 6). But the season of Epiphany lasts from that time until Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. During Epiphany we focus on our lived response to Christ's birth,

in other words what it means for us to be light in the world.

We look forward to sharing the season with you!

Jan was born and raised in Guelph, ON, the second of five sisters. Currently three of her sisters live in Ontario and one resides in PEI. Jan and John have three grown children; Kristen married to Scott, lives in Kemptville ON, Ben married to Heather, is in Ottawa, and Rachel married to Kaymin, is in Calgary. Jan and John have two grandsons, Malakai five years old and Gideon who is two years old.

During her years of ministry, Jan has undertaken many roles that include Youth Minister, Pastoral Care Giver, Drama Troup, Sunday School Teacher and Christian Educator.

Jan's calling to ordained ministry came following her attendance at an annual conference and course at Princeton. When she returned home, she indicated to John that she believed she was being called to ordained Ministry but it would have to wait until the kids were through university. John's response was, when God calls, you shouldn't say "just wait until I am ready". It is at this point Jan began her studies at university during the same time as their three children, all supported by John.

Jan was attracted to St. Andrew's because of its reputation of being a caring place that looks outside itself. Peter Coutts had telephoned her to see if she knew of any minister who might be interested in a move to our church. # NO CRIB FOR A BED - NEIGHBOURLINK CENTER

This project is to help infants (0-2) born into low-income households get the best possible start in life by providing baby essentials that their parents cannot afford. The project is also known as ICU2. Babies who are currently sleeping on the floor or in a laundry basket are given safe cribs to sleep in. Reaching NeighbourLink's goal of "Neighbours Helping Neighbours" depends on people like us who help with both items and financial donations. NeighbourLink helps more than 10,000 unique clients in Calgary every year. Clients are screened financially, and come from all walks of life.

The specific items requested from NeighbourLink are as follows: diapers size 1-6, baby food, baby formula, baby lotion, baby wipes, shampoo, and diaper cream. As always, we accept gently used strollers. The donor's name and contact information must be attached.

Beginning November 27 and ending December 18, there will be a playpen in the Foyer for collection of your items. Special collection envelopes can also be designated to NeighbourLink "No Crib For a Bed" during this time and will be put towards cribs and these baby necessities.

# **LOOKING BACK**

#### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS NOVEMBER 2016

This year the Session of St. Andrew's is intentionally striving to seek God's will for our future together. We have spent much time at meetings to develop the Ministry Position Descriptions and the necessary related accountability and feed-back provisions.

We also begin each meeting intentionally with scripture and prayer using a method called "word-share-prayer. This involves prayer and discussion of where we have experienced God's leading in our lives and in the congregation. It involves praying for each other and for God's guidance as we as a congregation move toward calling a Minister, Vision and Direction. This month our passage was Colossians 1:11-20.

Some items of interest that were discussed:

<u>The Budget for 2017:</u> We received the draft budget both for our continuing ministry on Heritage Drive and the 5 year plan for ministry south of Fish Creek with some discussion not just about numbers, but about good stewardship of resources.

Alternate Worship Service: Starting in January 2017 there will be a monthly Alternative Worship Time that will be the next generation of Holy Smoke Café. This service will take place early evening on the last Saturday of each month. We look forward to a fresh format and developing a family worship time that might be appropriate for ministry South of Fish Creek.

Congregational Visitors: As a congregation we continue our tradition of trying to keep in contact with our congregation through our "District Visitors". As our society has changed, our culture does not experience visits in the same way it once did. We have asked our District Visitors to contact our congregation to find the preferred ways for us to be in contact, whether it be through personal visits, telephone calls, email or texts. We hope that you will help us through your visitor, to know the best way to communicate important information, usually about 3-4 times a year, and establish ways for you to communicate with your visitor when the need arises.

<u>Search Team:</u> Although the particulars of the Search Process need to be confidential, the co-convenors of the Search Team, Cathy Millar and Loran McVittie, reported that they are meeting regularly and that the search is progressing.

#### **VETERAN'S FOOD BANK**

As of November 20th, Heritage Seniors collected two grocery carts full of food and the congregation of St. Andrew's collected four, for a total of <u>six carts</u>. In addition, St. Andrew's donated **\$3056** to the Veteran's Food Bank.

### What's the Deal with the Café?



The author of Ecclesiastes wrote that "for everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven". Seasons change, and change, it seems, is the natural state of things under heaven. Whether we call it entropy or the stirring of the spirit, part of our life as a church involves understanding and recognizing the direction in which God is moving and joining him where he is.

Three years ago, Holy Smoke Café was started as an initiative to engage families and younger people in worship than a typical Sunday. It was a space to try new forms of worship, to create and experiment with what Church can be as we move into the future.

At a recent meeting, the worship team began a process of assessment around Holy Smoke, attempting to determine metrics for success. The conclusion was that, given the dwindling attendance and the increased workload required to maintain Holy Smoke Café in its current form, something had to give. The worship team advised taking a break from it in its current format and potentially revisiting it in the future.

Sometimes, following the spirit's leading though leads you in a funny direction because at the same time as the worship team was pondering the future of Holy Smoke, the Family Ministry team was considering what family worship might look like South of Fish Creek.

The result was the season changing. Instead of Holy Smoke fading into memory, something new is being created in its place.

A new Saturday evening service will launch on January 28th and continue every month with a more intimate atmosphere and a different form of worship.

A final service under the Holy Smoke brand was held on November 19<sup>th</sup> with a liturgy created by the Family Ministry team. Now the process of creating something new begins. The family Ministry team has put together a survey – you may have seen some of the young adults handing out iPads before, between and after Sunday worship. Take a minute to fill one out. Let us know what your experience of Holy Smoke has been; let us know what you might like it to be.
