#### Improvements (cont'd)


In 2019, DOORS has recognized the following areas are in need of improvements:

- DOORS committee meetings and involvement, 2020 will have more consistent committee member meetings and committee members will have the opportunity to be more directly involved with constituent groups, co-sponsors and newcomers.
- Web presence, DOORS did not have an active presence on social media or our website. In 2020 the website and social media will be used more heavily.
- Volunteers, 2020 will seek to see more volunteers to help further the work of DOORS.


### SPONSORSHIP IN NUMBERS

In 2017, IRCC introduced a new allocation capping system and DOORS was allocated 14 spaces that year. We also submitted one BVOR application that year which brought our total to 15.

2018 began with an allocation of 15 spaces, we requested 26 more in October of that year and We also submitted applications for 10 BVORS bringing our total to 51.

In 2019 we began the year with 47 spaces and received 17 more in November. We submitted applications for 6 BVORS and 15 JAS bringing our total to 85.
