#### Thoughts from the Rector

#### Lord, I want to be a Christian in my heart

It's an old hymn, not in our hymnal but still found in many other hymnbooks, including Lift Every Voice and Sing. Lord, I want to be a Christian in my heart the opening words say. Then that phrase is repeated over and over: in my heart, in my heart.

I've been humming it lately, this old, familiar tune with the striking words, repeated again and again throughout the verses. The thing about old familiar tunes is that they come to us, seemingly without provocation or cause. One day we just realize we've been humming a tune, almost unconsciously, without thinking, for hours.

Music is like that. It is a gift, I believe, a shared part of who we are as human beings. It doesn't matter if you think you are hugely talented musically or know you can't carry a tune in a bucket. Still, the love of music is something we share across boundaries otherwise impenetrable. And in that shared gift we are able to communicate across cultures, ages, societies, genders, even eras. It's really amazing.

I don't know why this particular tune has come upon me lately, but as I write this article I'm thinking that the simple tune allows the words to move ever deeper into my thoughts, gathering as it seeps into my soul a hidden longing that maybe I have ignored lately. You're probably thinking about now, what's wrong with her? Is she not sure she's a Christian anymore?


It's not so much that. I don't doubt my Christianity, my inward and outward identity as one who follows Jesus and believes that his way, The Way, holds deep truths that I can rely on, can live by, can share. But those words, *in my heart*, have begun to resonate with me as I have become conscious of humming this tune. And I want to share with you these thoughts because I believe when we share a jolting realization about ourselves we make it possible to move deeper into relationship with others.

So, no great confession here; just an awareness that I spend my days quite often not thinking any deeper than my mind. Heart and soul follow because they have no choice but to go where my body goes. But we become shallow when we don't challenge ourselves to move deeper into faith, into a place

where the physical, the provable, the logical, are not primary, where the inner self of heart and soul are encouraged to speak up.

There is no better time than Lent and Easter to consider these things, and to be assured that we share these things, these thoughts, in a special way with the community that worships together. As we journey together through Lent, as we struggle through our wildernesses, as we breathe deeply of the new life offered in the resurrection, we are brought together in new relationships of trust, of faith, of love.

I invite you, as our Book of Common Prayer says, to a Holy Lent. A shared Lent. A time of common reflection; a time to seek out deeper relationship; a time to know the love of God. A time to remember that which we once knew and maybe have forgotten: we are a people loved, forgiven, redeemed, made new. The journey will break us open, if we let it, to a new day. Easter will be proclaimed once more, and we will know – We are Christians in our hearts!



Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, and the Church recognizes this with a special liturgy. At Gloria Dei we will come together for a simple meal, beginning at 6:00PM, in the Parish Hall on that evening. Following the meal we will move together into the church for the Ash Wednesday Liturgy which will include Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion. #### Two Choices for Lenten Gatherings

This year at Gloria Dei we are offering two ways in which we will gather to share fellowship and look deeply at our lives as Christians in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

#### Lent Soup and Study: Wednesdays in Lent 6:30 PM - 8 PM


We will continue our Lenten Soup and Study gathering, as in past years, for four Wednesdays in Lent - 3/12, 3/19, 3/26, 4/2, 4/9. We will meet at 6:30PM in Riverside Hall for a simple meal of soup and bread. We will follow our meal with watching and discussing a program called "Embracing Interfaith Cooperation – Eboo Patel on Coming Together to Change the World." The question we will consider: What does interfaith cooperation look like for us as a people of faith in this second decade of the 21st century? One reviewer says about this video program: In his engaging way, Patel tells stories of American founders and great leaders who believed and acted on the principle that it is possible to embrace differences in religion and maintain a common life. This promises to be a program that will challenge some of our fears and enlighten us to new possibilities.

#### Sunday Lenten Book Club: Sundays in Lent 11:30 AM - 12:15 PM

For three Sundays in Lent (3/23, 3/30, 4/6) we will grab some coffee and a snack and retreat to a corner of Riverside Hall to discuss "Gospel of Freedom – Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Letter From Birmingham Jail and the Struggle that Changed a Nation," by Jonathan Rieder. Bishop Daniel has asked that all of us take time this Lent to read this book together, as parishes, as a diocese, as

citizens of the US. One reviewer says: Eloquent and prophetic. Rieder does for our uniquely American saint's 'Letter' what St. Augustine did for the letters of St. Paul. Part commentary, part homily, part exhortation to the faithful, Gospel of freedom reminds us of 'the urgency of now.' This book also promises to challenge us, sometimes in ways that may surprise us.

Please consider joining us for one or both of these programs as we journey through Lent together this year. Let the Rector know if you plan to participate so that we are sure we order enough workbooks (1<sup>st</sup> program) and books (2<sup>nd</sup> program) for everyone.





#### From the Rector's Warden

Spring is right around the corner, and with that comes Gloria Dei's Annual Meeting. Our meeting this year will take place on Sunday, May 4th 2014. During this Annual Meeting, we will discuss the workings of the church, with reports on our finances, our mission and up coming events and activities.

This is also the time we elect new vestry members. Might that be YOU???

The vestry is a group of elected parishioners who administer the temporal affairs of the parish and serve as a council of advice to the rector. The vestry is the leadership body of the church and its voice. The vestry makes decisions with the best interest of the church in mind.

The vestry of Gloria Dei is normally composed of twelve individuals, currently we have 11 members. Four members are elected each year for a three year term. Most months the vestry meets for about two hours on the third Thursday of the month.

The Bylaws of Gloria Dei church state that vestry members must "be baptized and confirmed lay persons of the age of eighteen years and upwards, who shall have been worshipers in this church as their usual place of worship for at least one year prior to the

date of the election and who shall appear by the books of the Corporation to have contributed towards the expenses of the Corporation, by payment in time, talent or treasure a sum of not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00)

To be considered for election to the vestry at the Annual Meeting, a person must meet the qualifications stated above and be nominated to the Secretary of the vestry in writing by at least three (3) members, at least four (4) weeks prior to the election. This nomination must be signed by the person being nominated to be valid.

Nomination forms will be available in the church and in the parish office beginning on Sunday March 16, 2014. These nomination forms must be submitted to the Secretary of the vestry (Leigh Jenkins) no later than Sunday, April 6, 2014.

Public notice of the nominated members will be posted by the Secretary of the vestry on the bulletin boards inside the church and Riverside hall for four (4) weeks, prior to election.

This year we have four (4) - three year term vestry openings, and one (1)-one year term to complete the remaining term of a vestry member who is resigning.

Gloria Dei needs you to consider becoming a member of this important church body. No need to wait for a member to ask you to run for vestry, simply nominate yourself!

During our Annual Meeting we will also be electing three (3) Deanery and Convention delegates and two (2) alternates. All are two (2) year terms. Current delegates and alternates are eligible to be elected.

Most of all please mark you calendars and participate in our Annual Meeting on May 4th.

#### George Ord Sr. - Ship Chandler

George Ord, Sr. was born in England in May, 1741 and settled in Southwark. He married Rebecca Lindmeyer on January 17, 1767. They lived in a three-story brick house with a large garden at 784 South Front Street, between Catherine and Clymer Streets. Prior to settling in Philadelphia he was a successful ship captain. Ord partnered with Samuel Inglis and made a fortune as a privateer from the bounties earned on the ships and cargoes taken. The Continental Congress authorized private ships to attack and seize British commercial vessels.

Ord was a rope maker and ship-chandler with his business located at the Willing & Francis wharf on the Delaware River. In April, 1785 he was chosen as a Warden of the Port of Philadelphia.

Ord is buried next to the Church, near the rectory. His tombstone reads "Beneath This Stone are deposited the remains of Captain George Ord. He was born in The Kingdom of Great Britain May 26, 1741 and died in Philadelphia October 13, 1806. Age 65. In his will he requested that his wife and son George carry on his business for eight years. Ord's wife, Rebecca died June 13, 1823 at the age of 81. Ord's tombstone is fairly easy to spot as the top of the grave resembles the upside down hull of a ship.

The Ords had four children including George, Jr., Ann Pinkerton, Maria McMullen, and Henrietta Ord.

#### George Ord, Jr.; Naturalist, Ornithologist, Writer

Although George Ord was a devoted naturalist, ornithologist, and writer, he is also noted for his animosity towards famous ornithologist John James Audubon, who he called an "impudent pretender" and "neither a scholar nor philosopher." He became interested in the study of science and literature at an early age. Following in his father's footsteps, Ord joined his father in his rope-making business in 1800 and continued in the business after his father's death in 1806, finally retiring from the business in 1829 to devote more time to science.

Shortly after his first marriage, Ord befriended the Scottish poet and naturalist Alexander Wilson, who became one of his greatest influences. Wilson



died in 1813 leaving Ord to finish the eighth volume of Wilson's greatest work, American Ornithology. One year later, Ord published the ninth and final volume of this great work. Besides writing the Sketch of the Life of Alexander Wilson, Ord wrote memoirs on the lives of fellow naturalists Thomas Say and

Charles A. Lesueur. He also contributed numerous articles that appeared in many of the scientific periodicals of the day, including the *Transactions of the American Philosophical Society*, and the *Journal of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia*.

In 1815, Ord became a member of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia. Two years later Ord became a member of the American Philosophical Society, serving as secretary, vice president, librarian, treasurer, and councilor. He later served as president of the Academy of Natural Sciences from 1851 to 1858, a position that he "never sought after." He resisted the position because of his age and "infirmities," and his "habits of retirement," which had rendered him "averse to company and the turmoil of life." Moreover, Ord plunged further into the life of a recluse with each passing year. Ord's health was not always well; he suffered from poor eyesight, regular bouts of influenza, and various attacks on his health. Ord died on January 24, 1866 and is buried at Gloria Dei.

These graves and stones will be restored this summer as the ongoing work of restoring Old Swedes' Historic Cemetery.

#### STANDING NOTICES

#### Weddings

Weddings at Gloria Dei (Old Swedes') Church must be scheduled with the clergy at least three months in advance. All weddings in the church will be governed by the Canons of the Diocese of Pennsylvania and the Book of Common Prayer. Pre-marital counseling is a prerequisite. No weddings will be conducted during Lent.

#### Funerals

When death occurs a family member is asked to contact the clergy so that timely arrangements for a funeral may be made. It is appropriate for the funeral of a Christian to take place in the church. It is also appropriate that funeral arrangements be made in advance and kept in a file in the church office. Burial plots are available for members of the parish in the church's cemetery. Consult the church office for costs and details.

#### Baptisms

The sacrament of Holy Baptism is celebrated during one of the principle Sunday liturgies and is governed by the Canons of the church and the Book of Common Prayer. Baptism is normally celebrated on one of the four appropriate feast days designated in the Book of Common Prayer. These are: The Baptism of Our Lord (1/12/14). The Great Vigil of Easter (4/20/14); Pentecost (6/8/14); and All Saints Sunday (11/2/14). Other Sundays may be chosen, if necessary, with the advise of the clergy. Baptism instruction will be provided for parents and godparents beforehand.
