Thoughts from the Rector

Where are we going?

Jack Kerouac (of 1950's Beatnik fame) put it this way:

"...we gotta go and never stop going till we get there."

"Where we going, man?"

"I don't know but we gotta go."

Gotta go, gotta go! I say it a lot. And I'm beginning to worry that I've forgotten where I'm going, or why I'm in a rush, or if I will some day be able to regain the ability to sit still without falling asleep. Not good.

If we're not careful these days we find the world we live in overwhelming us with to-do lists, information overload, and more than enough of the challenges of making ends meet than we can possibly expect to deal with in any sensible, reasonable way. Just can't get it all done, just can't find time to be with loved ones for more than fleeting visits and quick meals. Then we're off, racing against the clock to get one more errand run, one more meal made, one more phone call or email responded to, a few hours of sleep squeezed in.

Where are we going that makes us rush so? What is it about our lives that has gone so out of whack? Why have we lost focus and how can we get it back? What needs to give in order for us to regain our sense of balance, our sense of presence, our sense of purpose, our sense of who we are?

I suppose some might say we've lost our way due to vast and rapid changes beyond our control. But I'm not sure that's accurate. It might feel like we are experiencing a new world order but I suspect that's been the case many times in human history. The world we inhabit as human beings has changed drastically more than a few times since we moved from caves to walled communities to cities and empires and nations. My guess is the same angst was felt in the past as we are experiencing now when changes beyond our control affected the way we live. And my guess is the same questions and concerns arose that we are wrestling with today. Where are we going? Why are we rushing? What are we gaining? What are we losing?

Human beings are resilient creatures, made in the image of the Creator who is both immanent and transcendent. It is as we realize the fullness of who (continued on next page)

we are that we discover our natural tendency to reach for the stars. This is a good thing! But somewhere in the "reaching" we overextend ourselves, time and again, and get ourselves in trouble. It is as we lose focus of the center of our being, the Christ within us, the Christ in our midst, that we go awry and begin to lose sight of the greatest mystery of all – God with us.

Advent always comes just in the nick of time for me. As I expend the last of my "do it all yourself" self and collapse, giving up and giving in, allowing God to arrive all on his own, without my help, it is then that I remember -OhYeah! It's the Baby! It's the promise! Wow! He's coming again!

And I breathe a sigh of relief. I let go and begin to sleep, to pray, to listen, to learn again that God who never left, never leaves, awaits my attention and asks for my presence in the greatest of all miracles. You, me, all of humanity, are invited to the Incarnation – again!

May you have a blessed, peaceful, Advent. And may you find time to await his coming in the quiet confidence that all any of us need do is show up.

Events

Gloria Dei Timeline: 1900-1949

- 1903 The Hook and Hastings tracker organ installed.
- 1916-1922 Percy Stockman Rector
- 1922-1927 Addison Ewing Rector
- 1927 -1933 John Lowry Hady Rector Mr. Hady was a brilliant preacher and loved by many in this congregation.
- 1935-1972 John Craig Roak Rector
- 1938 First Lucia celebration held. In June Crown Prince Bertil of Sweden visited.
- 1939 Choir lockers installed in South vestibule. Display cases installed in Vestry Room.
- 1941 February, Gloria Dei named National Historic Landmark
- 1942 Shutters installed on Church by the Pennsylvania Society Sons of the Revolution.
- 1943 January 9:00 am service begun for defense plant workers
- **June 1944** A terrible fire occurred among drums of glycerin, oils and soap chips stored in the four-story factory just one hundred feet south Church.
- October 22, 1944 The Wm Penn Bible was used at Gloria Dei Church service in honor Penn's 300th Anniversary of his birth
- March 1947 Carl Milles, the noted Swedish sculptor, gave us our magnificent Chandelier and two models of the ships, which brought over the first settler.

Philadelphia Timeline

- 1900 Philadelphia population 1,293,697. American League of Professional Baseball Clubs is organized with 8 founding teams. The Philadelphia Orchestra is established. The area of Philadelphia is the largest of any other city in U.S.
- 1901 First Mummer's parade a tradition with its roots in the Swedes' celebration of the Christmas and New Years holiday in Tinicum and Kingsessing.

- 1906 Race demonstration, riots in Philadelphia.
- 1910 Philadelphia population 1,549,008
- 1911 Philadelphia Athletics won World Series.
- 1912 Leopold Stokowski assumes the baton for the Philadelphia Orchestra.
- 1920 Philadelphia population 1,823,779.
- 1925 Benjamin Franklin Parkway emulating the Champs d'Elysses in Paris is completed.
- 1930 Philadelphia population 1,950,961.
- 1933 The Philadelphia Eagles founded. Blue Laws overturned allowing Sunday sports.
- 1940 Philadelphia population 1,931,334.
- 1946 First large-scale fully operational electronic computer is completed at the University of Pennsylvania.

STANDING NOTICES

Weddings

Weddings at Gloria Dei (Old Swedes') Church must be scheduled with the clergy at least three months in advance. All weddings in the church will be governed by the Canons of the Diocese of Pennsylvania and the Book of Common Prayer. Pre-marital counseling is a prerequisite. No weddings will be conducted during Lent.

Funerals

When death occurs a family member is asked to contact the clergy so that timely arrangements for a funeral may be made. It is appropriate for the funeral of a Christian to take place in the church. It is also appropriate that funeral arrangements be made in advance and kept in a file in the church office. Burial plots are available for members of the parish in the church's cemetery. Consult the church office for costs and details.

Baptisms

The sacrament of Holy Baptism is celebrated during one of the principle Sunday liturgies and is governed by the Canons of the church and the Book of Common Prayer. Baptism is normally celebrated on one of the four appropriate feast days designated in the Book of Common Prayer. These are: The Epiphany (1/6/13); The Great Vigil of Easter (3/31/13); Pentecost (5/19/13); and All Saints Sunday (11/3/13). Other Sundays may be chosen, if necessary, with the advise of the clergy. Baptism instruction will be provided for parents and godparents beforehand.
