Mail-in Annual General Meeting

Each year in April, in compliance with the Local Church Constitution of the Christian and Missionary Alliance of Canada, and in compliance with the Bylaws of Sevenoaks Alliance Church, we hold an Annual General Meeting of the members of our church. There are about 300 Active Members on our current church membership roll, all of whom are eligible to vote at our AGM. Over the last few years, our average attendance for the AGM has been between 100 and 120 people.

This year, however, circumstances have made it impossible for us to hold an in-person AGM. Since mid-March we have been subject to a provincial public health order which prohibits public gatherings of more than 50 people, and the Province does not anticipate lifting that public health order any time soon. On May 28th the Board of Elders made a decision that, rather than putting off holding the AGM for an indefinite period of time, we would choose instead to hold a form of "mail-in" AGM.

The mail-in format that we will be using cannot give us all of the benefits of a live in-person meeting. But it can permit us to complete three key items of business. In compliance with our church bylaws, and in keeping with our customary practices, the three *substantive* items of business that we carry out at our AGM every year are:

- 1. To receive / accept the following reports
 - Ministry Reports
 - Treasurer's Report and Financial statements
 - Annual Budget
 - Nominating Committee Report
- 2. To elect the Board of Elders
- 3. To elect the Nominating Committee

What follows is a description of how the mail-in AGM process will work.

Step 1

Starting on **Tuesday June 9**, and over the next four weeks, **public notice** will be given that a mail-in AGM is being held. Information on the process is being made available through

- e-mail notifications
- our bi-weekly church newsletter
- our website
- announcements during our pre-recorded weekend worship services

Step 2

Starting on Thursday, June 11, the Annual Report and the Nominating Committee Report will be made available for members of the church family to read, either by downloading them from our website, or by picking up a copy at the church office. By request, members can have a hard copy mailed to their homes.

Step 3

Anyone who has a question about any matter related to these reports and/or to the business of the church can send their questions to any member of the current Board of Elders, or to Pastor Jamie, and they will



receive an answer. Questions and answers that may be of general interest to other members of the church family will be reproduced in the **June 23**rd **newsletter**.

Step 4

The Nominating Committee, in their report, have nominated a complete slate of members to serve as Elders, and a complete slate of members to serve on the Nominating Committee, for next year. If anyone wants to **nominate an alternative candidate** for either of these two positions, that nomination must be submitted to the church office in writing, along with a short biography of the person being nominated, by not later than **Monday June 22**.

Step 5

On **Tuesday June 23** a **written ballot** form will be made available. A PDF version of this form will be sent out to Active Members of the church as an e-mail attachment, or they can pick up (or complete) a copy of the ballot at the church office.

Step 6

For a two-week period of time, from **Monday June 29** until **Monday July 13**, completed ballots may be brought in and dropped into the **ballot box at the church office**, or mailed to the church office instead.

Step 7

On **Tuesday July 14** the ballot box will be opened, the **ballots counted**, and the results tallied. This task will be carried out by a group of 5 people, which will include the Secretary of the Board of Elders, the church bookkeeper, and three non-Elder, non-staff representatives of the Members.

Step 8

Results will be announced via e-mail notification on **Tuesday July 14**, and by announcement during the prerecorded weekend worship service on **Sunday July 19**.



Report of the Lead Pastor

The church is a covenanting people. It consists of those whom the Spirit has called out of the world through the proclamation of the gospel to walk together as God's people.

A few years ago the Lord spoke to me pretty directly regarding the task at hand for our church family. I was standing overlooking the sizeable pond at Cedar Springs retreat centre in Sumas, WA, enjoying the tranquility of the water flowing in from a channel that began at a water wheel in an upper pond. I was struck by the beauty of nature; the pond, the flowers, the fresh air, the shady trees. I was also struck by the activity of human beings <u>upon</u> nature to direct the water, plant the flowers, cut the grass etc. Moments prior I had been

walking the grounds praying for the Lord to revive us. As I took the time to stop and take in the surroundings the Lord spoke with such clarity. His desire is also to revive and renew His church, though of course that must happen in His way and in His timing, but my role (our role) is to co-create our environment and posture ourselves in such a way that the waters of renewal can flow. I understood from that moment that there were *structural* things that needed to be put into place first and that God would be pleased to work His renewing purposes as we postured ourselves and readied ourselves.



Such structural activities that needed attention have included things such as a developing a compelling vision and set of values, taking time to 'incarnate' them into our life together through preaching, teaching and otherwise communicating them, building the right staff team, deciding together (and then leaning into) how to move forward with our facility... For the past 5 years we have been working on such things as well as trying to discern a discipleship pathway for the future. I believe all of this represents the 'structural pieces' that need to be in place and of course will need continual and ongoing attention and development. But I also get the sense that, with many of those things either in place or living with enough traction, we've reached the time to start leaning more intentionally into a posture of renewal. To position ourselves more deliberately for a deeper connection to Jesus!

The year 2019 saw much structural activity, as you'll read about in this report, but also some exciting positioning for the future.

For a few years now, I have been working on personal renewal in my own heart and life. This has included such things as a deeper commitment to my own inner life through the spiritual practice of journaling. This has been a fresh and life giving activity. I have also endeavored to learn how to pray more effectively and have given more attention to scripture memorization. I have also entered into more mentor-type relationships that have been incredibly helpful. Probably the biggest switch I have made in my own life however, has been is to inculcate the art of listening to God. Hearing God's voice on a more regular basis has been life giving and powerful! In fact, our pastoral team has given attention to this together. One such activity has been the use and development of a curriculum entitled the *Hearing God Seminar*. Our team have gone through this material; engaging with the content, entering into practicum steps, and living out the renewal principles in our lives. As such, our desire became to lead the church family through this material. We believe that the cornerstone of any relationship is communication and we also live with a conviction that the church is very good at speaking *to* God (praying) but we are far less inclined to stop to listen for His response. As such we can have a tendency to undercut the relational side of our walk with God; we can end up missing what He wants to



say to us, miss out on wisdom spoken right into the concrete situations of our lives, and struggle to gain His clear direction. So in the fall of 2019 we began to walk some of our ministry leaders and elders through this material and we plan to roll it out to the wider church family in 2020. I believe this to be the first major step in positioning ourselves toward God for greater connection, receptivity to the Spirit, and openness to His direction. This can be a somewhat vulnerable posture - but one that is so worth it! Committing ourselves to the disciplines of the spiritual life, and centering on ones that invite us to listen, is the first step in opening ourselves to God's activity in a more deliberate way. Renewal MUST begin in our own hearts. I'm extremely excited about the beginning point of this discipleship pathway for us and eagerly anticipate further future steps!

Sunday Gatherings

Worshipping together as a family of believers is a wonderful blessing we should never take for granted. The freedom we have to publicly gather as the people of God is not something all of our brothers and sisters the world over have the privilege or safety to do. We are so blessed! Our preaching times this past year have been grouped into the following series';

In addition we've had special services such as a baptism and communion service, a prayer focus, family day, Missions Sundays (David Ens and Lisa Rohrick), Community Care Sunday and Hearing God's Voice.

I'd like to thank everyone, too many to list, who play some part in our Sunday gatherings - both before, during and after the services. Your labours are not overlooked and you are all integral to our community life. Thank you!

Board of Elders

Our board of elders are a pleasure to work alongside and I appreciate their help, perspective, wisdom, and care for our staff. They truly help me lead the church and they are always finding ways to support our staff, protect our staff and do what they can to remove obstacles and create systems for us to work well and fulfil our vision and calling. Thank you to each who has served as elder - you are loved and appreciated!

In 2019 we took a one-night retreat away to Camp Kawkawa for fellowship, teaching, prayer and camaraderie. It was at this retreat that I ran through the first *Hearing God* teaching with our board and Pastor Brian led us through some spiritual exercises. Another highlight to our year has been watching our board take such an active role in praying for the sick. This is indeed part of the calling of the office of elder (James 5:14), and it's been great to participate in this with our board members.

This year saw the completion of the bylaw revision process. Our governance committee completed the work, the Board of Elders approved the new document, our district gave their approval, and now the document is ready to come before the church membership in early 2020.



Vision Trip and Seamless Link Partnerships

In February of 2019 I took part in a C&MA vision trip organized by the National Ministry Center. The purpose of vision trips are to expose our pastors to overseas mission fields and connect them to our international workers on the ground. The hope is to form strong connections and for support relationships to develop. I travelled to the Middle East with a group of other pastors and with our national President, David Hearn. We visited a number of sites where our International workers minister and got to see some of the fantastic initiatives the Alliance is involved with in the Middle East. I also attended the combined Silk-Sand conference in Athens where I met with many of our overseas workers. The immediate impact of the trip was the development of two new Seamless Link partnerships. The first partnership is with the Jarvie family. They were introduced to the church family in the summer. The second partnership that is likely to form is with Katie Bowler in Senegal. Katie will be bringing a message to the church family in early January 2020.

Prayer

Prayer is more potent and powerful than any of us can begin to imagine and I think one day we'll come to truly understand its role in the continuing purposes of God. My hope is that learning to hear God's voice will truly galvanize our prayer life and enable us to pray the will of God more effectively. I also believe we'll *need* to engage in prayer more intentionally as we seek to push against the kingdom of darkness in our quest for renewal. We're in a spiritual battle friends...

There are several ways in which we pray as part of our life together:

- Sunday morning preservice prayer
- Sunday mornings in our gatherings
- After service prayer teams
- Monday noon prayer
- Wednesday morning and evening prayer
- Saturday morning prayer

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who labours in prayer for our church community, city and world.


Embracing Our Future
















Report of the Lead Associate Pastor

Staffing

2019 was a year with significant staff turnover at Sevenoaks. In April **Ron Demers** retired from his long-time position as our Facilities Manager, and at the end of June **Ed Wiebe** retired from the position of Interim Pastor to Seniors. For Ed, this was his third and (Ruth assures us) final retirement from active pastoral ministry.

On the other side of the ledger, the first six months of 2019 saw us hire three new members for the Sevenoaks staff team.

- In April we welcomed **Brenda Rolleman** into the newly created part-time position of Ministry Assistant, in which role she supports both our Children's Ministry and our Worship and Arts Ministry.
- In April we also announced to the congregation that **Keegan Greenwood** will be taking over the core of Ron's former duties in the newly created position of Building Superintendent.



• And in June Jack Campbell re-joined the pastoral staff team at Sevenoaks, as our new permanent Pastor to Seniors. This position, which was a part-time position while Ed was occupying it on a temporary basis, has been expanded to a full-time (30-hour-per-week) position.

All three of these new staff members have begun to bring their gifts to bear on the work that we do together, and all three have made significant positive contributions to the ministry of the church.

At the close of 2019, there were **13 staff members** on the payroll at Sevenoaks, including 7 full-time pastors, 4 full-time administrative staff members, and two staff members in part-time roles.

Last spring, with the help of the wonderful team at the **Canadian Pacific District**, we had the chance to provide all of our staff members – pastors and admin staff alike - to experience some very fruitful learning about ourselves, grow together as a team, and equip ourselves for ministry. Through a ministry skills assessment tool called the **Grip-Birkman** profile, each member of the team was provided with a personalized assessment of his/her personality, leadership and ministry strengths and weaknesses, and then we had **Brian Derksen and Dwayne Toews** from the District come out and facilitate a half-day group learning and team-building session with us.

Missions

2019 was a year of both endings and beginnings for us when it comes to the many ways in which Sevenoaks continues to support overseas missionary work. With the retirement of **Gaileen Warden** after years of service in Cuba, we wound up our formal ministry relationship with the Alliance Church in Cuba. But as God closes one door He often opens another. In February Jamie travelled to Egypt and Greece, on a **Visioning Trip** with a group of other C&MA Canada pastors and leaders, and he came away from North Africa affirmed in his conviction that God has been calling our attention to the **Desert Sands Region**. As a result, we have now entered into two new Seamless Link partnerships: one with a couple in the region who work in a social-media-based **Muslim outreach ministry** and another with a young woman who works with the **Wolof and Fulani people in Senegal**. (2019 was also the year that **Lisa Rohrick**, who has worked for years in Niger with the Wolof and Fulani herself, came home for good and took up a new position with the Canadian Pacific District as our Assistant District Superintendent for Missions Mobilization.)

Throughout 2019 we had a number of international workers join us to speak during our Sunday morning worship services. Apart from Gaileen herself, and Lisa, and our 2 new Seamless Link partners, we've also had the joy of hearing from **Dave and Patti Enns** (our longtime Seamless Link partners based in Cambodia), and from **Jon and Anita McCarthy** (who serve with Wycliffe in Papua New Guinea).

Good Friends, our monthly seniors group, continued the practice of paying close attention to all things involving overseas Missions this year. In the spring they successfully raised enough funds to sponsor the digging of two village wells through an Alliance initiative in **Guinea**, and in the fall played host to a visit and performance by the **Rescue Cambodia** Dance Troupe. Once again this year the women in the **Helping Hands** ministry labored in love to produce hundreds of useful items to be sent for use in overseas missions. And once again this year the members of our congregation, under the leadership of Zina Adams, lovingly prepared many hundreds of shoeboxes to send overseas with **Operation Christmas Child**.

Another exciting new initiative that we began in 2019 involves the **sponsorship of a refugee family** who presently live in northern Turkey, and who we hope to be able to bring to Canada by sometime in 2021. This couple, who have a 4-year-old son, are former Muslims who have become Christians and have had to flee their home in Iran as a result.



The Missions Committee for 2019 was made up of Nathan Anderson, Keith Carpenter, Tore Jorgensen, Leanne VanderMeer, Don Dirks, Flora McCarthy, and Jack Campbell.

Community Care Ministries

The Community Care Committee for 2019 was made up of **Dave Verwoerd, Jonathan VanderMeer, Robby Jeffery, Bert Doerksen, Wayne Gordon, Marilyn Young, and Mandee Pargee**. This Committee assists the Lead Associate Pastor in

- Allocating the funds that members of the Sevenoaks family contribute to the Community Care Fund
- Coordinating all of the various community care-related ministries and activities of the church
- Coordinating our ministry activities with the work of various external partner organizations and agencies in the community

During 2019, Sevenoaks continued to be able to directly serve the community of Abbotsford, and particularly those in need, through several of our own in-house ministries:

- Addiction Recovery Ministry (A.R.M.), led by Linda Driediger and Dustin Milne
- ESL program, led by Dave McCarthy and Bea Hildebrandt
- Word for ESL program, led by Joy McCarthy
- Godson lunch program, led by Andy Martens
- Godson breakfast program (for the winter and spring terms), led by Jenn Pitzel
- Valley Kids for Camp Kawkawa fund-raising concert and campaign, led by Dale Engel and Andy Martens
- Courses on time and money management, put on by Karen Young in the spring
- Talia's Closet, an Archway Community Services initiative that we provide space for, and which makes donated second hand prom dresses and suits available to high school students who might not otherwise be able to afford them

The Sevenoaks family generously contributed over **\$41,000** to the Community Care Fund in 2019, and over \$25,000 of that amount was spent providing direct assistance to over 50 different individuals or couples or families in need, whether in the form of grocery cards, or food hampers, or housing assistance, or access to counselling services. The balance of the money in the Community Care Fund was distributed by way of grants to assist with the work done by various partner agencies, including

Sunday Morning Ministries




appreciation, however, are the many members of the congregation who serve all year in the various other "Sunday morning ministries" that operate in conjunction with the Sunday service.

Report of the Pastor of Children's Ministries

I want to first acknowledge our amazing Sevenoaks Kids team. It warms my heart so much for how they love on and invest in the children of our church. It is so beautiful to watch our volunteers, each in their own special way, interact with the kids whether it's playing games in the gym or in the classroom, praying with the kids, teaching the kids, chatting with the kids, laughing with the kids or welcoming the families as they arrive....each one brings so much to this ministry and I want to say thank-you. Without all of you, we could not do what we get to do every week!

We love our kids and our prayer for them is that their "roots grow down into Him, and that their lives be built on Him. That their faith will grow strong in the truth they are taught, and that they will overflow with thankfulness" Colossians 2:7



Some highlights from our year are:

Sevenoaks Kids Club

Sevenoaks Kids Club provides grade 4 and 5 students with an opportunity to reach out and invite their friends. It is also a way to help grade 5 students get ready to transition into Middle School youth! We have a lot of fun running around playing games, doing activities and participating in a short devotion. There is never a dull moment. Thank-you to Tim Olson, Brenda Rolleman, Arie Wassenaar, Von Pitzel, Caleb Fox, Lauren & Keegan Greenwood who served in our Kids Club this past year!!

Sevenoaks Kids Prayer & Worship Night

In January we hosted a Prayer & Worship night for our children in conjunction with the adults Prayer and Worship night. After the singing time children were dismissed to go to the children's wing where they were given the opportunity to go through prayer stations and learn how to pray through talking and listening! Stations included: Prayer for the World, Be Thankful, Scripture (an important part of prayer and having a conversation with God involves reading the Bible), Encouragement Station (listening to the Holy Spirit if there is anyone who needs encouragement and write an encouragement card), Confession/Repentance station, Rest station, and Lay Your Burdens Down station.

Sevenoaks Kids Helping Children Around The World

We believe it is essential that the children develop a global awareness of the conditions in which other children and families live. In February 2019, Sevenoaks Kids partnered with *Food for the Hungry*. Our goal was to raise \$1000.00 to stock an entire stable with chickens, cows and goats, as well as provide medical aid and animal care training for those animals. With the support of our church family, Sevenoaks Kids raised \$1,035.00 through the kids loose change jars and craft sale! Thank-you!

In November 2019, we embarked on the "Kids in Costa Rica Project". We partnered with the Szostak family and their local church in Costa Rica to help raise funds to launch an *Awana* program. Through the *Awana* program, the Szostaks and their church family are teaching the promises and truths of God's heart for unbelieving kids in their community and those who come from vulnerable families. Through a Christmas craft and bake sale, Sevenoaks Kids raised \$1,044.30! Thank-you church family for all of your support and to all those who helped on the craft days and on the day of the craft/bake sale.

Sevenoaks Kids Team "Prayer Huddle"

Something that I have wanted to do for a while was to have a time where we could come together as a team and pray for each other, and for the kids. In April we began meeting together on Sundays and it is such an important time where we pray together as well as go over any specifics for the morning session!

Sevenoaks Kids "Little Oaks Play Group"

In May we began a play group for moms and their children aged 5 and under. It is a drop-in group where moms can come by any time between 9am and 11am with their children. This is a wonderful time where ladies can enjoy coffee, conversation and community! Thank-you to Lauren Greenwood who is an instrumental part of the leadership of this group!



Brenda Rolleman Ministry Assistant

Brenda Rolleman joined our staff this spring as a Part-Time Ministry Assistant. We were very excited to have her join our team! She is assisting me in my role as Children's Pastor as well as assisting in the Music and Arts department. It has been so wonderful to have Brenda join the team. Sevenoaks Kids Summer Kids Camp

Our desire is to reach out to our neighbours and one way we can do that is through Summer Day Camp. This year Pastor Zach, Brenda Rolleman and I teamed up and hired 6 Middle and High school students (Caleb Fox, Von Pitzel, Kylen Koop, Jenaya Verwoerd, Luke Carpenter, Everet Carter) to run a week-long camp at our church the beginning of July. Team members also included Michelle Olson who led games in the gym, Lori Cross who led crafts, Lesley & Maya Weiss who led snacks, Natalie Herd and Nick Rolleman who helped with decorating. We had 32 children attend, 15 of whom were not from our church. We had an awesome week and believe that kids grew in their faith, heard the gospel and many seeds were planted. Thank-you to all those who gave up time that week to serve the kids and thank-you to Joshua House who helped us by delivering invitations to the neighbourhood by our church a few weeks before the camp.

Sevenoaks Kids "Parent Table Talk"

This past November we had our very first "Parent Table Talk". Pastor Zach and I have teamed up to provide a once-a-month drop in group to talk about issues that parents face and find support and hope that they are not alone!

Sevenoaks Kids Dance Team

This fall our Sevenoaks Kids (Gr1-5) had the opportunity to join the Sevenoaks Kids Dance Team, led by Natalie Herd. It was a wonderful opportunity for children to learn and grow in the area of expression through dance. Report of the Pastor to Students & Young Adults

Middle & High School Youth

The year 2019 was our first full year of Middle & High School Youth meeting on the same night. It was a transition that wasn't as smooth as we hoped, but we made some adjustments and things have seemed to normalize. Each week we engage with Scripture, spend time in our age and gender specific Gospel Communities, play some fun games, and share a tasty snack. We have also been blessed to add worship through music to most of our weekly gatherings thanks to having leaders with musical giftings.

In terms of the specifics of what we did this past year, when it comes to being in God's Word, we did a series on the Gospel in the Spring and a series on the Foundations of Faith this Fall. Throughout the year do fun events like bowling, trampolining, going to the water slides at Cultus Lake, Castle Fun Park, the Corn Maze in Chilliwack, and a bunch of drop-in gatherings at the church building. We also value mountain top experiences where we take Youth away to retreats and conferences like Legacy Youth Conference, our own Middle School Youth Retreat, and our High School students returned to The Congregation retreat at Eagle Bay Camp this past September. A new over-nighter we did this year with Middle School students was a Night in the Wild at the Vancouver Zoo. It is an event that we hope to do again in the future.

One other new thing this fall has been our DNA Groups. Our family hosts a once per month gathering for High School students and a once per month gathering for Middle School students with the intent of providing a place to break bread and have conversations about going deeper in our relationship with Jesus. This is been a blessing in so many ways.

Young Adults

Our Young Adult Gospel Community is primarily for people who have completed High School aged 18-30. The group gathers 2-3 times a month to be in the Word and to socially connect and engage with each other. This past year we did a series in the 'Saturate' material from Jeff Vanderstelt. We continue to seek God as we ask the question of what it might look like to shape our lives around being a part of his mission to the world? Would you pray for this in the lives of our Young Adults?

Report of the Pastor of Community Life

As I reflect and report on the past year, my heart wells up with thanks to God for how He has allowed us to be a part of this church family. I love being with my brothers and sisters in Christ, and getting to see evidences of growth in your love for God, for one another, and in your willingness to step out in faith.

A few stories from the past year stand out: 1) A ladies group that had been formed through a new launch initiative needed someone to lead it. Shelagh was sensing that God wanted her to do it, but was afraid. But with a little encouragement, she stepped out in faith and has been leading ever since. 2) A group of seniors that used to meet regularly for Bible Study hadn't had a leader for a couple of years. That is until Tina went out on a limb and invited the group to her place. She now hosts and they take turns leading and support each other in prayer each week. 3) God gave Anne a heart for the women in her condo building, so she invited women each week to discuss the parables of Jesus that she had heard us preach through. 4) People who have experienced deep loss clung to Jesus, taking comfort in knowing that Jesus was with them. 5) When Rick was too sick to attend his men's Bible study group, the group took their weekly studies to him in hospice. They gathered in his room (sometimes even with other visitors) and called out to God. 6) When Blair had a medical scare, his Gospel Community was right there to encourage him and his family, and to help in practical ways.

I could go on for days, but am encouraged to see how Community Life is supporting our vision of *Knowing Jesus and making Him known*.

Gospel Communities

Gospel Communities gather throughout the week not just to *do* church things, but to *be* the church in their neighbourhoods. They have amazing potential to be the vehicle by which many in our church family grow as disciples of Jesus, and by which many people in our city come to experience the love of Jesus.

I want to begin by thanking all of the leaders of our existing groups. I learn from and am inspired by you as you shepherd the flock of God. Your hospitality and leadership are making an eternal difference. I continue to be encouraged by stories of groups reaching out in mission, inviting new people into community, and creating more space for the Spirit to speak through Scripture. We also took on a few missions projects. Together we filled seventeen shoe boxes at Christmas and for the remainder of the year supported Cyrus Center. Report of the Pastor of Music & Arts

Genesis 11:27 - 15:21

The story of Abram in the Old Testament is a pretty well-known story. It begins with Abram's father, Terah, deciding to leave the home land for Canaan and taking with him Abram, Abram's wife Sarai, and his grandson Lot (his brother's son). For unknown reasons Terah did not continue on to Canaan and decided to settle in another place called Haran. After Terah's death God spoke to Abram and told him a prophecy of how He was going to make him into a great nation and gave him some more instructions on where to go. Abram obeyed and carried on towards Canaan with his family in tow. Now I am just focusing on these 4 chapters Gen 11-15, but God makes 3 things clear about Himself in this snap shot of Abram and Sarai's life. If you read these 4 chapters you will see that no matter what happens, 1) God is still in sovereign control of His story, 2) nothing can stop His will from unfolding and 3) He speaks and moves just when He perceives it is time to do so. Does the famine that forced Abram and Sarai to change their destination mess up God's plan? No. Did Abram's insecurities that caused Him to lie to Pharaoh about Sarai being his sister stop God's plans? No. Did Abram and Lot being caught in the middle of a battle between 9 different kings and Lot and his family being taken hostage stop God's plans? No.

Us

I'm sure all of us feel like our own life stories have interruptions and side tracks like Abram and Sarai's. We had a plan or goal and we were happily going towards it when...something happens that seems to turn everything upside down. That's why it's helpful to reflect on Abram and Sarai's story. Because it is here in their story that we see our story, and more importantly, we see God more clearly: working, protecting, guiding, speaking, encouraging, leading, and all the while it would seem that everything is out of control. But it wasn't was it? We have had our own adversities in our church family this past year (church fire renovation, church family passing away, sickness, hardships) and in our own personal lives, but we must remember that these things don't change who God is and how He will carry out His plan through this church family. Thank-you, God, for the lives of Abram and Sarai, from their story we are reminded that no matter what is going on in our world You remain a personal God who wants to be involved in our lives. Father, may we learn to trust Your sovereignty, learn to be submissive to Your will, and be patient for Your timing. Through Jesus we fix our eyes on You today, and in



the power of Your Spirit may we experience strength and courage to live radically for you. To live like this is the greatest act of worship. Amen

Sunday Services

Every Sunday we gather to sing and pray and hear the preached Word. Each week there are between 16 and 20 people directly involved in the worship experience just in the Media/Tech and Music Ministry. Our Sevenoaks Kids program joins us for the whole service so we can participate in Communion together. Minutes of the Annual Congregational Meeting

Thursday, April 11, 2019, 7 pm

Approximately 109 people in attendance

- 1. Opening Comments and Prayer
 - a. Nathan Anderson (Chair of the board) called the meeting to order at 7:07pm
 - b. Pastor Jamie Fox Jamie prayed for our meeting and thanked God for our church family and the opportunity that we have to be a blessing to our community.
 - Jamie also gave a short update regarding the renovations in the Youth Center and directed the church membership to see the pictures of the work that has been completed so far. Good progress is being made and we are excited to have access to the space in the near future. At this time we are still using the insurance funds to complete all the work which has been done so far. There is also the potential for access to more insurance funds that continues to be worked out. Eventually once the insurance funds run out we will be using our own church funds to complete the project.
 - Jamie also touched on the church's vision and mission statement and how we are accomplishing this in various ways. A current focus for us is to look at how we "make him known" outside of Canada and the missions committee is currently discussing how to be involved in new partnerships for the future. Along with this our Community Care Committee is also growing and exploring new ways to partner in our own community. Additionally, a great focus is also on creating and developing Gospel Communities which will seek to develop and mature pockets of our church family all over town. Finally, Jamie mentioned that we will be introducing a new stream of discipleship in the future that focusses in hearing God's voice, practicing renewal disciplines and posturing ourselves to gain and maintain freedom in Christ.
 - c. Testimonies Jamie welcomed Lori Cross up to share a testimony and to talk about her experience with "knowing Jesus..." Lori shared some of her background at Sevenoaks and what she has been learning lately as she has seen God move in miraculous ways.
 - Jamie also invited Keegan Greenwood to share his wife Lauren's (who was out of town) testimony about "...making him (Jesus) known." Lauren's testimony focused on the great things happening at Centennial Park Elementary school and the opportunities for local missions and relationships which this provides.

Even when Lyle Magnus was here (as a full time pastor) he was not spending all his time with seniors (other responsibilities took him away from his primary role). The new position which is posted may be for up to 30hrs/week and is focused on the area of support for our seniors. Therefore this new position would involve just as much time (perhaps more) focusing on seniors ministry as any of the previous full time pastors were devoting to this.
