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Dear Friends,



One of the most challenging things for me during this Covid-19 season is not getting to see all of you. I miss being able to chat in the foyer and to hear about all the important things that are happening in your lives. I enjoy preparing worship each week, in hopes that it continues to inspire you in Growing. LIFE. Together. With God. I appreciate so much the technology that allows us to be together in worship each week. It is amazing how the Spirit can still draw us together as a community; and enable us to welcome so many more people than was possible in person. However, let me still say – I miss seeing you all!

For this edition I simply want to update you on some of the key things that are happening at St. Andrew's. Since its creation earlier this spring, the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) of Session has been meeting monthly, in addition to our regular monthly Session meetings. The ELT, which is comprised of five elders and myself, has been created to promote nimble leadership during this pandemic; because things can change so quickly, even in one hour. The ELT continues to meet this summer, monitoring our ongoing ministry, staff and financial resources.

In June, the ELT approved the creation of a Re-Opening Task Force headed by elder, Mark Rowe. During the summer, this team will be carefully researching and making plans for what re-opening might look like at St. Andrew's. At the end of June, new six-month contracts were signed with Britten Banerjee (Audio/visual and live streaming), Micheal McEachen (Communications) and Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Simmins (Pastoral Care). This has been an exciting season for TheCreek ministry of St. Andrew's, which, under Rev. Jared's leadership, has received approval from Session for a new online digital ministry initiative. Visit their website and take a look! New job descriptions have now been approved for our three ministerial positions that integrate all aspects of our Vision for ministry into each job description. We are also excited about the recent renovation of Trinity Hall, largely through volunteer labour, under the supervision of Tom McIntyre. We are grateful!

Finally, I want to commend our Search Team for their early work on filling our third ministerial position – Minister of Growth and Care. Perhaps some of you might think that this is not the time to be proceeding with such a search. Yet like Amos, who bought a field in Anathoth during a time of great upheaval as an assertion of FAITH in the living God, so we begin the early work on this search, in FAITH, while still prudently planning financially. Speaking of finances, I want to thank those who have continued to be so very faithful to the Vision of St. Andrew's during this season. At the end of June 2020 your givings were only \$3,000 less than last year in June 2019. That is remarkable given our economic and social circumstances. Way to go St. Andrews! What a privilege to serve as your Lead Minister.

Unfortunately, donations are not tax deductible as services are being provided in return.

We are so pleased to see the generosity of our St. Andrew's family, with the first \$500 in donations having come in during June to support deserving families chosen by our Family Ministry Team. Everyone who has attended has thoroughly enjoyed their time, one family saying that "it truly felt like an escape from the world. I didn't realize how nice that would be, leaving my cares behind for two hours." The MacFarlane family, including their Stolee" grand-family," are thrilled with the joyful responses they have received!

Any church family of eight people or less is welcome. Bookings may be made until the end of September. Please email Kevin at ksmacfarlane@shaw.ca to book, and once your 1:00 pm time slot is booked, you will be given instructions on how to make your donation online or by mail. Payment is made by going to the standrewscalgary.ca website, choosing "Offering/Donate", contributing \$50 and choosing "Pool FUN-Raiser" in the "To:" box. All other information including your credit card number will be required.

All pool use will be at your own risk with waivers sent to you in advance to be signed by all adults (18 and over) and left in an envelope at the door before entry. The backyard entrance will make it easy for you to access the private pool area, eating area and bathroom. Please bring your own towels, drinks and snacks with plastic bowls, plates and cups. (No glass please.) No cooking facilities are available.

Chairs, tables and railings are sanitized between guest bookings. Washroom taps and doorknobs are also sanitized. Children who are not fully potty trained must wear a swim diaper. One third of the pool is of adult wading depth, dropping to a maximum of ten feet. No diving is permitted.

Spiritual Moments by Jayne Martin

Last Thanksgiving, I received the strangest email. It came from Rev. Dr. Michael Caveney at Kamloops United Church, inviting me to join them for Sunday worship. I laughed because I lived in Calgary, and did not know anyone there, but emails and newsletters kept coming.

Then COVID-19 hit, and I began receiving daily meditations and invitations to join in their live-streaming Sunday worship services. One day out of curiosity, I clicked on a daily meditation. I was so taken with the two stories Rev. Dr. Caveney told that I shared the meditation with Jackie Moody and my daughter Amelia. I sent an email to Rev. Dr. Caveney to let him know how much I enjoyed his daily meditation and to see if he knew how I ended up on their email distribution list. He didn't have a clue either!

I decided to tune into their live-stream worship. I would watch St. Andrew's service at 10:00 am followed by Kamloops United Church's worship at 11:00

On Palm Sunday, Rev. Dr. Caveney requested volunteers to read scripture for their Good Friday service. Well, if you know me, you know I have a passion for Scripture reading. I immediately contacted him and volunteered to read. Much to my delight, I was selected, along with two others. We filmed the readings via Zoom and they were then inserted into the Good Friday service.

The next week, Kamloops United Church advised me that my 250 area code telephone number was not in service! Here was a clue. I Googled the number and found it had been registered to a Jayne Martin in Kamloops. Somehow the church ended up with my email address, thinking it was hers. Mystery solved, and I became known as the "fake" Jayne Martin.

Meanwhile, Jackie and I embarked on a 40-day bible study with Rick Warren's, "The Purpose Driven Life." In one chapter, it mentioned surrendering your life to God. I told Jackie afterwards that if she had not been partnering with me in the Bible study, I would have quietly closed the book and put it back on the shelf. So, after praying about it, I did surrender my life to God. Three days later, I had this inkling that I should virtually join the Kamloops United Church. I kind of swatted the idea away like a bothersome mosquito, but next thing I knew, I was in tears as God was not finished with me yet. His calling was so strong that I soon realized that this was the path He meant for me to take.

My first step was to check with Rev. Dr. Caveney to see if it was even possible for this calling to be fulfilled. After careful consideration, he shared his joy and enthusiasm with me. Then, I knew it was a done deal.

Speaking with Inge Murray, my spiritual mentor, she shared a beautiful analogy with me. Life is a road. Sometimes you walk on the road together, then you may take another path and sometimes that path joins up with the road again. Even if you are on different paths, you still have the shared experiences that you enjoyed when you were both on the same road.

I will always remember with fondness, the kindness that the members of St. Andrew's have always shown me. Thank you, St. Andrew's, for sharing my faith journey.

The Facilities team Furloughed but never idle . . . by Flemming Nielsen

In spite of Covid-19, the Facilities team has been busy with many improvements, maintenance and upkeep issues. Team members may be on temporary layoffs, working from home, or simply retired, but what for some could be temporary setbacks, has turned out to be of great benefit to St. Andrew's. While the building stands idle, there is room and opportunity to do work, which might otherwise be difficult to arrange, due to access or manpower availability.

The property surrounding the church has not been forgotten either. On a Saturday morning in early June, Bob Shaw, who spearheads the Facilities' outdoor upkeep, led a team of six volunteer beautification enthusiasts in the maintenance of the flower beds. and the planting of a fresh crop of bedding-out plants. We thank them all for their work and dedication to the cause.

The parking lot has not escaped attention, and here the yellow lines, delineating parking stalls, have been repainted, and where it was not possible to spray paint the lines, black fibre strips were inserted in the chain link fencing to indicate the eight to nine foot width of each parking stall. In past years manual painting of the lines was undertaken by team members, but this year the machine took over. and thanks to the steady hand of the professional operator, the task was accomplished in record time.



The Medium is the Message by Rev. Jared Miller

Five hundred years ago, the printing press was the height of technology, and the concept that ideas could be mass produced and shared was very quickly adopted by the church. Fast forward to today and media like ConnXions is the natural evolution of that process. The church has been forced to rethink its approach to mission. It has discovered that not only is "online" a place, but it happens to be the place where we find a whole lot of the people we're trying to reach. So, as mission shifts, the approach of the church needs to shift as well.

In Acts we're told that Paul's missionary journey took him to Athens, the seat of thought and culture in the ancient world, and Paul went straight for the Aeropagus, Mars Hill, where he announced that God had raised Jesus from the dead. However, he didn't do it by quoting Isaiah or Zephaniah. He did it by quoting Greek poets, playwrights, and philosophers. He put the story of God into words that his audience could understand.

The story of the Aeropagus is a story about the importance of communication. The Gospel, which literally means Good News, needs to be communicated in a context that makes sense to the people we are trying to reach. It's more than just the words we speak; it's the medium we use to say them.

Until this year, most of us have thought of the internet as a tool. For others, it's a collection of websites where we find information: or it's a medium to connect diverse and distant peoples. What we have learned is that a huge and growing number of people see "Online" not as a thing, but as a place. Its a place where people have been gathering for more than a decade, and have made not only lasting and real relationships, but have made a notable difference in our world.

Here at St. Andrew's COVID-19 has shown us that online gatherings are not a substitute for in-person gatherings, but they are a way of building real and meaningful connections with people, literally around the world. When our world changes, our approach needs to change as well.

Financial Update from Stewardship, Planning and Finance by David Platt, Convenor

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church is, overall, financially healthy with a strong balance sheet. While our doors may be temporarily closed, our congregation remains strong, our devotion to God is faith filled and we look forward to the day when we can reconvene and worship together. In the meantime, we continue to grow life together with God.

Like most organizations across the country and around the world our 2020 cash flow has been impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic and at June 30, 2020 we are experiencing a cash deficit of approximately \$32,000 versus the congregation approved plan of an \$18,000 deficit for the year.

On behalf of the Stewardship, Planning and Finance team I would like to thank everyone for your continuing financial support and generosity in these uncertain times. Your giving is making a difference, as we have been able to continue with our programming and ministries despite the pandemic.

For our family it is important we continue to appreciate how God has continued to bless us in these strange days of lockdown and social distancing. I hope and pray that you and your family can also see God's grace in action through the financial support of our church. We do not give to St. Andrew's; we give through St. Andrew's.

Hosting the Coptic Orthodox Church in South Calgary by John Hazlett

Throughout the week our Heritage Drive building is usually host to many church and community groups. Since the spring of 2018, on Saturdays it has been home to St. Mary & St. Paul Coptic Orthodox Church, a congregation that was founded in 2013 to minister to the Coptic community in south Calgary. Perhaps you have wanted to know more about these fellow Christians that meet regularly in the church building!

The Coptic Orthodox Church of Alexandria is based in Egypt with 18 to 22 million members globally. The head of the church is the Patriarch of Alexandria in the Holy See of Saint Mark, who also carries the title of Coptic Pope.

Today the Coptic Pope presides from Saint Mark's Coptic Orthodox Cathedral in the Abbassia District of Cairo. Pope Tawadros II, the 118th and current pope of Alexandria, was enthroned in November 2012.

The Christian church in Egypt was founded in the middle of the first century (AD 42) by St. Mark, one of the four Evangelists, who preached the Christian message to native Egyptians. St. Mark was martyred in Alexandria (AD 68) by followers of the Graeco-Egyptian deity Serapis, who resented his efforts. At the time of his death, there was a significant Christian following in Alexandria, and Christianity continued to spread throughout Egypt in the first century.

The Coptic language preserves Egypt's original language, which was gradually succeeded by Egyptian Arabic. Derived from ancient Egyptian using Greek letters, it is a universal language used in Coptic churches worldwide.

Outside of Egypt, Sudan and Libya, significant
Coptic populations are found worldwide,
including in the United States and Canada.
It is estimated that roughly one million Coptic
Orthodox Christians live outside their homeland.

From the time of the Muslim conquest of Egypt (AD 639), Coptic Christians have been subject to religious persecution. The situation improved in the early 19th century under the stability and tolerance of the Muhammad Ali dynasty, but after the 1952 revolution, led by Abdel Nasser, the Coptics endured growing marginalization, and since the "Arab Spring" in 2011, they have suffered increased religious discrimination and violence.

The priest of St. Mary & St. Paul, Father Anthony Soliman, departed to heaven in February 2020. The congregation is in a time of transition as it considers the recommendation of a new priest by His Grace Bishop Mina of the Diocese of Mississauga, Vancouver and Western Canada. On a typical Saturday, a worship service is followed by Sunday School and a shared meal. Three divine liturgies are celebrated in the church today; those of St. Basil, St. Gregory and St. Cyril, all based on what St. Mark used in the first century. St. Mary & St. Paul live streams their weekly worship services on YouTube, which has been crucial during this time of Covid-19.

St. Andrew's is only a temporary home for the St. Mary & St. Paul congregation while they actively fund raise for a permanent home.
