The Canonical Committee started its work last year after the resignation of our rector, John Stephens, to work with the parish in the development of a parish profile and identifying a candidate to be our new rector. We now have our representative from the diocese and are able to move into the final stages to complete the profile.

To get to this stage, the Canonical Committee has been working in the background all year. Along with hiring John Bailey as our Priest in Charge, we have been: pulling together material from the many parish ministries and groups; reviewing the results of the Parish Questionnaire and input from the Visioning Days; working with Church Committee to finalize the mission statement and parish goals; and reviewing a variety of resources to inform the parish profile.

Including the grandparents will cost an additional \$10,000 to the original fundraising goal of \$40,000, making the new goal \$50,000. We have already raised more than \$25,000 and will likely have a year or so to fundraise the remaining money.

STREET MINISTRY

Dale, Carol and I set out from St. Phillips yesterday morning; it was drizzling, but not raining. Dan met us there with packets, bananas and oranges and a large supply of warm jackets and other clothing. Our first stop was the Shoppers on Dunbar Street. There we found D from the Dunbar Apartments. He was in good spirits and took a packet, fruit and some extra socks. He talking about his housing – we were unsure as to what he meant, but he seemed to be saying he had to leave his housing for a time, but is going to be allowed back soon. He had obviously been spending some time in front of the Shoppers, as he was using an old metal newspaper container in front to store some food and clothing items.

At Fourth and Highbury we met B, T, B, M and W. All took fruit and packets, and everyone found some extra pieces of clothing that fit, and these were very much appreciated. W was very chatty, and told us that after the snow melted she had pushed her shopping cart all the way up the 10th hill to collect bottles. She said her hip bothered her, but she got a huge haul of bottles that people had saved for her. She was going to see her daughter soon. D chatted with B, who told him about his aunt and sister being Olympic calibre skiers. Next we headed to the Jericho Hostel, and found M sleeping in a large box in his usual spot on the Hostel porch. He was happy to take a packet and fruit. There was no sign of A at the sub-station, so we checked at the Locarno beach concession, where he had been seen previously, but again no sign of him. We did see M's bike and belongings, though, so left him a packet and fruit. Just as we were leaving, we spotted M at the Hostel so we looped back around to talk with him. He speaks Spanish, with very little English, so we had some difficulty understanding him. He is staying at the Regent Hotel downtown, and said it is "not very good" there, but he uses it just to sleep. He knew that we were a group from local churches, and told D that many years ago a doctor New Mexico had said that his leg needed to be amputated due to gangrene. But with prayer, that was avoided. A very charming and cheerful fellow. He took some extra socks and tee shirts.

As we headed along Fourth, we saw a fellow sleeping on the sidewalk on the north side of Fourth at the bus stop at Collingwood. He had a blanket, but it wasn't big enough to cover his body. He was older, had a long grey beard.

We gave him a sleeping bag and a packet and some fruit. He did not speak, so we don't know his name. But as we left he was already eating the fruit cup from the packet.

Also on Fourth we saw a fellow sleeping on the sidewalk outside the Shoppers (not M, this fellow was new to us). He was a younger fellow, probably in his forties, clean shaven. He woke up when we asked him if he would like some food, and gratefully accepted a packet and the fruit, but did not want to talk or tell us his name. He also took scarf and extra socks.

We had saved our last packet and fruit for B, who is now back staying at the United Church at 8th and Tolmie. He was there when we arrived, in his sleeping bag, but did not want anything from us yesterday. So we headed over to West 10th, thinking we might see R there. As we turned left on 10th and Tolmie, we spotted a large cart with lots of belongings, very neatly stowed, by the bus stop at 10th and Tolmie. We couldn't see anyone that looked like they owned the cart, but we pulled over and put a packet and fruit on top. We went back into the car, but as we were pulling out, a young woman came over and waved to us and said thank you. So we got out again to speak with her, and gave her some extra socks and boots. Her name is K, and she is homeless. She is petite, probably in her 30s, has long blonde hair, and doesn't look like a typical homeless person. She came to Vancouver from Newfoundland via Toronto, with a boyfriend, but the relationship did not work out. She doesn't know Vancouver well, or have any connections here.

She said she had trained as a care aid in Toronto, but had had some trouble with depression and had at one point used some street drugs, but has been clean for a year. We are not sure how long she's been here, but she said she had had an accident on her bike when it was snowy and slippery, and broke her thumb. It looked like she had also hurt her face, one cheek had cuts that were healing over. We gave her the address of the Kits Saturday morning shower program and gave her directions to get there. We did not have a list of shelters with

us, and she said she did not feel safe downtown. She did say that she was going to the hospital that day to see to her thumb, so we hope the hospital found her a place in a shelter. We all felt badly leaving her there, and we hope she will find her way to the Saturday morning showers program next week.
