

## Neighbourhood Ministry NEWS: Spring 2020

The Neighbourhood Ministry is a collaborative ministry offered by the Vancouver Westside Anglican parishes of *St. Anselm's, St. Philip's, St. Helen's & St. John's Shaughnessy.* 

In keeping with the directives from the Canadian Government, province of BC regulating officials and Archbishop Melissa, the Westside Anglican Neighbourhood Ministry (WNAM) has had to temporarily suspend its street outreach and Mobile Care Unit activities.

This current inability to meet with and provide services to the vulnerable and homeless individuals that this ministry serves is a painful time for the WNAM's volunteers and the community it serves.

In the meantime, the supplies on hand at each of the 4 parishes have gone to good use. On the last weekend of March, several boxes of food and six large bags of clothes and shoes were delivered to the new emergency shelters at Coal Harbour and the Roundhouse Community Centres, which was very much appreciated and gratefully received.

During this difficult time, we are continuing to work on ways in which to continue services where we can do so in a safe and secure manner, such as continuing to drop off food and clothing to designated city drop-off locations and providing donations to the Food Bank. More information will be provided in the coming days on various items that are needed.

We have also prepared online tax returns for 26 residents at Dunbar, which allows them to receive refunds within a few weeks.

The WNAM is very much committed to restarting its program, fully, as soon as it is deemed safe and advisable by regulating officials to do so.

On February 26, 2020, the City of Vancouver approved a grant in the amount of \$26,600 for the Westside Anglicans Neighbourhood Ministry's (WNAM) project "Equipping Volunteers for Service to Homeless and Vulnerable People."

The City of Vancouver received funding requests from 23 organizations and approved 15 of them, providing grant amounts ranging from \$14,000 to \$116,000.

In its funding approval letter to the WANM, Vancouver City Council commended the WANM as follows:

## 2020: a year of transition for the Neighbourhood Ministry

The year 2020 will see leadership changes in the Neighbourhood Ministry as

clergy leader Deacon Pitman Potter, who developed and inspires the program, prepares for retirement in June.



Additionally, Vicki Potter, operations lead for the past 13 years, will transition from that role to focus on one-on-one support of homeless individuals.

The work of Deacon Pitman and Vicki has been incredible, to say the least. From equipping volunteers to serve in a program that has been recognized by the Diocese of New Westminster, the Anglican Church of Canada and, most recently, the City of Vancouver, to expanding the program to provide social and medical services to Kits Showers & St. Augustine's Anglican Church.

A Board of Management, headed by the Rev'd John Stephens, St. John's Shaughnessy; and consisting of Rev'd Alex Wilson, St. Anselm's; Rev'd Stuart Hallam, St. Philip's; Rev'd Scott Gould, St. Helen's; along with parish liaisons from St. Anselm's (Shirin Theophilus); St. Philip's (Rhona Thornton); St. Helen's (Bryan Henderson); and St. John's Shaughnessy (Joan Stewart); has been struck to create and implement a plan going forward.

The Board of Management, which has been meeting regularly since July 2019, has discerned that the Neighbourhood Ministry will continue to be the ministry of all four parishes, but will fall under the charity umbrella of St. Philips for the simplicity of clarification and adherence to financial reporting requirements.

Vicki and Deacon Pitman have graciously agreed to assist and support the transition, mentoring new staff and leaders and providing advice on the process of moving forward.

The Neighbourhood Ministry provides an incredible opportunity for all of us to experience the blessing of serving the vulnerable members of our community and, despite the current upheaval caused by the coronavirus, we feel energized for the future and the continuation of this ministry.
