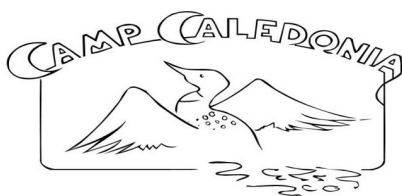


Bishop's Travels

We are taught from early on that waiting is a passive thing. You are supposed to do nothing. Be still, keep quiet, and wait. Not all cultures view waiting as passive. It's rather active. We are actively not doing that which we want or feel we should be doing. We are intentionally putting ourselves to the side and waiting for another. It is not easy, but an important spiritual exercise. While it may be frustrating, boring, or tedious, it is an element of our spiritual journey. Advent is a season of waiting. There is a call to wait for the Lord's return. In slowing down, in waiting, we can prepare ourselves for this joyous day.

As we wait, be people of Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy

The Advent themes of Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy bring form and meaning to our waiting. We are people of great hope, for today and in the age that is to come. Advent Activities

Here's a list of things you can do this Advent as part of your preparations for Christmas.

- Do a daily Advent Devotional
- Create a prayer list for people in your community that you would like to encourage. Pray for them daily and send a Christmas card. This list could include doctors, nurses, first responders, and clergy.
