

- The parable of the workers in the vineyard – only in Matthew
- In the context of the 'Rich Young Ruler' (19:16-22); the challenge of wealth & the gospel (19:23-26); Peter's comment on the disciple's selfsacrifice (19:27-30)



The Place

- A vineyard in Israel
- At the time of harvest
- Get the grapes in at the right time

The Action

- The landowner goes to the town square and hires labourers early in the morning (5:00 a.m.)
- He returns to the square and hires more workers at 9:00, noon, 3:00, and 5:00
- At the end of the day each worker is paid 1 denarius starting with the last hired
- Those hired first grumble that they are not paid more than the others (v12)

The Characters & Concepts

 The landowner evokes the image of God who is concerned about the labourers (v4, 6-7)

The Characters & Concepts

 The workers in the vineyard represent Israel or the church of Matthew

The Characters & Concepts

Raises the question:

 What is our attitude in service for God?

The Characters & Concepts

A Denarius represents the gift of 100 fold/eternal life (19:29)

The Characters & Concepts

 A Parable moving us beyond competition /comparison – be grateful for God's generosity



Do we identify with the grumbling worker?

- · Does God seem unjust or unfair?
- Even though a contract has been signed (v2,13)

Do we ever try to bargain with God?

 See Jacob in Genesis 28:18-22 establishing parameters with God

The parable is about the Divine compassion of God.

- God is a good God (Psalm 145:9)
- We are called to imitate the generosity of God (Ephesians 5:1-2)

The parable is about grace not our merit.

 Grace for all not just for us – one hour of pay will not provide a family's supper

The privilege of service

- · Not a cost but a gift
- Not about clocking our hours but keeping our gaze upon the Father

Service draws us closer to the Landowner – the Father.

- Becoming a friend of God
- It is not about drudgery but about relationship with God

Each of us has our place in the vineyard.

 Keep trusting in the wisdom of the Landowner and keep saying 'yes' to him Blessed are those who remain open to the call of the Father, and open also to a revision of their course; blessed are those who do not refuse when God wants to meet us, engage us, and lead us.

We will not see the goodness of God with a jealous eye.

- 'Are you envious because I am generous?' (v15b) literally reads 'Is your eye evil because I am good?'
