CHILDREN AT CHURCH - EVERY SUNDAY

At the 10.00am service there are Church School classes for all children who wish to attend. The youngest (newborns to two years old) can use our "Noah's Ark" room (just off the side of the church) under parental supervision.

KNITTING 9 INCH SQUARES - A HANDS-ON PROJECT

The objective is to provide blankets for our neighbours in need by knitting (or crocheting) 9 inch squares which can be sewn together into beautiful blankets.

Here's what to do:

- knit (or crochet) 9 inch squares using whatever pattern and colours you want, but please use machine-washable wool or varn
- · Leave the completed squares in the basket beneath the mailboxes
- · Leave any spare yarn that others can use in the other basket by the mailboxes
- If you do not know how to knit, ask someone to show you, go on-line, or borrow a book from the library. Perhaps someone would be willing to provide a lesson for beginners...
- Once enough squares have been collected to start putting them together, hold a sewing bee—each quilt will be 5 squares wide and 8 squares long so take 40 squares.

Why not ask family members, friends, fellow-students and colleagues to get involved? It is easy and relaxing to knit a square while chatting, listening to music, or enjoying some downtime—a great summer project! And gentlemen, remember that sailors, especially fishermen, traditionally knitted their own socks and sweaters—9 inch squares are far simpler and a great starting point...

We will hold regular "Tea and Bee" sessions so that the blankets will be ready before the cold weather sets in—again. Please join us—the more the merrier. Thank you!

REFUGEE NEWS

The application to sponsor Lama and her four children, refugees from Syria now in a camp in Lebanon, is being processed at the Canadian Visa Office in Beirut. This will likely take several more months. Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in North Vancouver has agreed to partner with us to sponsor Lama's parents, Nasriddin and Fatmeh, and her younger brother, Ward. This will allow us to submit these applications to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada in the next week or two, as the Lutherans have sufficient allocations, i.e. sponsorship application spaces.

NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY NEWS

I am very pleased to share with you that the Neighbourhood Ministry has been selected as a Care+Share recipient in the Diocese of New Westminster for 2018/2019. As a recipient, we will receive half of the funding that is collected Diocesan-wide through designated Care+Share giving. Diocesan Council noted "the impressive track-record of this ministry of fruitful collaboration with community, parish and governmental partners. the articulation of the vision and the plan forward are exemplary". Funding received will be used to continue our work, particularly with respect to expanding the Mobile Care Unit concept and collaborating with other Westside outreach service.

In addition, Diocesan Council has designated the Neighbourhood Ministry a "Related Group", which means the NM now has Diocesan wide standing while still being operated independently by the four churches. In other news, we have received a donation of \$1000 from the Diocesan ACW in recognition of our work. We have also received formal notice from Services Canada of funding for two summer students. We have confirmed Benita Yi as one of these students. Benita has been serving as a Social Work practicum student with the Mobile Care Unit this past year and will continue with this work, as well as assist with Neighbourhood Ministry program communications. We are in the process of hiring a second student. So very much to be thankful for. I appreciate your sharing this news with your parishes. Blessings, Pitman

NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY WEEKLY UPDATE

Hello evervone.

This morning, Team 1 set off from McBride Park with lovely packets and fruit supplied by St. Philip's and Don Lamb. Deacon Pitman sent us off with a prayer. We were a full car - Pauline, Peg, Heather, Ellie and me. First we went to Jericho Beach in the hopes of finding A. He has been seen along the beach, tucked into some logs, just west of the Jericho concession stand, but no sign of him today. We did meet S and J at the concession stand. S lives on his boat, but was spending a few weeks on shore and happily took some sandwiches and a packet. Socks were a priority. J is housed in BC Housing in Burnaby. She and I spent some time talking about how she might apply for a transfer to Vancouver, where she can be closer to her daughter.

Next, we stopped at B's spot at the United Church and left him some things on his bedding - but did not see him. Nobody else on 10th Avenue.

Next we went to the 4th and Highbury corner where 7 familiar faces awaited us - C, D, R, T, W, M and B. C, D and R are not housed, but seemed in better spirits about being outdoors with the milder weather. R and D access the MCU at Kits. We checked in with M about his hip, which is still very bad. We urged him to see Dr. Janet at the Kits Showers next time, to have another appointment booked with the ortho surgeon. We might need an angel to accompany him. Finally, we alerted B to a "free eye glasses" clinic happening downtown in a few weeks. He lost his glasses just days after the Neighbourhood Ministry replaced them for him, so this free clinic is a welcome announcement.

From there, we went along Broadway and saw J sleeping in front of the Hollywood Theatre. He was grateful for food and packet, not too chatty though. Further up at Safeway, was J. She said she is sleeping in the Safeway underground parking, but was planning to go to her advocate today about something more permanent. We collected some information from her, in order to see whether she has an active BC Housing file. She has been a hard one to help over this winter, despite our efforts.

We stopped to see S in front of London Drugs. He was in very bad shape and said he wished he had not declined several offers of housing at 7th and Fir over the years. He may be one that the Mobile Care Unit can connect with this summer, during our trial runs in July.

We found G and S's camp along Granville, and spotted S, but not in time to actually connect, but the team left lots of goods, including peanut butter and jelly buns, at their spot.

Finally, we stopped to see P the Megaphone man on 4th, who as always greeted us with a smile and was happy for some tuna buns.

Many of you have been following the story of M, who was a long-time Jericho Hostel camper - this winter residing in a fridge box on the doorstep. Yesterday, Heather and I had the privilege of helping him move indoors, to a lovely unit downtown - north facing with a water and mountain view, kitchenette and bathroom. The staff were warm and welcoming. Several NM volunteers helped gather move in goods (Peg, Jane, Heather), and Heather and her husband Dave have been true angels over the last several weeks, bringing him dinner in Angel Karen's absence, helping him secure his photo ID and BC Services card, and over all being a trusted presence in his life. Dr. Janet and MCU student Viona visited his camp several times to check on his medical condition. M seemed very ready for the move...but Heather and I both left with our fingers crossed and lots of prayers. It is a BIG change for him. We ask for your prayers as he gets to know his new home.
