Mission Focus for January: Heart to Honduras Kaleb & Stacy Eldridge

Our shared passion for people and our faith led us to marriage in June of 2009. In 2010, Heart to Honduras offered us the opportunity to step into a full-time International Community Development role. In 2011 we left our full-time teaching and tech-writing jobs in order to move to Honduras and have been here ever since. Why? Our faith leads us to the understanding that we cannot just view people as only souls (to be saved) or only bodies (to be fixed or provided for), but as whole people.

We are all in poverty - mentally, physically, environmentally, emotionally, financially, spiritually – not one of us escapes the grasp of oppression and suffering. We believe that only through hope in Christ can we ever fully escape this vicious cycle.

As holistic beings, our response to poverty must also be holistic. We can no longer just engage the world in only church, only poverty alleviation efforts, only counseling, only microbusiness, only medical work, or only environmental advocacy, but work to bring all these elements into one holistic model that ministers to unique needs in each individual or community. This understanding leads us to live intentional lives that focus around relationship with God, ourselves, our environment, and others.

The Eldridges built their block house using local resources. Their garden and animals provide food for the family. With Kaleb's guidance, the villagers worked to get running water to their community. Several successful small businesses have been launched and are growing (coffee, wood items made from the coffee plant, hammocks, cabbage farming to name a few).



Kaleb starts each day with milking the family goats and tending to their small homestead. He and Stacy work to support the local church and community council, facilitate HTH's community development efforts, and develop new ways to transform holistic, grassroots development in the community.

We welcome everyone as children of God, each with our unique gifts and differences

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Heart to Honduras collaborates with churches, small businesses, other non-profits, a collegiate fraternal organization, and colleges and universities. We are a Christ-centered ministry, working non-denominationally. We seek partners who share our core values and commitments to work toward healthy, holistic, sustainable transformation.

Many partners enter into a focused relationship with one particular Honduran community. The primary interface is the local church. Honduran pastors and their leaders work closely with village leadership councils in order to dream and plan together for the healthy development of the whole community.
