KNITTING 9 INCH SQUARES - A HANDS-ON PROJECT

The objective is to provide blankets for our neighbours in need by knitting (or crocheting) 9 inch squares which can be sewn together into beautiful blankets. Here's what to do:

- knit (or crochet) 9 inch squares using whatever pattern and colours you want, but please use machine-washable wool or yarn
 - Leave the completed squares in the basket beneath the mailboxes
- Leave any spare yarn that others can use in the other basket by the mailboxes
- If you do not know how to knit, ask someone to show you, go on-line, or borrow a book from the library. Perhaps someone would be willing to provide a lesson for beginners...
- Once enough squares have been collected to start putting them together, hold a sewing bee—each quilt will be 5 squares wide and 8 squares long so take 40 squares.

Why not ask family members, friends, fellow-students and colleagues to get involved? It is easy and relaxing to knit a square while chatting, listening to music, or enjoying some downtime—a great summer project! And gentlemen, remember that sailors, especially fishermen, traditionally knitted their own socks and sweaters—9 inch squares are far simpler and a great starting point...

We will hold regular "Tea and Bee" sessions so that the blankets will be ready before the cold weather sets in—again. Please join us—the more the merrier. Thank you!

REFUGEE NEWS

There have been some recent positive developments in our refugee sponsorship process.

The application to sponsor Lama and her four children, refugees from Syria now in a camp in Lebanon, has been approved by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Apparently this means that the application itself was satisfactory, we are approved as sponsors, and the file will be sent to the Canadian Visa Office in Lebanon for further processing. This will include an interview of Lama and family and will take about ten months. The final decision as to whether Lama and her children can come to Canada rests with the Visa office, although we do not anticipate a problem.

The Refugee Fund has received a wonderful memorial donation of \$10,000 from the family of Howard Lear who wished to cover the sponsorship of Lama's parents, the grandparents of the family.

We have also received a wonderful pledge of support from St. Faith's Anglican Church. They have pledged \$5000 when our refugee family arrives and another \$5000 to help with the transition at the end of the one year sponsorship period.

Lama's parents asked if we could include their youngest son, Ward, who is 23 years old, and has a little work experience in construction. Lama, her children, her parents and Ward have been living together in the camp. With the recent donations, we feel confident that we can cover the costs of sponsoring him as well. The applications for Lama's parents, Nasriddin and Fatmeh, and Ward are essentially complete. We are awaiting permission from IRCC to submit them.

Team 4, Caroline, Whitney and I set out from St. Philip's this morning. We were delighted to welcome Whitney O'Brien to our team. Don Lamb sent us off from St. Philip's with packets, fruit, sandwiches, water and extra blankets and clothing.

At 4th and Highbury we found T, B and W. All seemed well and in good spirits and happy to take some food.

We found no one at Jericho Beach.

We went down past the hostel to look for M. We found the wood chips pile by the parking lot of the City Works yard. There was a tarp spread on the ground behind it with a

sleeping bag under it but no M. We went back to the hostel, and checked M's big box, but he was not there. We went back to the tarp and left a packet. We continued further down to the substation, and found A back in his old place. He was a little more talkative that usual. He took some food from us. He already had a whole cake in front of him, which had attracted lots of small ants. We then went over to Locarno Beach but found no one. We then returned by the works yard and just to get back up to 4th, and there was M walking along on his way back from grocery shopping. He actually looked quite well. He did not seem to be having any trouble walking. He was happy to see us and we gave him some more food.

At 4th and Vine we met P selling Megaphones on the NE corner. He took some food. A bit further along in front of Whole Foods we met R in an electric wheelchair panhandling. He was new to us, but seemed familiar with our group. He lives somewhere in the area. He told us that he had been given an eviction notice for June 1. He is very worried about that. He gave me his phone number in case we could help him. He said he did have a case worker but had missed an appointment with her yesterday.

We continued up to Granville. We found S and G around Granville and 11th on opposite sides of Granville. Both seemed OK. S seemed very happy to see us. We gave them food, including extra peanut butter and jam sandwiches as we had lots.

Along Broadway we found S in his usual spot in front of London Drugs. As usual he took only a few items out of a packet.
