We at St. Anne's & St. Edmund's started our year with a delicious Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper prepared by our dedicated men, women and youth of the parish. Then...COVID-19 arrived in Canada. The Province of B.C. literally shut down in order to

contain the spread of the virus. Freedom of movement and physical contact was severely restricted. This was especially hard on people living alone – namely the seniors. We remained inside or close to our homes. Donning masks and using 2 metre distancing, we left our homes to shop for essentials only. With time on our hands, my husband Vic & I brought home 10 day-old baby chicks to raise. This would keep us busy.

The warm weather of summer brought fewer cases of the virus. June saw the lifting of some of the pandemic's restrictions but no events would be taking place in the parish.
