

St. Paul's 2021 Budget

The 2021 operating budget was prepared based on the fiscal 2020 actual results and presented to Parish Council at our January 12, 2021 meeting.

Parish council supported the 2021 budget with the following assumptions:

The budget was prepared using 2020 + 2019 actuals divided by 2 or a reasonable amount budgeted.

The Dioceses has directed that Salaries and Apportionment will not be increased.

Internal Salaries have not been increased.

Outreach is 10% based on Total Offering.

In General

AMP budget versus Balanced Budget – The proposed AMP budget reflect the anticipated income and expenditure for 2021. As St Paul's is a non- profit organisation a balanced budget is prepared, with the adjustment made to the General offering to balance.

Apportionment - supports not only the administrative costs of the Diocese, but also contributes to many of the Diocesan Outreach programmes.

Outreach

Considers both our financial and volunteer support to the wider community Includes "Inreach Support" which is an Incumbent's discretionary funds for Pastoral and Contact Care Ministries

Ministries - the budget supports the many Ministries we have at St Paul's.

Foster Child - continued sponsorship/financial support of our foster child, Desta Keweti

Interest revenue is the interest on our savings account (primarily Directed Funds) and the \$5000 GIC that secures our Visa account.

Observations

The 2020 actuals show a Net Profit of \$15 990; this was due to a COVID-19 Subsidy of \$17 920 a reduction of apportionment of \$13 393 and reduction of Outreach of \$13 892 and a reduction of general offering of \$24 000.

This Net Profit will be required to fund the 2021 budget operating expenses. The Diocese has confirmed that the apportionment will be required to be paid in 2021 and no further known COVID-19 subsidies are anticipated.

2020 Treasurer's Report

St Paul's ended the 2020 year with an Operating Profit of \$15 739 whilst trending a deficit for most of the year. This was a positive outcome, however there are several contributable factors.

Whilst Offerings were high in December; the General offerings were down by \sim \$24 000 overall. Due to Covid-19 the Diocese gave relief to parishes and reduced our apportionment by \$13 393. We were able to obtain a COVID-19 Subsidy of \$17 920 from the Government for a few months. Outreach was reduced considerably by \$13 892 as a precautionary measure to ensure operating expenses could be covered. Other operating costs that were reduced compared to the budget are due to limited to no physical presence at the church.


This year we introduced e-transfer for donations, this has been well received, as has the Canada HELPS online giving from our Website.

Report of the Midnapore Church of England Society for 2020

Dear Friends of MCES and St. Paul's Parish:

This has been a quiet year for MCES with COVID-19 Virus precluding in person meetings or other group activities other than our AGM, which was held on January 28, 2020. However, MCES continues to exist and carry on with its role of maintaining St. Paul's Chapel and cemetery. Thank you to Robert Worden for his work on maintenance, including installation of new floodlights which show the Chapel to best advantage at night, while supervising the contract for grass cutting and for general grounds maintenance. Thank you to Carol Ann Shaw for keeping the Chapel clean and tidy. The Directors also recommended the purchase and installation of a new Organ/Keyboard for the Chapel; thanks to Paul Bourgeois for researching and arranging this purchase. Finally, our Provincial Historic Resource insignia was installed by the front entrance to the Chapel this summer.



The financial position of St. Paul's MCES Trust Fund ("the Trust Fund") which provides for maintenance, repairs, etc. continues to be strong, with \$303,900 invested in Guaranteed Investment Certificates. We note with regret that Dan Brisbin will be stepping down from his role in overseeing the Trust Fund effective on December 31st. We thank Dan for contributions to St. Paul's and MCES and assistance in administering and preparing financials over many years and for his offer to assist in the transition to whomever the Parish will be designating as his successor.

With the retirement of Dan, I thought it might be a good time to refresh memories about some aspects of the Midnapore Church of England Society (MCES)'s relationship is to the Parish. Our role is laid out in the agreement of June 1, 1995 with the Vestry and body corporate of St. Paul's Anglican Church Parish ("The Agreement").

MCES's role is to raise funds on behalf of the Parish for the Trust Fund. The Parish in turn covenants to retain and keep the Trust Fund monies in investments authorized by law for the Parish as a charity and trustee, in a separate account, together with any interest earned thereon, and to pay out sums in any fiscal year for maintenance, repair, preservation, restoration, and improvement of the chapel and grounds, as recommended by MCES. MCES is not a charity and is not permitted to accept charitable donations or to give tax receipts for the same; funds solicited for MCES purposes are made to St. Paul's Anglican Church, which as a charity can issue tax receipts.

The Parish retains exclusive power regarding investment of the trust fund, (although they have in past sought MCES Directors' advice on investment terms), and the Parish is obligated under The Agreement to report to MCES Directors at least annually with financial information on the Trust Fund, including the projected income for the coming year, to ensure that the corpus of the endowment is not eroded.

Under The Agreement, MCES is entitled to an easement and license to enter upon the Chapel and grounds for the purposes of maintenance, repair etc. and does not exercise control over the use of the Chapel or of the cemetery plots, which remains the sole responsibility of the Parish of St. Paul's. However, the Parish agrees to retain one half of the proceeds of sale of any cemetery plots for deposit into the Trust Fund.

In closing, let me thank everyone for your continuing support of MCES and St. Paul's Parish and on behalf of the Directors of MCES, I wish you a peaceful, happy, and healthy 2021.

PEOPLE'S WARDEN REPORT 2020

'May you live in interesting times' is a saying claimed to be an ancient Chinese curse which seems to be appropriate for 2020. Due to health rules and the desire to keep people safe from Covid-19, our regular church life was disrupted unlike anything in the last 100 years. Yet this disruption also showed the strength of our parish community. With the hard and creative work of members like Paul Bourgeois, Murray Sykes and others, services through video and live streaming were made available to the Parish (and in fact the world). In the brief period we conducted limited services in the fall, attendees and helpers were supportive of one another – willing to change patterns and rituals that they had followed most of their lives. The innovative EPIC program over Zoom for Sunday School, Youth and their families; and the efforts by others in the congregation to organize 'virtual events' demonstrated the creativity and flexibility that has always been part of the Christian story. In particular Fergus put tremendous effort into maintaining and strengthening our church community through his leadership in virtual services and bible studies, and his regular correspondence through email. With no church service to attend and in some cases precarious employment, people could have stopped giving – but most did not and giving was only 11% below 2019. It is indeed a blessing from God that we have in our congregation the people and resources that have allowed us to deal with the pandemic.

We expect 2021, especially the first half, to be similar to 2020. However, we can be confident that our church will continue to be the strong faith community that we demonstrated in 2020. Despite these difficulties, our response to the pandemic has provided us with valuable lessons and tools in how to reach out to people living in isolation and in the use of new technology in our mission. The end of the pandemic will not bring an end to people having challenges with participation in church life due to distance, timing or mobility challenges. We anticipate that the skills we've developed in response to the pandemic can be used to enhance our mission to the Parish into the future. As it happens 'May you live in interesting times' is neither ancient nor Chinese and so maybe not so much of a curse either.

CARING CONTACT MIN-ISTRY

At St. Paul's, we have a Caring Contact Ministry to offer encouragement to the members of our Parish in

our shared discipleship. As I said in my Report last year, we established this Ministry "to help everyone feel cared for and loved as part of our Parish family. We don't want anyone to 'fall through the cracks,' and feel that no one knows or cares." In 2020, COVID-19 made the magnified the need for this Ministry, as people faced isolation, sickness and the threat of sickness, family tensions, and economic hardship, all without so many of the ways of being connected with and supported by others they have known, due to the limits to physical interaction required to keep from spreading the disease. To try to meet this need, we moved the development of this ministry into overdrive. The result was that by the spring, we had 27 Helpers connecting with 232 households on our Parish List. Helpers keep in contact with up to ten households once a month, via email, texting, phone calls, or (once the COVID-19 crisis is past) in-person conversations. In so doing, they and those with whom they keep contact experience the truth of the saying: "A sorrow shared is a sorrow halved; a joy shared is a joy doubled." Helpers and I have ongoing conversations to support them as they carry out their Ministry, and to keep me abreast of how those on their list are doing. I want to offer my sincerest thanks to all who are serving in this Ministry as Caring Contact Helpers. You are making a difference in people's lives, helping us all get through these most challenging times together. It would be wonderful to have more Helpers, as we have 285 households on our Parish List, and (of course) hope that this number will only increase over time. I ask any who can help in this Ministry to please let me know. Training and ongoing support will be provided.

The sign requires a thorough cleaning at least once every year as the spiders and bugs make quite a mess of the inside where the letters are posted. OUTREACH REPORT 2020

The year 2020 was an exceptional year while we adjusted to the changing demands of COVID 19 and the impact to our activity. We maintained the Rector's Discretionary Fund of 10% of the Outreach budget, but donations to

charitable agencies were limited in an effort to manage the uncertain financial status of the parish. We distributed a total of \$6,500 to the following agencies: \$1,500 to the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund, \$1,000 to The Mustard Seed, and \$500 each to Calgary Food Bank, CUPS, Calgary Dream Centre, Distress Centre, Children's Cottage Society, Salvation Army, Inn from the Cold, and St. Edmund's.

As has been our custom for the Reign of Christ Sunday, we arranged for a speaker from one of the agencies we support. This year David Conrad from The Mustard Seed gave a video presentation on their activities to comply with the Public Health directives for COVID while continuing to maintain services to those in need.

We need to acknowledge the other outreach activities during the year. Thank you to Kerry for his efforts with the community garden and the produce he delivered to the Food Bank, and to Kathleen for the Food Bank Drive. Thank you to Barbara Jean for coordinating the Mitten Basket and to all who contributed hats, scarves and mitts to this worthwhile project. This list is incomplete I am sure.

Hopefully next year we will be able to contribute more.

PRAYER MINISTRY AT ST. PAUL'S

Educational Materials from The Anglican Fellowship of Prayer, such as "How To" pamphlets (eg Readers, Prayers of the People and numerous others covering all aspects of prayer) are made available through our Parish Representative. The website of The AFP(Canada) is another great resource.

This past March, because of the pandemic, we embarked on a strange journey down a path that had no map, no deadline and "destination unknown." Right from the get-go the Prayer Group began a weekly e-mail series called "If We Were meeting Tonight" which was a means of staying connected to one another and hopefully an encouragement as we continue on this journey with Covid-19. It was made known to all parishioners that prayer requests would continue to be accepted and acted upon. A pandemic does NOT have the power to stop prayer!!

Besides not being able to meet in person, it was not possible to carry on with Prayer Ministry in the usual fashion. That, however did not stop praying over the telephone with anyone who wished to have personal prayer.

Thankfully, the Lenten Booklets for 2021 arrived early and were distributed before we had to shut down. Then, the Advent Booklets which had been ordered in August, did not arrive until the last week of Advent and so were not used. We will use them for Advent 2021. The booklets for Lent 2021 were ordered before Christmas and hopefully will arrive in time for distribution.

It has meant a lot to us that we are able to meet via Zoom on the 3rd. Monday of each month since the fall. Just seeing each other's faces and actually praying together has been a great blessing. Also, technology makes it possible for those leading Prayers of the People to be recorded as part of the "virtual" services.

We have kept our Parish leadership in constant prayer through this time.

And we give thanks for their faithfulness in giving of their time and talents so that we could keep connected.

The following is the final paragraph from "Finding God in Unsettling Times" ,(as published in January's Anglican

Journal) by our Primate Linda Nicholls:

"We may be weary of the ongoing struggle of COVID-19, tired of remaining isolated, longing for what we have lost. For now, look to the source of stability that will carry us through. Be in touch with God daily:"

MUSIC MINISTRY

St. Paul's Music Group provides music and music leadership for our worship services. We lead music throughout the year at the main Sunday service as well as special seasonal services. The year 2020 was challenging for the choir, to say the least. More to follow.

I continue to be blessed with two capable leaders for our choir – Kathleen Robinson and John McIntyre. Their dedication to this role is greatly appreciated.

We now have a full complement of choir members with three female voices including Kathleen Robinson, Ingrid Bolton and Colleen Eggertson. Our six regular male singers include John McIntyre, Frank Wong, Kerry Peters, Bob Plant, Richard Gray and Jeff Wray. It was great to have Brianna Harvie providing keyboard accompaniment for the 10:00 am service while I was away in February.

Along with music selection, I provide keyboard and, on occasion, guitar accompaniment at the 10:00 am Sunday services with Chris Fink joining us on guitar when he is available. Ingrid has also provided guitar accompaniment during Communion. Rev. Fergus Tyson leads the 8:30 am Sunday service congregation on guitar. If you are a musician and would like to provide accompaniment at the 8:30 am service or join us at 10:00 am, please speak to me after any of our Sunday services once we are able to resume normal in-church services. Ingrid leads the Sunday School children on guitar each week during Sunday

School, and Kathleen leads the children on Ukulele when Ingrid is away.

As mentioned earlier, the year 2020 has been a challenge for all of us, and the choir saw a need to continue to lead congregational music in some way after in-church services were suspended in March. We already had a couple of CDs of recorded music including 15 congregational songs and two choir anthems. There was clearly a need for more. Before choral activities were completely banned, we managed to record an additional 26 songs at two recording sessions, with everyone appropriately socially distanced. Those recordings were sufficient to get us through to the end of the season of Pentecost. With the Advent, Christmas and Epiphany seasons rapidly approaching, we set out in November on a new endeavour to record music remotely (i.e., each at our own homes) and take advantage of available technology to produce choir recordings for our future services. Six members of the choir (Kathleen, Ingrid, Colleen, Richard, Kerry and Fergus) have participated along with me providing keyboard and guitar accompaniment for the recordings. I take the individual recorded tracks (sometime as many as ten voice and instrument tracks) and produce the mixed tracks you hear at our livestreamed services using mixing and editing software on the computer. As of the first week of January 2021, we had recorded 38 new songs and have plans to record another 30 or so additional songs by the beginning of March. Once completed, we'll have an amazing library of some 117 songs to accompany our worship services.

Let's hope and pray that we'll all be back to sharing worship together, including live accompanied music long before the year 2021 is over. In the meantime, we have more than enough recorded music to get us through to the time when we're together again.

Maintaining our two music reprint licenses is another responsibility that I have, including the new streaming licences required for our livestreamed services. In addition to ensuring that our annual fees are paid to the licensing organizations, I maintain a database of our weekly music selections so that we can report our usage to these organizations on a regular basis.

In 2019, we formed the "St. Paul's Stringers" with Rev. Fergus, Jeff, Chris, Ingrid and me on guitar and Kathleen on ukulele. We had great plans to find more occasions to perform – perhaps a monthly "Coffee House" in the Parish Hall – a fun time with refreshments, entertainment and sing-alongs. Let's continue to keep this idea fresh in our minds as we eagerly await the time when we can again socialize together as a parish.

Due to the in-church gathering restrictions, our Handchime Group was not active in 2020. If you are interested in this music ministry in the future, please contact Annette Pingot.

SOUNDBOARD/AV REPORT

The year 2020 has been a challenge for our Sunday Service sound engineers, with Murray Sykes doing the work most weeks. Doreen Peters, Laura Anne Fink and Suzanne Wray are also able to fill in but have been unable to do so since we stopped having in-church services and switched to either pre-recorded services or livestreaming our services with or without people in attendance. Joy Kew and Peter Ramsay were operating the soundboard at our 8:30 am services until March when we switched to one pre-recorded or livestreamed service.

If anyone else is interested in joining our sound-board/AV team once services return to normal, please let me know. Operation of the soundboard and AV equipment is not difficult, and training is available. Up until March, we were using our recording equipment to record our weekly sermons so that they can be posted on our website.

Since switching to either pre-recorded or livestreamed services, the AV duties require two people, one to manage the soundboard and slideshow for the screens, and one to manage the videorecording of the service using our new Mevo livestreaming camera controlled by either a tablet or smart phone (we are currently using my iPad). Murray and I have been doing these tasks since March 2020. Since we are planning on continuing to


livestream our services after we return to regular inchurch services, we will need to recruit more volunteers to manage the soundboard and the videorecording equipment.

We have been building a library of pre-recorded music with the choir (see the Music Ministry Report) and will soon have almost 120 pre-recorded St. Paul's Choir songs to use as long as our choir cannot sing in person at our services (most likely the better part of 2021). We also have a library of recorded keyboard accompaniment (some 31 songs) that enables us to provide backup for times when no one is available to play keyboard. Our weekly AV presentations, either simple PowerPoint slides or slides enhanced with videos or audio tracks, are prepared by Rev. Fergus with the assistance of Laura Anne Fink.

While we had hoped to upgrade the speakers in the hall and Quiet Room in 2019, we have put that project on hold until we have returned to "normal" in-church services with no attendance restrictions and our financial situation returns to a more predictable norm.

















