The prophet of Isaiah 40 called God's people to remember that God was their source of strength. Some scholars place the writing in the sixth century BCE when the people of Judah were living in exile following the Babylonian conquest. The temple and Jerusalem had been destroyed. Imagine the people's discouragement and weariness. The prophet reminded them of the power of God to restore and liberate, of God's desire to renew their strength.

Scripture Reading:

Isaiah 40:21-31 Common English Bible

- 21 Don't you know? Haven't you heard?
 Wasn't it announced to you from the beginning?
 Haven't you understood since the earth was founded?
- 22 God inhabits the earth's horizon—
 its inhabitants are like locusts—
 stretches out the skies like a curtain
 and spreads it out like a tent for dwelling.
- 23 God makes dignitaries useless and the earth's judges into nothing.
- 24 Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely is their shoot rooted in the earth when God breathes on them, and they dry up; the windstorm carries them off like straw.
- 25 So to whom will you compare me, and who is my equal? says the holy one.

26 Look up at the sky and consider:

Who created these?

The one who brings out their attendants one by one, summoning each of them by name.

Because of God's great strength and mighty power, not one is missing.

27 Why do you say, Jacob, and declare, Israel,

"My way is hidden from the Lord, my God ignores my predicament"? 28 Don't you know? Haven't you heard? The Lord is the everlasting God. the creator of the ends of the earth. who doesn't grow tired or weary. God's understanding is beyond human reach, giving power to the tired and reviving the exhausted. 30 Youths will become tired and weary. young men will certainly stumble; 31but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength; they will fly up on wings like eagles: they will run and not be tired; they will walk and not be weary.

Wondering:

As I thought about this scripture, I wondered...
How these words of over two thousand years ago speak to the discouragement and weariness of our world today?
I wondered what we would name as the anchors that we perceive to have been destroyed?
I wondered who will remind us that God has the power to restore us, to liberate us from that which holds us back, and God will give us strength... and will we listen?

Prayer for Awareness and God's grace.

God of all ages, these wisdom words from so long ago remind us that when we find ourselves in places that have changed, in unfamiliar rhythms feeling frustrated and hemmed in you are with us ready to hold us and help us. **But we forget.**

We forget to remember your goodness that created something out of nothing.

We see the nothing and don't look for you.

We forget that we live in a world that you filled with many possibilities.

We get stuck in the chaos and bogged down by too many choices.

We forget to listen to and learn from those who have gone before and experienced the abundance and strength of your love. We forget your splendour, your power, your willingness to be with us.

Fire us up with faith and determination.
Give us the courage to move past our frustrations.
Give us the wisdom to see
the possibilities before us
to share care and compassion with each other
to follow you in new ways
to create something out of this chaos.

May your Holy energy fill our souls so that we will know you and love you in all of our living.

Scripture Reading: Mark 1:29-39 New Revised Standard Version Jesus Heals Many at Simon's House

29 As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. 30 Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. 31 He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

32 That evening, at sunset, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. 33 And the whole city was gathered around the door. 34 And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

A Preaching Tour in Galilee

35 In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. 36 And Simon and his companions hunted for him. 37 When they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is searching for you." 38 He answered, "Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." 39 And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire.

God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.

Reflection:

Don't you know? Haven't you heard? Haven't you understood? Today we are reminded by these questions and more that we coming through something together, that the answers are there if we will still ourselves and hear God's direction.

We continue in Marks Gospel following Jesus' Journey and see how he spoke to people in ways they would understand, how he offered healing of mind and body, how he lived the caring for people that he asked others to do.

He lived in a time when Government of Rome was oppressive and ruled by force. When those who were considered less were not often given the opportunity to be or have more. He gathered around himself like-minded people who wanted to see more equality in the world, who wanted to help others see the possibility of love in fearful circumstances and, together, they began a movement to turn the world upside down.

It wasn't quick. Indeed, it would not come into its own during the lifetime of many, but it was a movement that would ask people to think beyond themselves, to look for opportunities to offer justice, care, compassion. In these times of great trial, of great challenge today it would appear that we are being asked through the scriptures how we would serve God's world.

I am a Diaconal Minister in the United Church. In other or older traditions, we might be named Deacons or Deaconesses. The Greek word diakoneo means to serve. In our training for ministry we are taught to look at the world through the lenses of Education, Social Justice and Pastoral Care. These are the ways that we serve those around us.

Service can be offered in many ways. Through these lenses we are encouraged to offer the world education about caring for each other and about the power of faith; to be the voices that raise up inequalities, that speak with those who are unheard; to offer care and compassion in a hurting world with hurting people.

In today's scripture, using that Greek word for serving, Mark introduces the first deacon in the New Testament. Simon's mother-in-law. She is healed by Jesus and responds by serving those gathered in her house. She quietly gives us an example of setting self aside to serve those who followed Jesus.

There are many pieces in this small portion of scripture that we need to take notice of.

We need to notice that we cannot serve if we are not well ourselves—whether this is in body, mind, or spirit. There are times when we need to offer service and times when we need to accept help and healing offered to us. We should not need to be asked to serve. Simon's mother-in-law just got up to do what she could see needed to be done.

Jesus lived that sense of Diakonia too. Serving others. But did you notice in this scripture that he took time to find space for himself? He found a place to be where he could recharge, connect with God and renew his strength to continue his service to others so that he could serve well.

The spirit of Diakonia in these stories speak to us of offering hospitality to others and ourselves, of learning to know that there are times to be in Sabbath, in a time of re-charging, that is a precursor to looking for others, for seeking justice for others, for teaching others.

Every Sunday worship I use words from the United Church Song of Faith that reminds us that we are "called to be doers of the word and not hearers only." With these words we are reminded that we have to be in action for God's people if we are to live faithfully for God.

Currently, we are asked to Sabbath for each other. To stay home and rest, to re-charge our energy in new ways in preparation for when we can get up and get out to do the things that we know need to be done.

The re-entry plan for Alberta is giving us glimpses of returning to be with each other that we long for, but perhaps we need to rest a while longer for healing first.

In our wisdom words from Isaiah for today, we hear a rebuke that reminds us to focus on the strength, power, compassion and love of God to get us through whatever challenges we face.

These words remind us to identify again the love of God that holds us, surrounds us and gives us strength. Again, we are told, God will breathe life into us.

When we are tired and exhausted God will lift us up. When we trust God to guide us we will find the strength to do what comes next. God will heal our souls and move us forward so that we can serve our family, our friends, our community in love.

As we move through these challenging times, I would share with you and invite you to experience that sense of Diakonia, that willingness to do what needs to be done for the communities that are so important to us. I would invite you to remember the power of God to give us the courage, the strength, the love to get us through.

Sit for a moment, breathe in the breath of God. Be lifted up, be lifted forward, be lifted by God's love. This will bring us to where God needs us to be.

Jesus, preacher, proclaim, again, your promise of another way. Declare, again, your dream of justice and compassion. Teach, again, your message of a non-violent, non-dominating realm of God.

Holy One, who makes all things possible, lift us when we are weary. Be our strength and fill us with hope as we seek to serve you and our neighbour this day. Amen.
